
#### Summer Meal Program for Children Seeks Community Sites

HOUSTON COUNTY, GA – The Houston County School Nutrition Program (SNP) will offer its annual summer feeding program in cooperation with the Georgia Department of Education. Meals will be offered free of charge to children ages 18 and under, from Tuesday, May 28 through Friday, July 19, 2024.

Organizations offering summer programs for children may be eligible to participate in this program and receive meals at no charge for participants. Interested organizations must apply and be approved by May 3, 2024. Vacation Bible Schools, athletic practices, scout troops, recreation departments, and tutoring programs are examples of the many summer programs that may be eligible to receive meals free of charge to serve children attending their programs and activities. Huntington Middle School, Northside High School, and Perry High School will be open as the approved sites to pick up meals.

# ServSafe Program

The ServSafe Program provides food safety training, personal hygiene, cross-contamination prevention, allergens, time and temperature requirements, and sanitation training methods. The Georgia Department of Health requires every food service establishment to have staff who are ServSafe certified. The Transition Academy teamed up with the University of Georgia's Cooperative Extension program to provide the ServSafe Training Course. Staff and students at the Transition Academy participated in 8 weeks of training which focused on food safety practices. At the end of the 8 weeks, participants took the ServSafe certification test. All staff and 9 students passed the certification exam and are now ServSafe Certified! Way to go!
