
District Leadership Changes: There will be new superintendents in four of the fifteen ESU 9 member school district next year. It has been a pleasure working with all of these individuals.

The incoming school leaders for next year are: Matt Gordon, Giltner; Chris Prososki, Hastings Public Schools; Josh L Lawrence-Nelson; and Jason Cline, Sutton. We look forward to working with these individuals.

The United States Department of Education: The United States Department of Education (USDE) was founded by Congress in 1979. In January of 2025, the department employed just over 4,200 people. As of mid-April, the departm just over 2,000 employees remaining. The main functions of the USDE include administering federal financial aid for and universities, civil rights enforcement, data collection and research, policy development, distributing federal educa funding to K-12 schools, and supporting special education services and IDEA programs.

Proponents of the reduction in force feel it will increase local control, reduce federal bureaucracy, and simplify compli Opponents fear it will remove civil rights protections, diminished support for special education, disrupt federal financia and reduced educational equity. Whether the department is closed entirely or not, the reduction in staff alone is boun impact services. This will increase the responsibilities at the state level. While there are obviously a lot of unknowns a point, I do believe Nebraska will step up to try to maintain the integrity of civil rights protection and will continue to support needs students to a high degree. I am not confident that will be the case in all states. We will be watching this situation closely as it unfolds.

Continued Growth: ESU 9 continues to see increases in requests for services. All of our departments, special service professional development, technology, and finance have experienced growth again this year. This is to meet the incre requests for services from our member school districts. Our Title 1C program has also been a source of continued grover the last several years. In all, our number of employees has grown from 38 in the 2018-2019 school year to 72 in 2025. I believe the quality of programs, reliable service provided, and excellent staff are the main reasons for that grc Thank you for your trust and confidence in ESU 9.



It's been another fun year, with many valuable interactions to support our schools and their students. I'm proud of the accomplishments of our staff and organization. Two new initiatives in place for the coming year include the Comprehensive Behavioral Academy (CBA) and the Literacy Project. I'm excited to see what the 2025–26 school year in store for us!

As I am writing this article, the <u>NETA</u> Conference for the year is drawing to a close. I've had the privilege of not only attending, but also speaking at the annual technology conference more than 20 times throughout my career. (Usually presentations are pretty nerdy, so I won't bore you with a link to the slides.) As I reflect on this year's conference, it's to note several themes over the years:

- Keynote speakers share new and interesting statistics and facts. This year, Adam Welcome remarked the one of the most common first words of babies is "Alexa." He's from Silicon Valley, so personally, I hope the local trend.
- Gadgets draw us in. From Leslie Fisher's recurring presentation simply titled "Gadgets" to the vendors both
 peddling and giving away something previously unseen, it's easy to be drawn into discussions about anything
 new.
- The next generation will be different because.... From Apple's "Think different" posters and related professional development years ago, to computing devices that store everything in the cloud, to voice activat "smart" things, to artificial intelligence, today's students are not afraid of the things that represent significant change to us. Adults may choose to change or not, for legitimate reasons or simply a desire not to adopt the technology. 




ESU 9 was pleased to offer 28 professional development events for Speech Language Pathologist, Early Childhood Teachers, Special Education Teachers and Transition Teachers.


