Advice for next year's seniors? "Don't leave early (even though I do). When you leave early, you miss so many activities and you miss spending time with your friends."

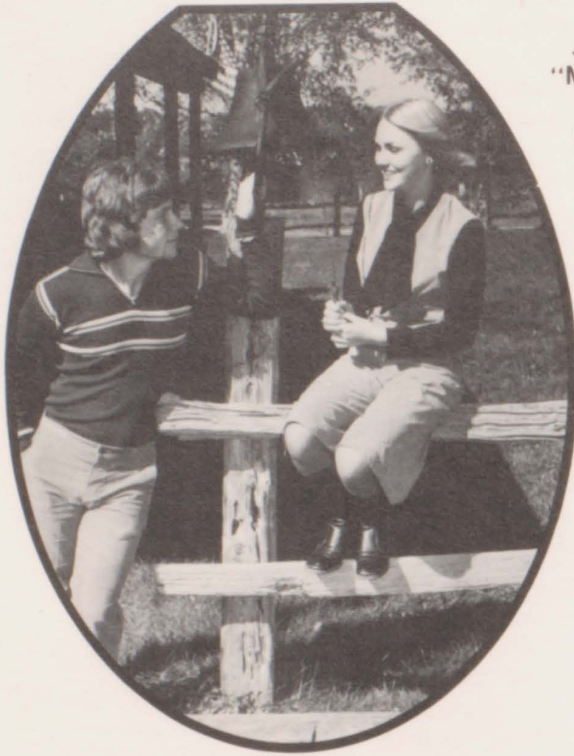
About the young lady sharing his honor, Tommy says that Candy is "honest and nice — in fact, she's luscious! She's just the perfect friend."

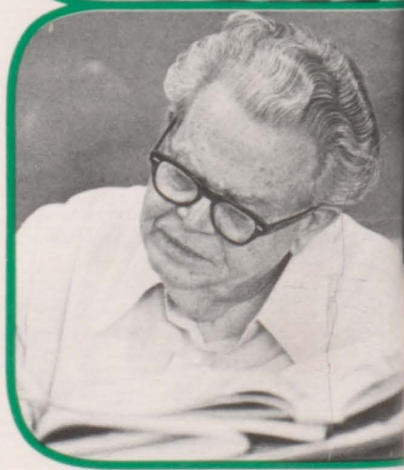


We would like to honor Mr. Woodrow Wilson by dedicating the 1978 **Plateau** to him. Mr. Wilson was born during WWI in Wilder, Tenn., a small coal-mining town. He first desired to become a teacher at the age of ten. York Institute in Jamestown was the site of Mr. Wilson's graduation.

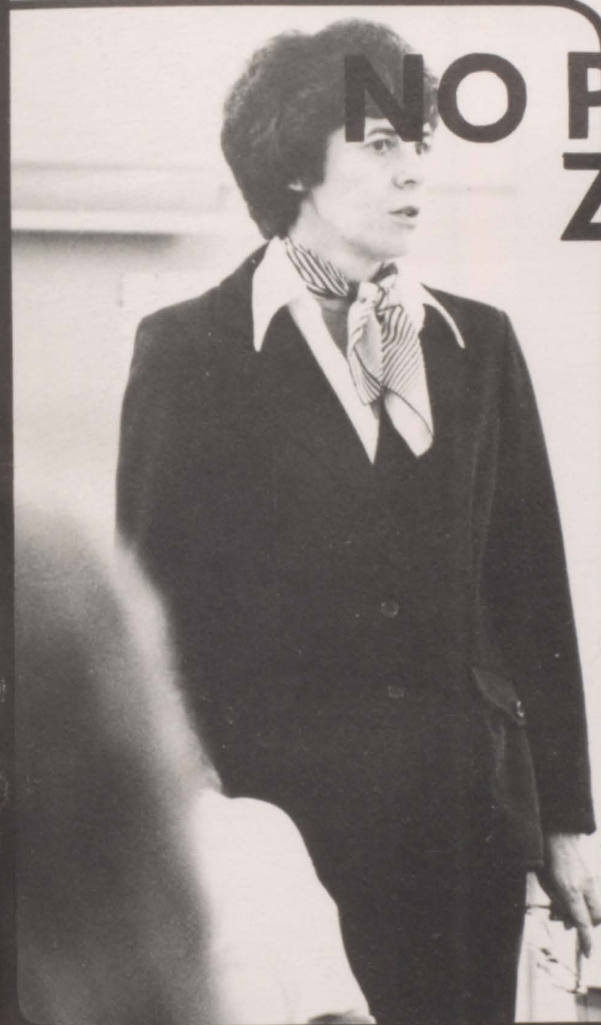
In 1939 Mr. Wilson began attending Tennessee Tech. After 2 years he received his Elementary Teaching Certificate.

A year and a half of teaching ended when Mr. Wilson served in the armed forces for thirty-seven months. But he returned to Tennessee Tech and later to Peabody College to receive his Master's Degree in history.

Mr. Wilson has stated that the greatest honor he has ever received was being named 1975 Tennessee Teacher of the Year. The end of this school year will conclude thirty-six years of educating young people for Mr. Woodrow Wilson. Hopefully, CCHS will leave fond memories in Mr. Wilson's mind, for CCHS will never forget his hard work and devotion.



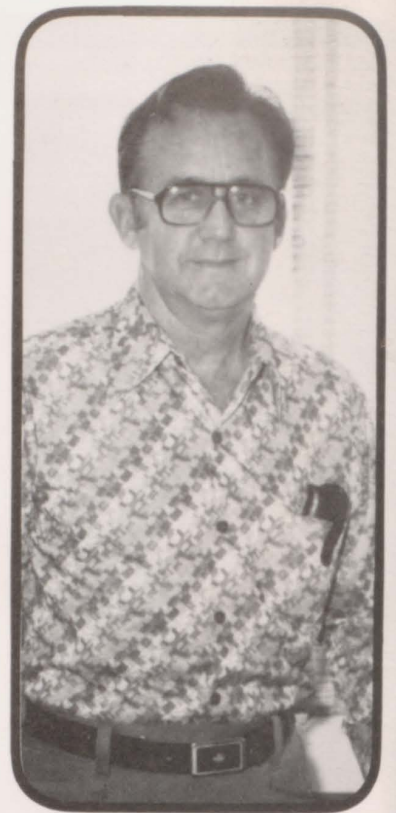

These achievements definitely show that Student Council is the very "heartbeat" of CCHS.





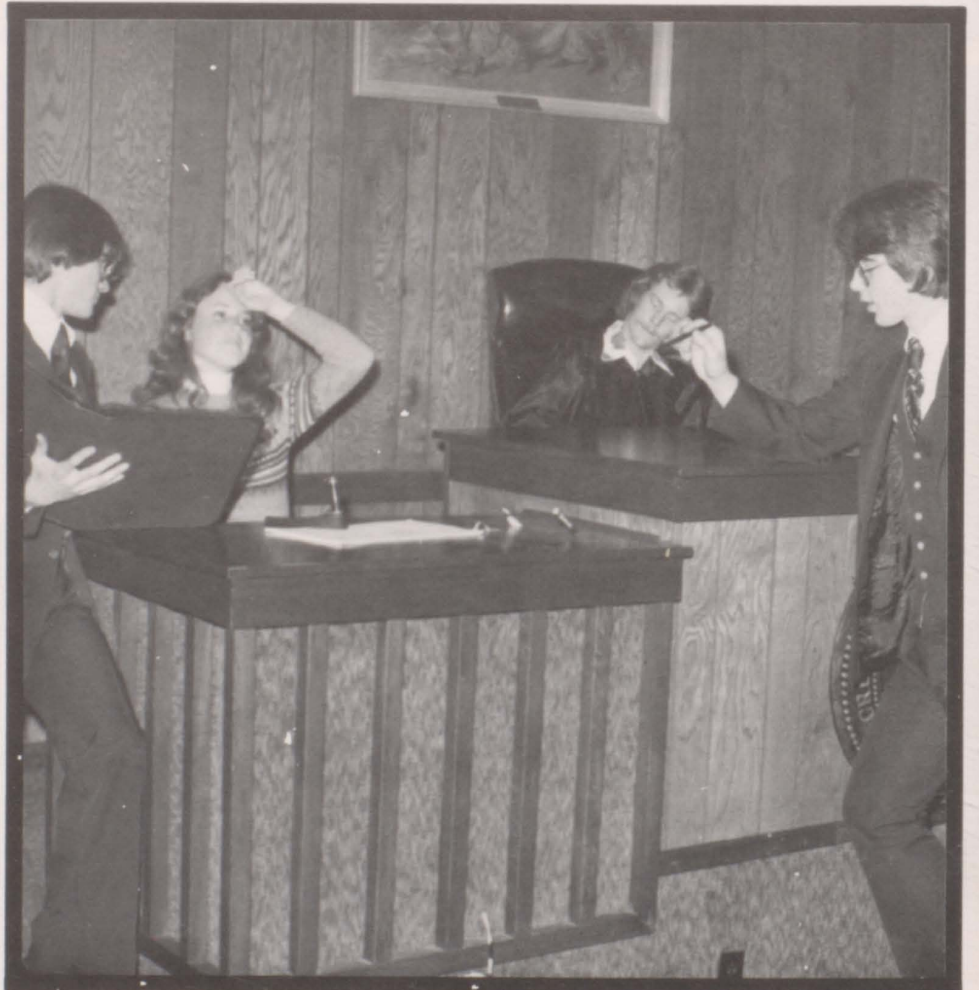

Our Jets showed an abundance of spirit during the game against the Livingston Wildcats; and highlighting the game was the traditional pinning on of the colors.



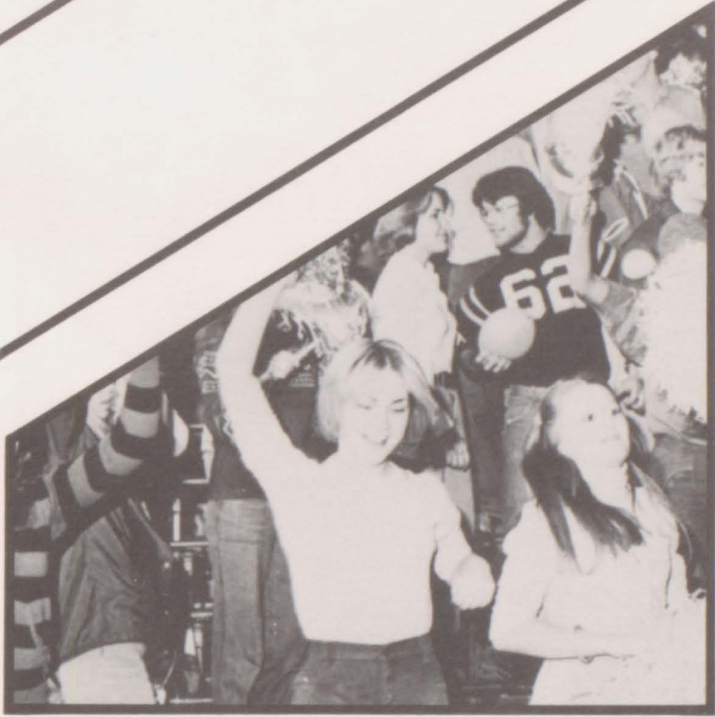

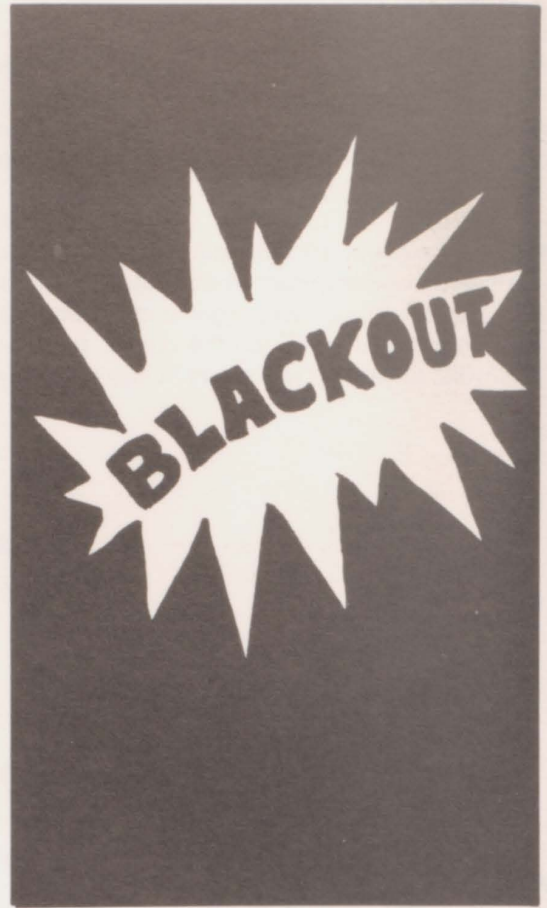


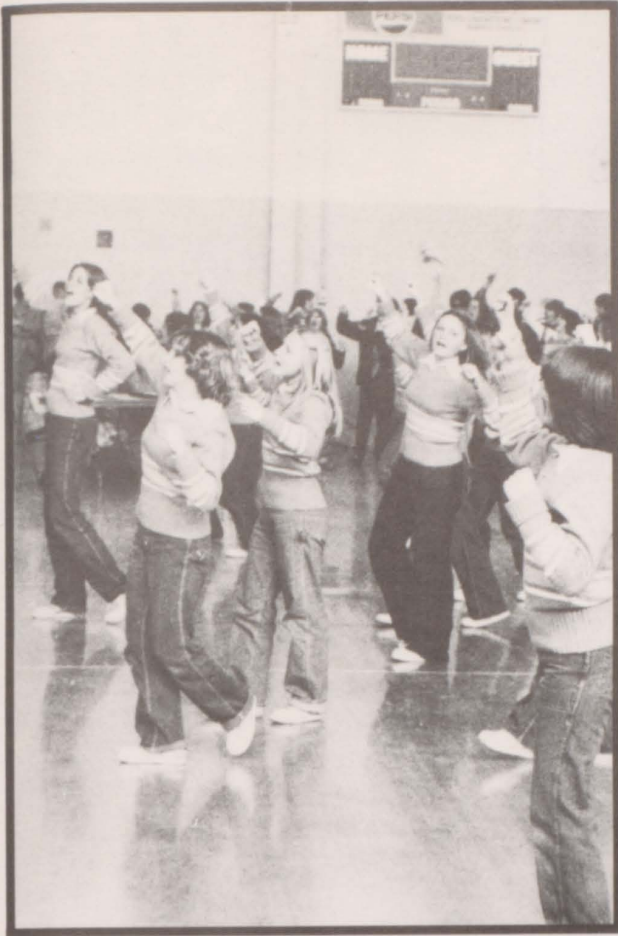

That's right! Our cafeteria ladies! And we want to take this opportunity to thank them for all their hard work and for their efforts to please us.

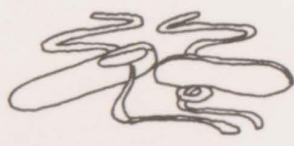
