For hundreds, maybe even thousands of years, Native Americans would set up camp in a stand of sugar maples during the sap run. The sugar they produced was an important food for them and for the colonists, who learned the process from the Native Americans. Come and see how to turn that sweet sap into sugary maple syrup.



REPTILES ALIVE at ECHO HILL



We have learned about these boxes with virtual programs; now let's get together and build in person. We will learn a little bit about screech-owls and then use the rest of our time to assemble the boxes. Wood will be pre-cut, and screws will be provided. Please bring your own #2 screwdriver. EVENING WALK FOR SCREECH-OWLS at SUNNYSIDE



SIMPLE BASKET WITH BEADS

This workshop is a great introduction to the art of making baskets. Let's weave a round 6" in diameter x 6" high basket on a wood base. Be creative with the color weavers and beads that will be included in each kit.

Tools you supply: Scissors (able to cut basket material), bucket of warm water (to soak reed in).

Work along with Liz, during this instructional webinar, as she shows you step-by-step how to weave a basic rectangle basket using flat reed. This basket measures 13" long x 9" wide x 9" tall.

Tools you supply: Scissors, bucket of warm water (to soak reed in), tuck tool or small flathead screwdriver (about 1/4" wide, thin head), 10 mini clamps or clothespins, spray bottle, spoke weight or heavy book and a dull darning needle that will take waxed linen.
