Course Overview:

This course will serve as an introductory course in Speech Communications. Students will explore a variety of speaking situations (informative, small group, persuasive, and special event speaking) and different types of communication (interpersonal, small group, and public communication) using a variety of digital media (text, audio, and visual) through formal and informal settings.

Methodology:

While it will consist of traditional methodologies, special emphasis will be placed on student speeches and research projects. Participation in all class activities is required for all students. *Failure to participate in any activity will result in a zero for that assignment*.

The student will develop the skills to generate ideas, research topics, organize information, and create and evaluate oral presentations. This standard expands on Speaking and Listening standards SL.CC.1, SL.CC.2, and SL. PKI.5.

Evaluation Methods:

Students will be evaluated by both traditional methods and speeches and activities. Tests, quizzes, written assignments, daily work, projects, and speeches will be used. *Participation is critical for success in this class*. Students will be given a zero for assignments in which they do not participate.

This course will be highly project-based. Projects will come with well-detailed instructions as well as be discussed in detail in class. All due dates will be posted on the board.

Academic Policies:

- Makeup Work
 - o Makeup work is the responsibility of the student. Students should check Google Classroom for assignments that they have missed. For worksheets or other instructional materials, see Mr. McCaskill.
 - o Assessments must be made up on designated makeup days.
 - o Work due on the day of an absence is due upon the students return to class.
 - o All makeup work, except for speeches and some exercises, must be completed within five school days of the student returning to class.

- o Student speeches and specified exercises will be made up on a designated makeup day. It is the responsibility of the student to let Mr. McCaskill know that he or she needs to make up a speech or exercise.
- Homework
 - o Homework will be given very sparingly.
 - o It is important to complete all homework completely and to the best of your ability.
 - o Homework is due at the start of class on the designated due date.
 - o Homework assignments will be posted on the board.
 - o Late assignments will receive 10 points deducted for each school day that they are late unless otherwise noted. Larger projects may have varying late policies.
- Late Work
 - o Most assignments may be submitted late for a grade deduction; however, the instructor reserves the right to refuse any late assignment.
- Academic Dishonesty
 - o Cheating is prohibited. Any form of cheating will result in the student earning an automatic zero for the assignment. No questions asked.
 - o Plagiarism is a form of cheating and will result in an automatic zero.
 - o If a student has his or her mobile device out during an assessment, the instructor will assume the student is cheating. This will result in the phone being collected and an automatic zero on the assessment.

Behavior Policies:

- Expectations
 - o Come to class prepared to learn (physically and mentally).
 - o Arrive on time.
 - Students will be considered late once the bell rings and the door is closed. Tardy students should report immediately for a tardy slip.
 - o Use the restroom facilities between classes.
 - Students will only be allowed to leave class in emergency situations.
 - o Participate in all class activities and assignments.
 - o Do not disrupt the learning environment.
 - o Do not steal time from the teacher or from the learning of others.
 - o Always be respectful of others and treat them as you would like to be treated.
 - Never be negatively critical of others' performances.
 - Laughter is acceptable when comedy is the goal of the scene.
 - Do not talk during other students' performances.
 - <u>Any form of disrespect during a student performance will result in an</u> <u>automatic zero and potential office referral</u>. There is an absolute zero tolerance of disrespect in Mr. McCaskill's class.
 - o Be seated and begin the daily bellringer by the time the bell rings.
 - Bellringers will be found on the board or instructional technology each day. Students are responsible for completing each day's bellringer without prompting. Each week, all bellringers will be kept on the same sheet of paper and turned in on Friday (or the last school day of that week).
 - o Familiarize yourself with the student handbook. All school and district policies will be enforced. (Tardy Policy, Cell Phone Policy, Dress Code, etc.)
 - o Cell phones should be put away; however, they may be used when the instructor gives explicit permission. Their use will be reserved for educational purposes or extreme circumstances.
- Consequences

- o Students who violate school policies or classroom expectations are subject to disciplinary action.
- o Level one consequences may include: verbal warnings, loss of privileges, calls or emails to parents or guardians, or office referrals.
- o Level two consequences include an office referral.
- Incentives
 - o Positive behavior is also recognized.
 - o Incentives may include special privileges, praise, candy or food, or other incentives.
 - o Students are responsible for making any known food allergies or intolerances known to Mr. McCaskill.
