Is It Worth It?

I recently reread the book "Worth It" by Brian Simmons. In

it, He makes a case for Christian education. He believes that there is a real battle for the hearts and minds of children and that the home, the church, and the school need to work together to support children's growth and development. Below I have italicized several points that stuck out to me.

1. Christian schools are committed to helping students achieve their full, God-given potential.

I believe that if teachers don't start with the premise that children are knitted together in their mothers' wombs and are fearfully and wonderfully made (Psalm 139:13-14), they won't be able to see them as God's children. They won't recognize that God has given different talents, bents, and purposes to be used for Him. There are some wonderful Christian teachers in public schools who do view children in this way, but they are still hampered by the restrictions placed on Christianity in public schools.

Christian schools are able to provide a Christ-centered education. The integration of Biblical principals throughout all disciplines allows students to know and realize God's design in science, his order in mathematics, and

Gracia Burnham Speaks at NC

On Thursday, September 12th, Gracia Burnham spoke in both the elementary and secondary chapels. Burnham was a missionary in the Philippines for 16 years. In 2002, she and her husband took a trip together. While on this trip, they were taken captive by a Muslim group that held them as prisoners for a year. Through many fights and fears, Burnham

survived. Unfortunately, near the time of her release, Burnham's husband was tragically killed in a gun fight. As Burnham told her story to the students, she expressed her sadness and brokenness. Then she went on to tell the students about her journey after arriving back home. It was a journey of recovery, coping, and growth. Most of all, Burnham explained the process she faced in forgiving her captives. She explained the emotional battle and the love she felt as the forgiveness came. This message was a strong lesson on forgiveness and trust in God.

E-Groups Promote Unity & Leadership by CJ Ruybalid, senior

Last spring, as the seniors reflected on their time at NC, they voiced two regrets: First, they felt rushed in going to class immediately after chapel without getting a chance to reflect on the message they heard. Second, they felt as though they were not given enough opportunities to mentor the younger students.

This year, a solution was created to solve these two problems: E-Groups. The idea behind E-Groups is that the students will break into groups with other students of the same gender, with varied ages from Junior High to Senior. The groups meet after chapel, and group members reflect upon what they just heard and discuss it further. There's also an opportunity for group members to open up to each other and pray for one another.

The E-Groups also give the seniors the chance to mentor the other students. During the senior retreat, the seniors practiced leadership specifically for the E-groups through various games and activities. The juniors were also taken out of class one day to practice leadership skills.

On Friday, August 29, afternoon classes were shortened to allow time for an "E-Groups pre-

view." During the preview, everyone met with their group members, and they participated in several games and team-building activities.

On Wednesday, September 3rd,

This is the time of year when we specifically set aside time to give thanks. We are reminded to remember God

and to give thanks to Him. We desperately need that reminder.

When Paul wrote out his indictment of all mankind in the first three chapters of Romans, he listed two charges for which we have no excuse:

"They did not honor him as God or give thanks to him..." Romans 1:21

Our honoring God as God and our giving of thanks to him are the appropriate responses to our knowing him. In I Chronicles 16, after bringing the Ark of the Covenant to Jerusalem, David appointed men whose job it was "to invoke, to thank, and to praise the Lord, the God of Israel."

It may seem odd to try to think about giving thanks to God as your full-time job, but that is exactly what Asaph and his brothers were assigned to do. Actually, that is our full-time job as well. Paul explains it to us this way: "...give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." I Thessalonians 5:18

Our tendency to let circumstances dictate our thankfulness is one of the main reasons why we fail to do our job. Look again at David's instructions for thanksgiving in I Chronicles 16. Thanksgiving

isn't about our circumstances. It is about God: his name, his deeds, his wondrous works, his strength, his miracles, and the judgments he has uttered. The Lord reigns is a fact we are to proclaim. We are thankful that the Lord reigns "for he is good and his steadfast love endures forever." David ends his call to thanksgiving asking God to "Save us... gather and deliver us...," but why? It is "that we may give thanks to your holy name."

Enjoy this time of year, when we specifically set aside time to give thanks, but don't forget thanksgiving is not just for special occasions. Giving thanks is our full time job.


and Ye Shall Be Witnesses (chosen by alumni from 1960-1989 and directed by Mr. Sawyer).

Mr. Rich Musgrave, the new freshman Bible teacher, is no stranger to Nebraska Christian. He and his wife, Sara, first came to NC as dorm parents in the 1970s. He also taught Bible, and eventually he became the administrator, a position he held from 1981 to 1995.

The Musgraves have five children and nine living grandchildren and one in Heaven. Four of their five children graduated from Nebraska Christian.

Mr. Musgrave graduated from Rockmont College (now called Colorado Christian University) with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Bible. He also went to Moody Bible Institute, receiving a diploma in Foreign Missions, and Kearney State College (now the University of Nebraska at Kearney) with a degree in Social Science, and a Masters Degree in School Administration.

Mr. Musgrave said, "I love to teach Bible, as I taught Bible from 1973 though 1995 at Nebraska Christian, and it gives me great pleasure to be able to teach God's Word. So when Mr. Cumpston asked if I would like to teach Bible, I was more than willing to return to the classroom."

When asked how he came to know about Nebraska Christian, he had this to say, "I had graduated from Moody Bible Institute, and the summer after graduation the superintendent of Nebraska Christian asked my wife and me if we would come as boys dorm parents. We felt it would be good missionary training as we were planning to go to the mission field, so we said yes and ended up spending 22 years at Nebraska Christian."

his sovereignty and plan through history. It also changes the way we approach music, art, sports, and other activities and classes.

2. There is a distinctive, faith-based Christian dimension in Christian schools. "Christian schools, in partnership with the home and the church, are best equipped to prepare your children for living out their faith in our challenging and demanding world" (pg XIII).

Christian schools can partner with parents and churches to help build the faith in students. There are many great disciples making churches and strong families that place teaching their children Biblical truths as a top priority, but not even the best public schools can strengthen the faith of their students or encourage their walk with Christ.

3. Christian teachers in Christian schools are able to "mentor and disciple students, combine a concern for academics, for spiritual growth, and for involvement in all aspects of student life."

I enjoyed my time as a teacher, coach, and principal in public school, but I was at times frustrated that I wasn't able to teach a child's "heart." I could improve behavior and study habits at school through rewards, consequences, and relationship, but I wasn't able to share Biblical truth that might impact the whole child. We couldn't share prayer requests in class or pray with a student in times of need or anxiety. We weren't able to use scripture as the inerrant word of God. This is a big advantage of Christian schools. We are able to teach spiritual, academic, and social lessons by using scripture and prayer.

4. Christian schools are a "worthwhile investment that keeps on giving throughout your children's lives." It costs money for the privilege of sending kids to private Christian schools. Parents are paying tuition, and they also pay taxes to support the public school

I think many people ask the question, "Is it worth it?" when it comes to the financial decisions that have to be made to send children to Christian school. Society and culture are not friendly to a Christian worldview, and the number of hours a student spends in school each year are staggering and formational. Kids often adopt the values and habits of their classmates and teachers. Having peers and role models that seek the Lord helps to encourage kids' own walks with Christ.

Many people invest financially and partner to provide Christian education. Parents invest financially by paying tuition to send their children to Nebraska Christian. The staff invests in the school by being paid lower salaries than their public school counterparts. Finally, a great many others sacrifice financially to try to ensure that the cost for students and families to attend NC doesn't increase significantly. Through these supporters' financial gifts, students are granted scholarships, staff is paid, and books and supplies are purchased.

5. Christian schools are "our hope for the future."

One of the pieces of our mission statement is that we want to teach our students a Biblical worldview. You don't have to watch the news on TV very long or read much of a newspaper to know that society and the world need Christ. Christians need to be willing and able to lead. I agree with Simmons: we need to be training up our young people to make a difference for Christ in their spheres of influence.

Is it worth it? Are students worth it? Is influencing the world for Christ worth it? **YES!**
