Black History Month: Chemics, this is the final week of Black History Month and your last chance to win a prize with the weekly quiz. Congratulations to last week's winner, Zander McQuaid, who will be receiving a Taco Bell gift card. We start this week's history in 1969, with Curt Flood who was a star centerfielder for the St. Louis Cardinals. He won seven Gold Glove awards from 1963-1969 and helped lead the Cardinals to three National League pennants and two World Series titles. Under baseball's reserve clause at that time, players were stuck with a team until they were traded to another or released. Players had no say in the matter, nor could they negotiate with other teams or seek better conditions. This was especially restrictive for Black players, who experienced awful segregation and discrimination while playing, from racist teammates to dehumanizing rules, like not being allowed to dress with the white players, or have their uniforms cleaned by the team's cleaners. Flood sacrificed his baseball career when he challenged the unfairness of baseball's reserve clause when he filed a lawsuit in 1969 against Major League Baseball which laid the groundwork for free agency and demonstrated how the fight for players' rights connected to broader civil rights struggles.

Girls Bowling: On Friday, the Varsity girls bowling team was in Grand Blanc to compete for 2 spots at states next weekend. The Lady Chemics averaged 148 over 8 baker games to put themselves in 5th place going into the team games. The first team game they came out hot with their best game of the year of 831 followed up by a 697 to finish the hardest region in the state in 5th place.

Saturday brought the Singles competition where 60 girls battled for 7 spots and a trip to Thunderbowl Lanes to compete at States. After 6 games and 3 hrs. of bowling Brooklyn Sutter averaged 195.5 with games of 193-201-195-214-204-166 for an 1173 series and a 2nd place finish. This will be the 3rd year in a row Brooklyn has qualified. Congrats Brooklyn! Zoey Sequin Finished 18th with high games of 193-199-187-and 177. Boys Bowling: The Chemic Boys bowled their regional today at Grand Blanc Lanes. 12 teams competed 4 of the teams were currently ranked in the top 10 in the State. Format for regionals were 8 baker games and 2 team games. The Chemics started off with 1548 for the 8 baker games, having high game of 234. The team games Chemics shot 1065 and fell off last game with 918. Total combined pins 3531. The Chemics as a team averaged 196.166 and finished 5th out of the 12 teams.
