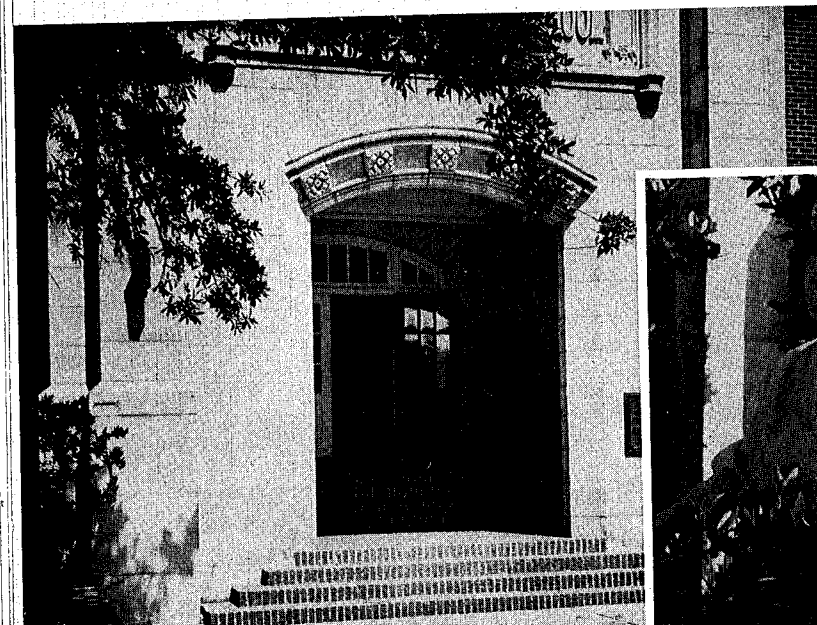

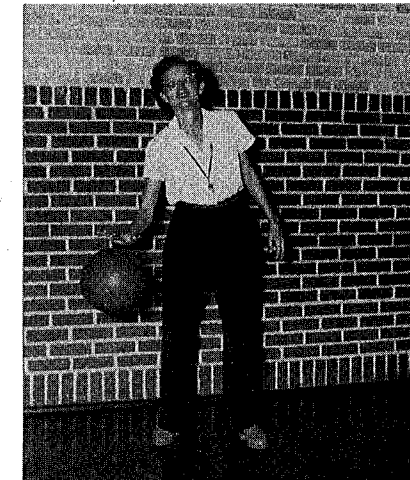

At Christmastime, *MRS. W. R. COOK* plays carols for her junior and senior English students. She obtained her A. B. degree at Franklin College in Indiana.

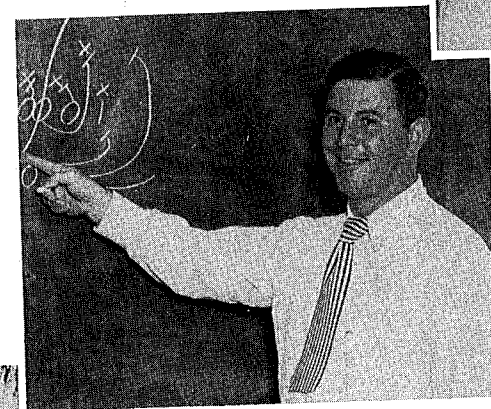


The high school gymnasium, center of athletics in Lake Wales High School, stands sturdy and ready for a workout, even as its athletes.

COACH MILT FEINSTEIN shows the team just how that ball should be played. He's another Kentucky product.

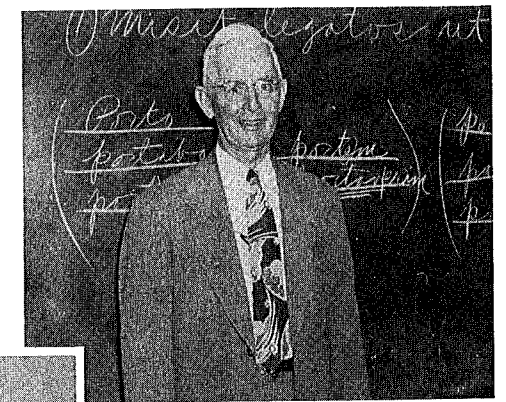


Often seen commuting between the gym and the football field on his scooter is COACH BILL CREWS, track and basketball mentor. He is a graduate of the University of Florida.

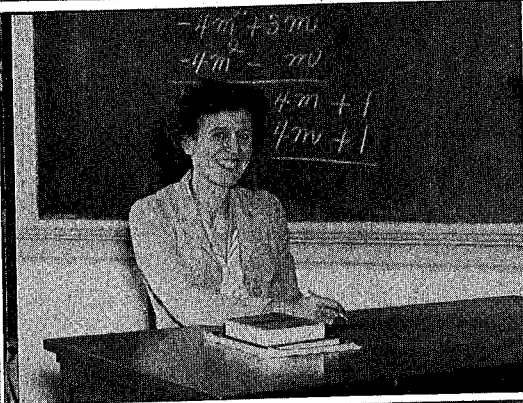

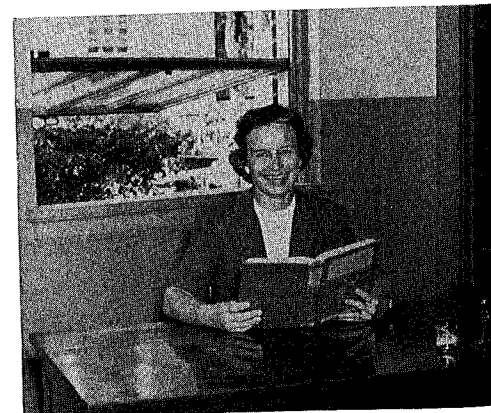

Here—September 30, 1949

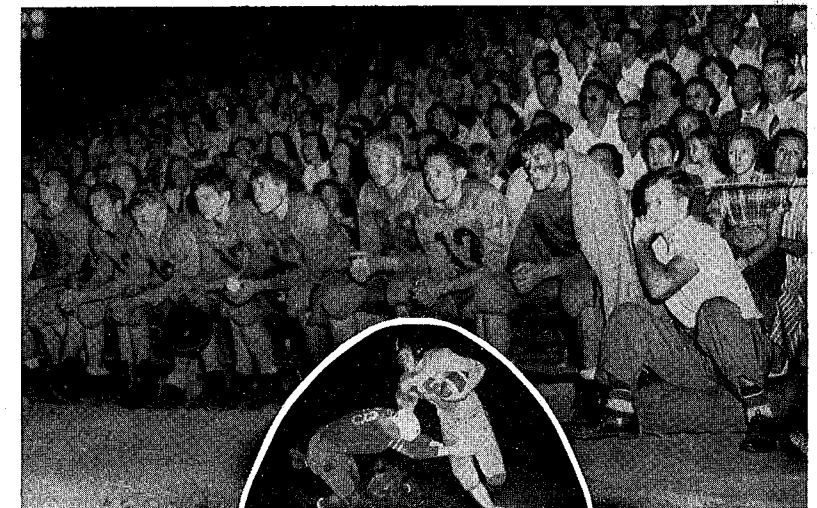
Led by Denzil Coffman and Wayne Clark, the Highlanders won their opening games by rolling over the Kissimmee Kowboys 19-0. Coffman tallied twice while Clark crossed the visitors' goal line once. Hubert Morrow managed to break away for numerous long gains throughout the battle. Pushed forward by guards Captain Harry Wingate, Roy Hall, Franklyn Futch, and Faymon Holmes, Lake Wales line continually shoved the Kowboys back toward their goal line. By upsetting the favored Kissimmee eleven with a surprisingly fine display of power, the Walesmen showed great promise for a successful 1949 grid season.

There—October 7, 1949

The Highlanders swept to their second victory in two starts over the Sebring Blue Streaks 31-0 despite numerous penalties that hindered many Lake Wales' drives. Morrow and Clark streaked for two touchdowns behind fine blocking up front. Archie Winfield completed seven out of 12 passes attempted and also took the ball over for the final score. One of Morrow's two scores was a 79-yard gallop in which he outran the entire Blue Streak team. The whole squad saw plenty of action, and very little difference was noticed between the play of the reserve teams and that of the varsity.



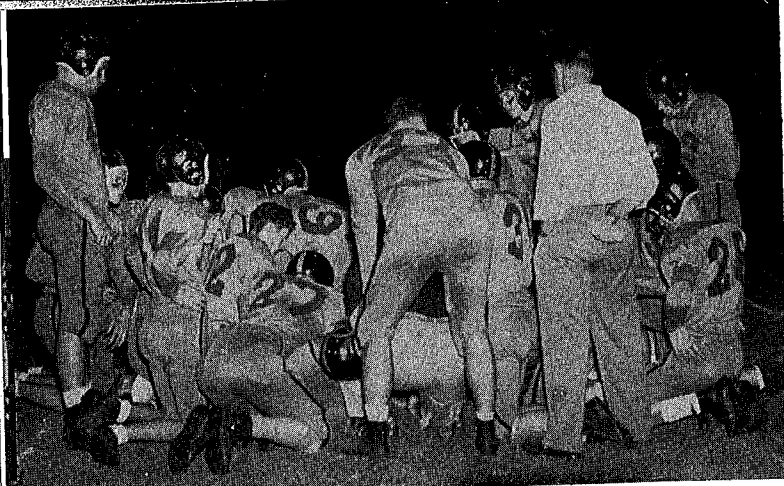
The camera catches tense players and fans during crucial moment in Sebring tilt.

There—October 14, 1949

Displaying terrific power, the Highlanders overwhelmed a highly-touted Mulberry team 33-6. The Panthers scored first after LW had fumbled deep in her own territory, but the Walesmen bounced right back with Dick Bradley flashing over the goal. The second Highlander touchdown was scored on a pass from Winfield to Ronnie Martin. Morrow out-distanced the Panthers for the third score, and Charles Brown tore through the holes made by his blockers for the last two TD's. Victory wasn't too sweet because Curtis Ammons broke his arm during the battle.

There—October 21, 1949

After waiting 40 minutes for the officials to arrive, Lake Wales defeated a stubborn Avon Park eleven 18-6. The Red Devils held the Highlanders scoreless in the first quarter, but in the second period Archie Wingfield dropped a pass into the outstretched arms of Hubert Morrow for the first six points. Credit for the second touchdown goes to Harry Wingate, Franklyn Futch, and Charles Brown, who all three fell on the pigskin in the Red Devils' end zone following a kickoff. After a series of line plunges, Dick Bradley broke loose for 15 yards and a touchdown in the last quarter to end the scoring for the night.

Here—October 28, 1949

Winning easily over Auburndale 44-0, the Highlanders stretched their winning streak to five straight victories. "Wrong Way" Bradley received a punt and ran it back 60 yards for the first marker in the second quarter, and a few minutes later Clark took the ball across for the second TD. Charles Brown and Archie Wingfield scored quickly for the Walesmen in the last half, and for the second time this season the Highlanders scored by kicking off to the other team. This time Bradley managed to beat everyone else to the loose pigskin. Russell Zimmerman and Pete Jones concluded the Highlander scoring.

Here—November 4, 1949

By knocking over the previously undefeated Frostproof squad 32-0, the Highlanders gained undisputed first place in the Ridge Conference. "Wings" Clark was out in front in scoring with two touchdowns, followed by Coffman, Wingfield, and Jones with the other three. Emerson Pooser was on the receiving end of several of Wingfield's passes that set up the first two touchdowns. Elwood Parker was a defensive mainstay along with Jimmy Alexander and Dick Arendsen in the line. King Sprott, Frank Wilkinson, and Scott Smith opened up gaping holes for the backs to run through during the entire game.



There—November 10, 1949

Running up against an out-of-conference team for the first time, Lakes Wales received their initial defeat of the season 24-6, at the hands of the Winter Haven Blue Devils. The lone score for the Highlanders was made by Forrest Smith, who along with Arlie Richards played inspired ball after Wingfield and Morrow were injured. The Highlanders threatened to tie the score in the fourth quarter but fumbled it away. Despite the loss, there were a few bright spots. Vernon Vickers starred at defensive guard while Jimmie Allen held the Blue Devils back on plays attempted over his position.

There—November 18, 1949

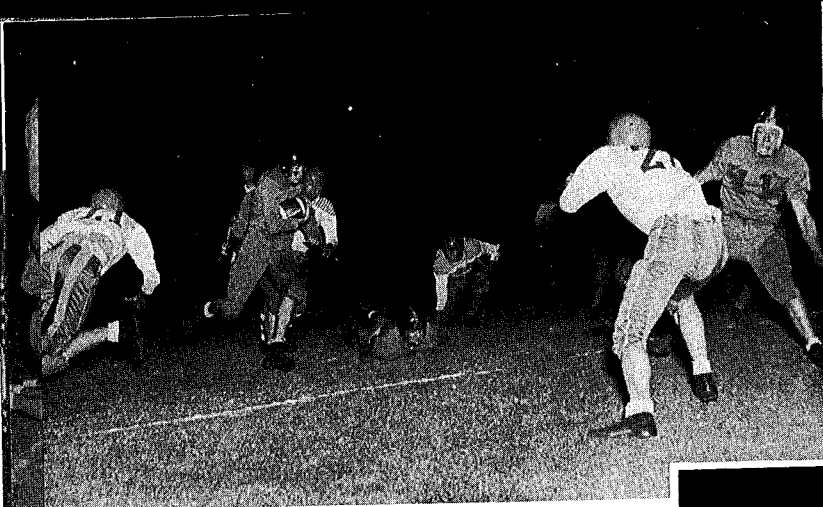
Cinching the Ridge Championship in the last 45 seconds of play on a pass from Wingfield to Morrow, the Highlanders edged the Kathleen Red Devils 18-13, in the most thrilling game of the year. The scoring was Morrow all the way as he carried the ball across for all three touchdowns. The fireworks didn't start until the second half as neither team could muster enough punch to carry the pigskin over. Clark threw to Morrow for the first six points, and then in the last five minutes of the final quarter, Morrow completely reversed his field and ran 49 yards for a TD and later received the pass that won the game AND THE RIDGE CROWN.

That ole jinx did it again! Haines City spoiled the Highlander Homecoming by defeating them 25-14. The Hornets were in complete control of the game all four periods. Clark streaked over for the first marker, and Morrow on a beautifully executed screen-pass play accounted for the other. Tommy Lasseter booted the extra points square between the uprights. The locals made much of their yardage through the air as the opposing line refused to budge. On several occasions Lake Wales threatened to score but was always stopped within the Haines City 20-yard line.

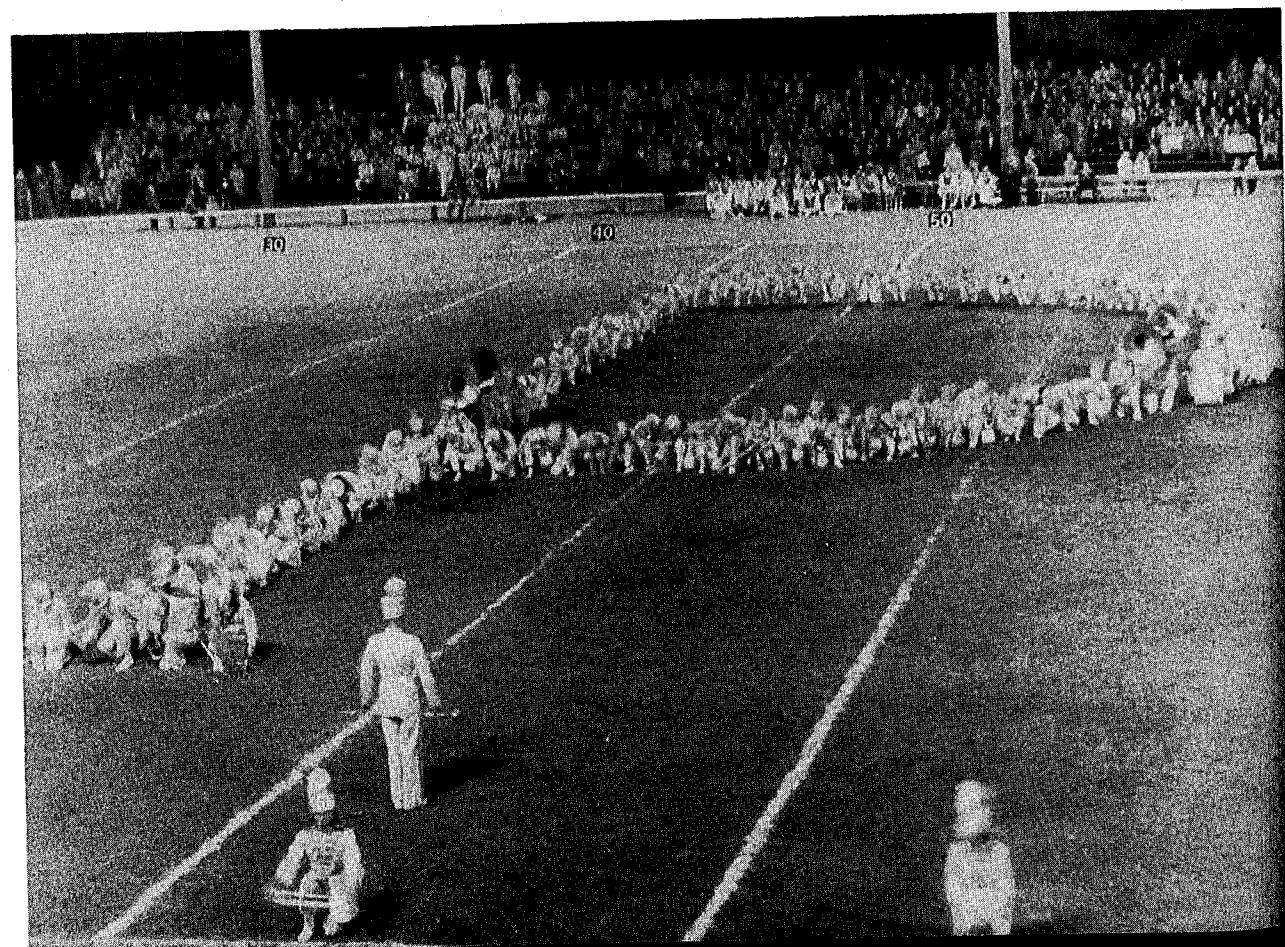
Here—December 2, 1949

To wind up a successful football season, the Highlanders won a hard fought battle from the Bartow Yellow Jackets 12-0. As in previous games, Lake Wales' main strength was in the air. Wingfield spotted Bradley for two touchdowns on delayed pass plays. John Burgess and Bill Wilkinson repeatedly stopped the Bartow backs from their linebacker posts. This game also marked the tenth straight time that the Highlanders received the ball on the opening kickoff, a feat that may never be duplicated. With a record of eight victories and two defeats and the Ridge Championship to boot, Lake Wales' football for 1949 ended.

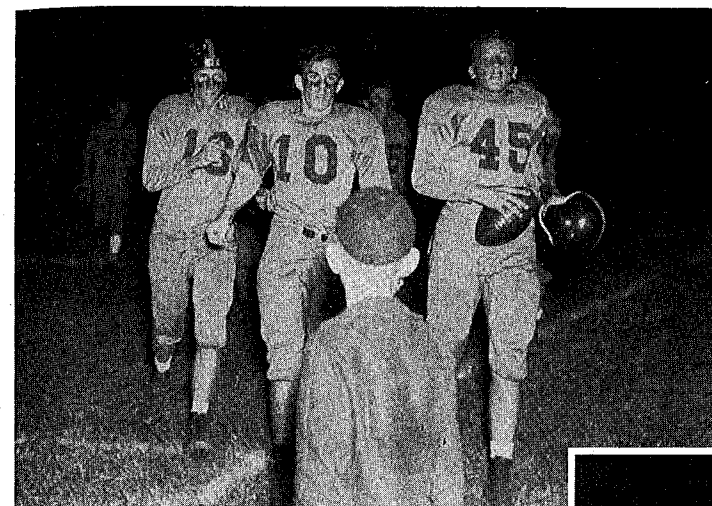


Tight squeeze as two Yellow Jackets monkey-pile Morrow.

SUMMARIZING THE SEASON

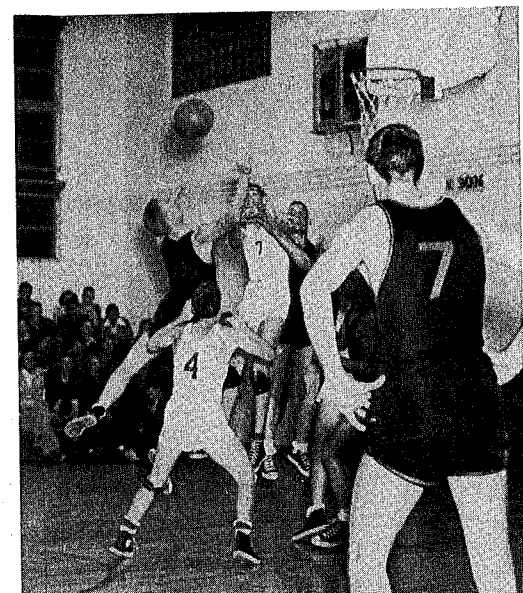

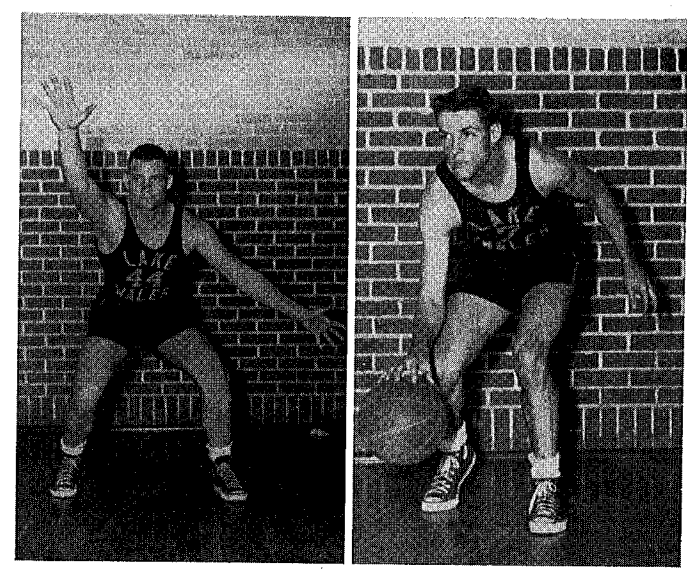

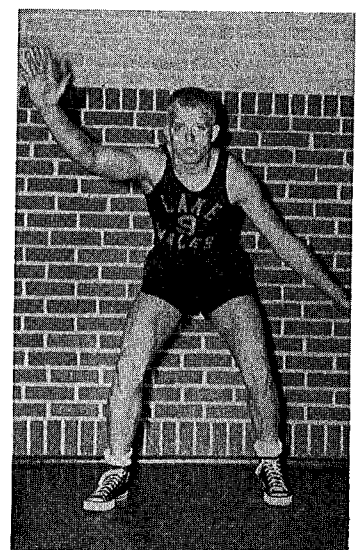

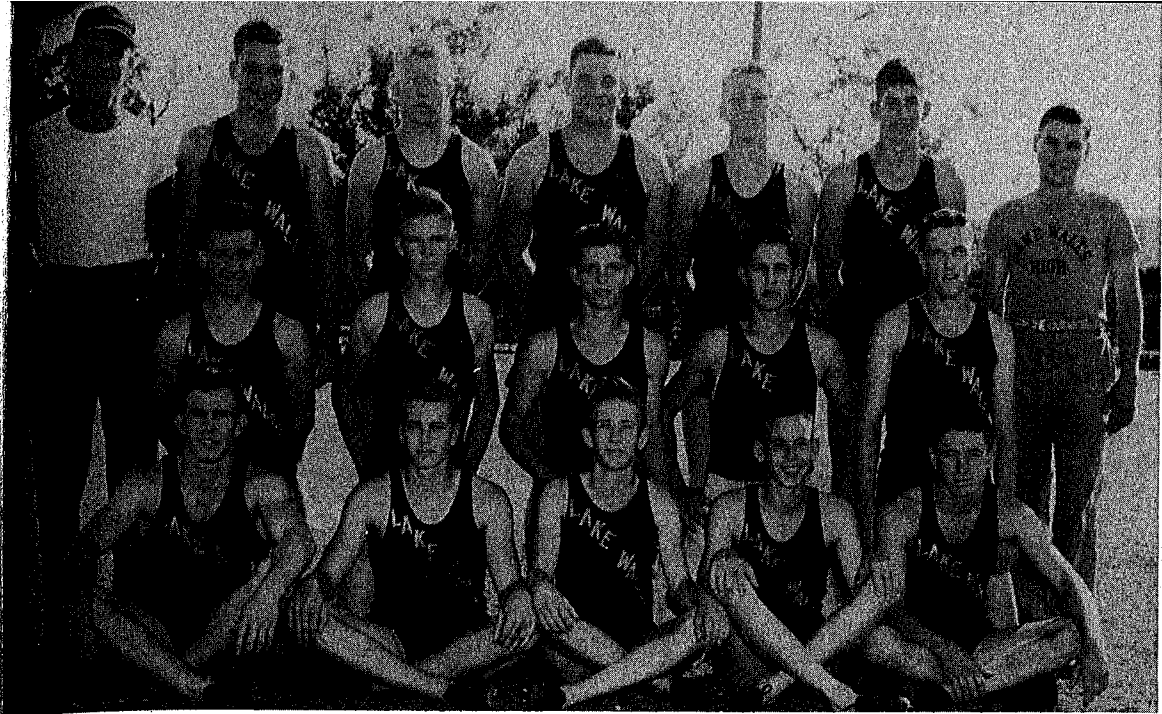

KEY CLUB

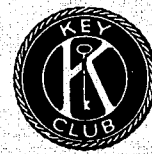
