Big Idea: What makes a national treasure?

Ask your child how this week's reading selection helps him or her answer this question.

This week's reading selection: Our Constitution

Summary: After the war for our independence was won, our new country was in desperate need of a strong and effective government. Delegates believed that a new constitution, or written plan for government, was essential to the survival of the country. But could the states agree on how this new government should operate?

DISCUSS with your child the importance of the Constitution and the Bill of Rights.
