# Head of School Address



"Girls' school students are more likely than their female peers at coeducational schools to experience an environment that welcomes an open and safe exchange of ideas."

*"Ninety-nine percent of students at girls' schools expect to earn a four-year degree. More than 2/3 expect to earn a graduate or professional degree."* 

"The overwhelming majority of girls' school students strongly agree that they feel supported at their schools: 95% feel supported by their teachers (compared to 84% of girls at coeducational public schools), 90% report feeling supported by other students (compared to 73%), and 83% feel supported by their school administrators (compared 63%)."

Pathway Arts

Media Arts is the largest growing sector of the arts, thus Media Arts at SMA similarly expanded this 2022-23 school year. The Multimedia class is a project-based course driven by student interests in storytelling, video production, and animation. Students produce creative projects both collaboratively and individually throughout the year. As part of the course, students learned Toon Boom Animation Storyboard Pro software to help plan and storyboard their ideas. Several of our students took the Toon Boom Animation certification exam in May and passed and are now certified in this industry-standard software!

In January, the Multimedia class received its most exciting commission yet – learning scriptwriting by taking part in a six-week residency with the Skirball Cultural Center. Each year, the Skirball facilitates an in-school residency program that encourages students to engage with issues that



are important to their lives. By using art as a tool for action, residency students ignite their selfconfidence, imagination, and sense of agency. The class worked with the Skirball educator, Anna Lund, who is trained as both an actor and scriptwriter, to create work centering on conversations held around a table. Students worked in groups to learn scriptwriting, how to properly format a script, to give and receive constructive feedback, and to rehearse reading their scripts aloud. Students produced seven original scripts for 10-minute plays, which were then presented to a live audience at the Skirball in their culminating presentation. It was such an honor to be selected for this residency and we hope SMA will be able to collaborate with the Skirball again in the future!

The St. Mary's Academy Engineering Career Pathway (ECP) ensures students are prepared for success in science, technology, engineering and mathematics through rigorous college preparation, project based learning and mentorship with professionals in engineering and STEM related fields. Our partnership with Architecture Construction and Engineering (ACE) Mentor Program helps support the ECP goals. Professionals in the architecture, construction, and engineering fields come to campus to mentor SMA students.

Each year as part of the program ACE hosts a Build Day. On Build Day the students get to experience a microcosm of building a real structure. Students are responsible for reading plans, planning the construction, building, painting, and fixing any mistakes. This year, the SMA team designed and built a playhouse with a color scheme based on the Los Angeles NBC affiliate program *"California Live."* The design, the SMA lead mentor (Frank Ortiz), and a SMA student (Gold Tie Crystal Arrendondo) were featured on a live broadcast segment. The SMA team decided to donate the playhouse to Safe Place for Youth (SPY). This house is going to be put at The Nest---a transitional housing program designed for young people who are pregnant or parenting. We are proud of St. Mary's Academy ECP students for showing their love for "the dear neighbor without

Health Career Pathway (HCP) Gold and Green Ties have been shadowing Dr. Marcia Glenn at the Dermatology and Laser Center in Inglewood on a monthly basis this year. During their visits to her office. students have been able to interact with patients and learn from health care providers who serve our community. On their visits, students are able to observe the physician-patient dynamic, examinations for signs and symptoms of pathologies, and recommendations for treatments and procedures. They also observe how clinical trials are conducted and are able to learn about the various aspects of running a clinic. Mrs. Stephanie Gordon, Director of the SMA Health Careers Pathway states, "Dr. Glenn's passion for educating young women has been empowering and inspiring for the students of HCP. Her desire to address disparities in dermatological care has provided an example



for the type of advocacy the HCP aims to instill and develop in our future health professionals." Dr. Glenn and her team are passionate about providing the highest quality medical care to the Black and Brown patients. They are advocates for diversity in the field of dermatology and our HCP students have benefited tremendously from these experiences.

# Le Puy CSJ Pilgrimage

In *Hamilton: An American Musical*, the final verse sung by the ensemble is a series of questions posed to the audience: "Who lives? Who dies? Who tells your story?" We are the storytellers of the CSJ history. We are the embodiment of our founders, channels of their sacred charism. I fell in love with Hamilton over the pandemic and played the soundtrack on the majority of my flight to France. Naturally, several verses came to mind when I embarked on this pilgrimage that took me to explore Annecy, Le-Puy-en-Velay, Bas-en-Basset, and Lyon, sites significant to the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet. It's a pilgrimage I had my heart set on since I was 18! When I was a student at Mount Saint Mary's University, I had CSJ sisters as my professors, mentors, and even as my neighbors on campus. After I graduated from the Mount, I lived in the Medaille House of Discernment with Sisters Darlene Kawulok and Carol Brong. For nearly half of my life, the CSJs have supported me in forming my faith, nourishing my ministry, and reminding me of God's unending grace.

Many cities and stops spoke to my soul, but none more than Le-Puy-en-Velay. For years I had seen pictures of "the kitchen" in presentations. I even have a print of the kitchen right behind my desk. Nothing prepared me for physically standing in the space that was both sacred and practical. I associate kitchens with preparation, innovation (in cooking!), and family conversations. It is the space of my mom's pozole and the place where she lets my niece and nephew "help" her with a new recipe while simultaneously wreaking havoc. It is chaos and creation! For the first six sisters, it was a space to break bread, rest, pray, and process the day's ministry through Sharing of the State of the Heart. As I stood in the middle of the kitchen, it was as if time stood still. I was filled with gratitude and in absolute awe of the legacy that is still alive nearly 400 years later.

I walked away from that experience realizing how important it is to remember who we are. When we are in constant movement we run the risk of forgetting who and what brought us to this particular point in time. But if we take a moment to bask in gratitude and acknowledge the history, it makes everything more worthwhile. I urge us to continue working towards unifying love while holding close to our hearts the women who have made it possible for us to imagine, work, and minister.

# **ONWARD SCHOLARS**

Onward Scholars Supports Belles in Dreaming Big!

St. Mary's Academy is fortunate to be one of only six distinguished Catholic high schools in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles who partners with the Onward Scholars Program, united through the mission of providing scholarship, mentorship, and college access. Onward Scholars offers a unique pathway to success for exceptional incoming 9th graders who demonstrate academic excellence, impactful leadership, and motivation to Dream Big! in their college search. Michele Rice, our Program Director, has been at SMA since the program's inception on our campus in 2017.

Each year, SMA selects 12 students from a competitive applicant pool via a very comprehensive process. Scholars must have-and maintain-a 3.5 GPA and impactful leadership on campus and through community service. Through the tremendous generosity of the Smet Foundation, Scholars receive a 75% tuition scholarship over their four years, a \$2,000 stipend used to explore their academic and career interests, and join a network of high achievers who have continued to succeed in our nation's best universities. This year, 100% of graduates of the Onward Scholars program will attend a four-year university, with 63% of those institutions ranked in the top 100 in the country, including USC, University of Washington, UCLA, Santa Clara University, and UC Berkeley.

The Health Careers Program at SMA is excited to be partnering with Martin Luther King Jr. Community Hospital to provide a paid internship and mentorship program during the summer of 2023. This is the first year that the MLK Community Healthcare Career Fellows Program will be reserving two spots specifically for SMA HCP students. This program will provide HCP students with the opportunity to learn about a variety of healthcare-related careers while performing research under the mentorship of a healthcare provider.



On April 1, 2022 THE MUSES hosted SMA Belles at the 2022 Woman of the Year award ceremony at the Jonathan Club in downtown Los Angeles. The honoree was Eileen Drake and she shared her wisdom and experience with the Belles. The Belles witnessed how her leadership made an important impact on the aerospace industry and how she set a high standard for the Los Angeles community. The Belles

also got to meet Dr. Wanda Austin, a former Woman of the Year award winner and the former CEO of the Aerospace Corporation. These inspirational opportunities were supported by the Smet Foundation. The Smet Foundation partners with the Department of Catholic Schools in Los Angeles in a variety of programs that benefit students, teachers, principals, and staff in the Los Angeles area.



# **BUSY BELLES**



Students in the Health Careers Pathways participated in a field trip to Charles Drew University of Medicine and Science in November 2022. HCP students interacted with current CDU students, faculty, and staff to learn about CDU's history and mission, how the university cultivates diverse health professions leaders who are dedicated to social justice and healthy equity, and how students can apply to and get support from the university. Students spoke with professors, toured the campus facilities, and learned about the various undergraduate and graduate programs CDU offers. Students interacted with an Anatomage table, which allows them to visualize human anatomy exactly as they would on a fresh cadaver. They also toured the simulation labs, research labs, and student resource centers. Our AP 2-D Art & Design class participated in the 2023 Scholastic Art and Writing competition that was designed to identify students with exceptional artistic and literary talent. This gives our students an opportunity to receive recognition, exhibition, publication, and Scholarships. We are excited to congratulate our Red Ties Julia Acquino, Alexia Castro, Alexa Gomez, and Alison Paz Valdez as they have won 9 awards all together including 3 silver Keys. Alexa and DanYa Williams have also received Honorable mentions for the work they submitted to the California Art Education

Association for the Youth Art Month Competition. Youth Art Month encourages support for quality school art programs and promotes art material and safety.









The FIRST Robotics Competition challenges students to create a multifunctional robot that combines the excitement of sports with the rigors of science and technology based on an originally created game. Each year, judges create a new game with a new twist. Teams work towards creating a robot that completes the game objective, but also uses The FIRST Core Values to emphasize friendly sportsmanship and Gracious Professionalism: discovery, innovation, impact, inclusion, teamwork, and fun. FIRST Robotics has created a community of young, like-minded individuals who all strive for excellence and exploration of the STEM field. Congratulations to the SMA Robotics Team, the SMArt Bots. SMArt Bots, was founded in 2011 and has participated in 12 seasons and 14 events. The Junior Unity Mass is a special day where our students, faculty, and staff gather with the Blue Tie Juniors' and their families to mark the important milestone of becoming upperclasswomen. At this mass juniors have their class ring blessed. Each student was recognized as she received her blessed jewelry, a blue rose, a charm of their class saint (Mary Magdalene), and a special prayer card to commemorate the day.
