
PARTNER'S PROM

April is Occupational Therapy Month! Occupational therapy is a service that helps individuals of all ages learn to perform necessary tasks through the therapeutic use of daily activities (occupations). School-based occupational therapists support a student's ability to engage in daily school activities including both academic and non-academic tasks. In the school setting, occupational therapy is provided when a student requires skilled therapy to fully participate in the educational environment. Occupational therapists collaborate with teachers, staff, and the broader educational team to support student success.

The department currently serves over 250 students across the county.


The middle school students found this information incredibly valuable, and we plan to expand this program to include all middle schools in the district next school year.

Social Workers Win Community Project Grant



Houston County faces challenges with homeless families, particularly ensuring that children succeed in school despite their difficult circumstances. The school system provides essential resources like school supplies, backpacks, and transportation. Many families are facing crisis situations, with limited family homeless shelters and few resources to avoid eviction or homelessness.

To address this, our county implemented a strategy offering temporary financial assistance, including short stays at motels and limited rental help. The school system partnered with Robins Financial Credit Union, which generously provided a grant for 3-7 days of motel and rental assistance. This support helped families gain temporary relief, allowing them time to access community resources and plan for their next steps.






Houston Healthcare Cooking Class

Houston County Aspiring Leaders Shine at GCASE Administrator Development Academy

Houston County educators Melanie Duncan and Kim Grizzle recently participated in the Georgia Council of Administrators of Special Education (GCASE) Administrator Development Academy, a yearlong program that prepares aspiring leaders to create impactful initiatives for their districts.

Ms. Duncan developed an Alternate Access Resource Library to support teachers of students with intellectual disabilities, providing resources and strategies for effective instruction. This new initiative allows teachers in our ID self-contained classrooms to easily access a Google site where they can explore available resources and submit a Google form to request instructional materials for their classrooms. In addition, we've partnered with students from the Transition Academy to assist in the process by helping to create and fulfill orders.

Ms. Grizzle created a Co-Teaching Training Program to enhance collaboration between general and special education teachers, fostering an inclusive learning environment.

Both educators presented their projects at the Spring GCASE Legal Issues Conference, and their efforts have had a far-reaching impact. Inspired by their work, two teacher leaders from Troup County are now planning to create a center modeled after the Lindsey Student Support Center.
