

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TK and Kindergarten Mrs. Tinnin

This week kindergarten learned the letter sounds for p and e. Your child should know the sounds for a, c, d, f, g, h, i, m, n, o, p, s, t, v, and z. Students use the sounds they have learned to sound out CVC words.

In math, kindergarten is learning how to add two numbers through 10. They use number bonds to understand that two parts make a whole number.

TK is starting their Animals module! In this module, students will learn about animals' basic needs, how they protect themselves, and how some are born from eggs. In math, TK is learning about shapes and their attributes.

First and Second Grade Explorers Mrs. Mittge

Students are getting excited about Thanksgiving! They are writing fabulous pieces on their Thanksgiving feelings and experiences! This week students wrote about what they are most thankful for.

We also introduced the play we will be performing in December. Its title is, "The Mitten Mystery." Please look for a script with your child's lines as well as a list of any costume needs that may be needed next week. We will be practicing our play in the weeks to come.

Last, reading fluencies were sent home this week. I woud suggest the following schedule for use:

Monday: Read the passage aloud to your child, pointing to each word as you read. Then have your child read for one to two minutes.

Tuesday: Student reads the passage aloud. Discuss with your child what is happening in the passage.

Wednesday: Student reads the passage aloud, this time with expression. Discuss comprehension questions with your child. Encourage use of the passage to support thinking.

Thursday: Time student for one minute as s/he reads the passage aloud.

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Special Education-Title1/LAP- Social Emotional Learning (SEL): Mrs. Duren

Over the years we have found that the month of November is an ideal time to focus as a school community on the character trait of "Gratitude" in SEL class as well as in our day to day schoolwide experiences. In class we define gratitude as "choosing to appreciate the people and things in our lives". For some families in our community this is easily represented and experienced connected to the holidays they celebrate in the fall and winter months. Perhaps it is seen in sharing appreciation for the many freedoms we have and for the people who fought for those freedoms. Perhaps for others it is seen in having our basic needs met, such as in being thankful for food to eat, places to stay, clothing to wear, and medical care. For others, gratitude is best represented in feeling grateful for the chance to gather with others to share a special meal, treat or activity and in recognizing the hard work that others do to make a holiday or event special such as creating costumes, decor, and activities. All of these have value and serve a purpose.

When asked what the word Gratitude means to them, one Kindergartener summed it up like this "It is like being kind, but bigger." An older student this week explained it to me this way "Gratitude is more than just being thankful, maybe it's like thankfulness multiplied!" Yet one more student shared this insight when asked to define gratitude. "It has more feelings connected to it than just being happy, so it means more than just saying "thanks" or being nice because it only happens when people or things really matter."



Recently we have had a lot of opportunities to feel and express our Gratitude, bringing learning to life. One such example was when the 3rd and 4th graders were visited this week by Les Vian and Cassie Duren who are both active members of Hope Grange. Through the National Grange Words for Thirds program, they were able to present each third grader with their own dictionary, as well as to share examples from their own experiences from when each of them attended Evaline School. Another opportunity we had this month to show gratitude was when we attended the Veterans Day Assembly at Boistfort School last Friday. We were thankful for the invitation and the ability to attend, and grateful to all our Veterans and their families who have given so much for our country. A third example is directed toward our Booster Club which does so much for our students and

staff to help make learning fun, as seen at the following recent event which they sponsored: swimming lessons, the pumpkin patch field trip, our fall festival party, and our most recent all school assembly which focused on the value of finding and appreciating music all around us, and connecting that with recycling and imagination. Later this month we are looking forward to giving back to our community by gathering food for our annual food drive to benefit the Winlock Vader Food Bank, and in sharing our own traditional thanksgiving feast at our school with many of the community members who have volunteered and supported us over the years, for which we are truly grateful.

As you can tell we have been learning that Gratitude is more than just being thankful. It also includes appreciating the people and things in our lives unconditionally, even when things do not go the way we have planned, or when the situation causes strong emotions. When we make a conscious choice each day to see what is positive or is considered progress in our day, and appreciate it, then we are focusing on gratitude at its finest. I hope that during this holiday season, we each can do the actions needed to support a heart full of gratitude and thankfulness. For all of these things, and the many more left unsaid, we express our gratitude as a staff and as a school community. We hope you too find ways to be grateful this month.
