

CY 2025 Millage





State law requires that if the District does not lower the millage rate to offset property value growth set by the tax assessor, we must advertise it as a tax increase and hold three public hearings – even when the millage rate itself has not changed from the previous year.

2025 Proposed Millage Rate – 11.719 mills



Same millage rate as in 2024

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Year Millage
2023 13.183
2024 11.719 Reduction in millage by 1.464 mills
2025 11.719 Unchanged from 2024
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Remains lower than any actual millage rate since 1992 (32 years)



- For CY 2024 (FY 2025) the School District's millage ranked 165th out of 180 systems.
- Property owners in 164 school districts faced higher millage rates, which likely resulted in higher property taxes.





Even though the millage rate is not going up, higher overall commercial and residential property values mean the State considers it a tax increase. This results in a rollback amount of 1.266 mills and requires us to hold three public hearings.



Only property owners whose reassessment went up would see a tax increase. For owners with no reassessment, taxes would remain the same. If a reassessment went down, their taxes would decrease.



Effect on Homeowner

The amount attributable to 1.226 mills is:

Additional Information

- The Houston County School District is the 12th largest school district in the State of Georgia with over 30,800 students and growing.
- We are also the 2nd largest employer in Houston County.

 - Instructional Materials
 - Technology for our students and staff
 - Transportation Costs: buses, salary and benefits, fuel, operating costs
 - 100% of state health insurance employer costs for our classified employees (i.e.. Bus drivers, bus monitors, paraprofessionals, clerical staff, custodians, maintenance staff, lunchroom monitors, etc.)
 - Recurring Expenses for 45+ Facilities: Electricity, Water, Fuel, Cleaning Supplies, Operating and Maintenance Supplies, Repairs, etc.



In Summary

- ✓ The proposed 2025 millage rate is remaining unchanged from 2024 at 11.719 mills.
- ✓ Lowest actual millage rate since 1992 (32 years).
- ✓ The millage rate is not increasing.
- ✓ Lowered millage rate by 1.464 mills in 2024
- ✓ Our millage rate ranked 165th out of 180 school districts (CY2024)
- Our Board of Education continues to prioritize transparency and responsible stewardship of taxpayer dollars while meeting the needs of a growing student enrollment and community.
