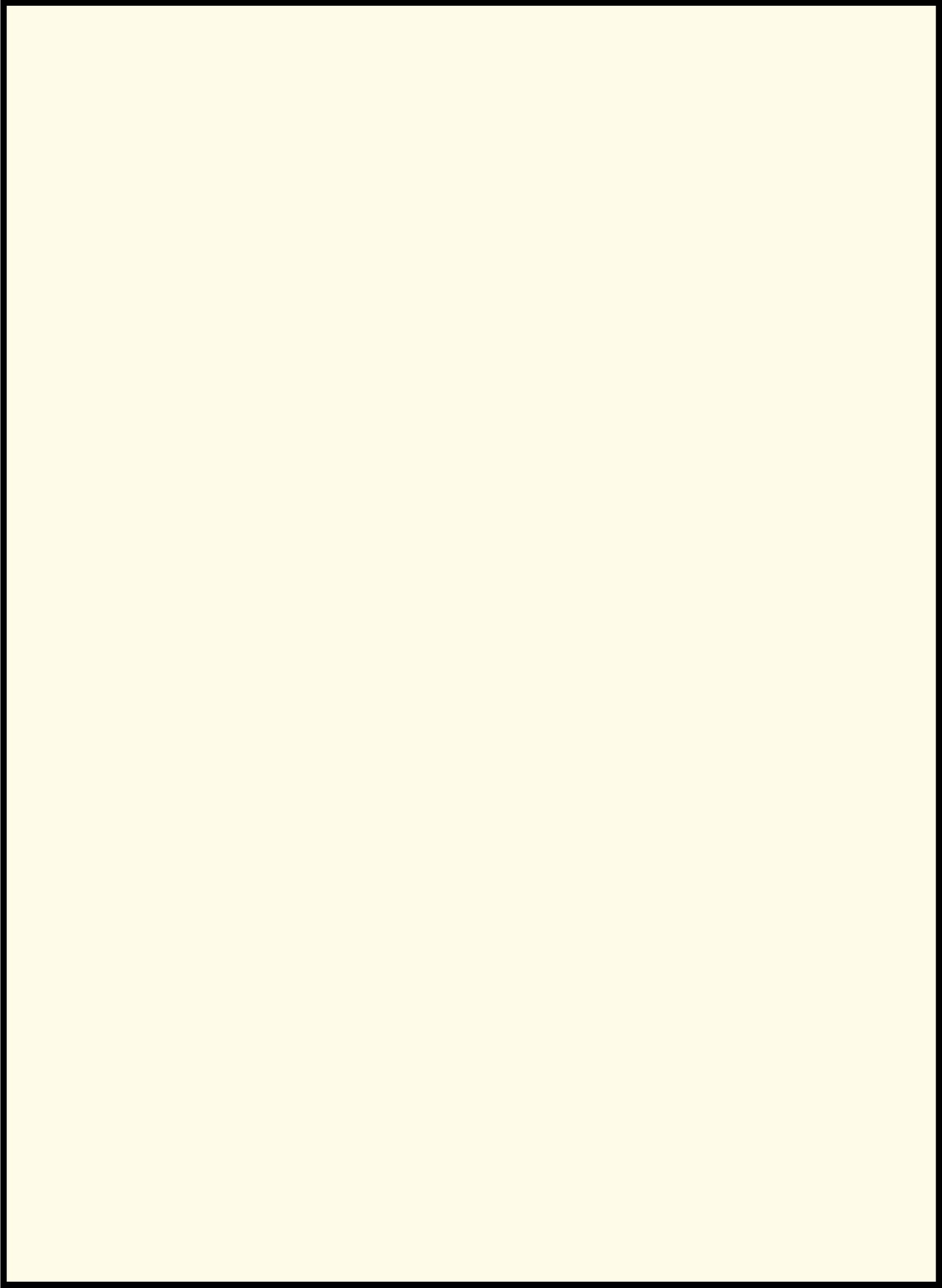

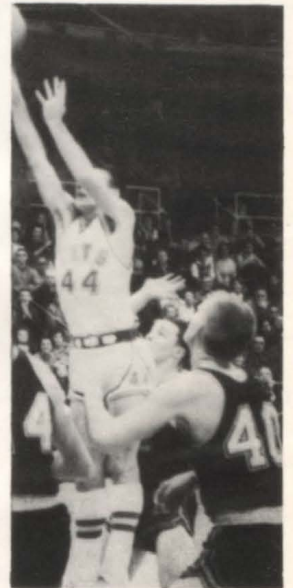

To Our Parents

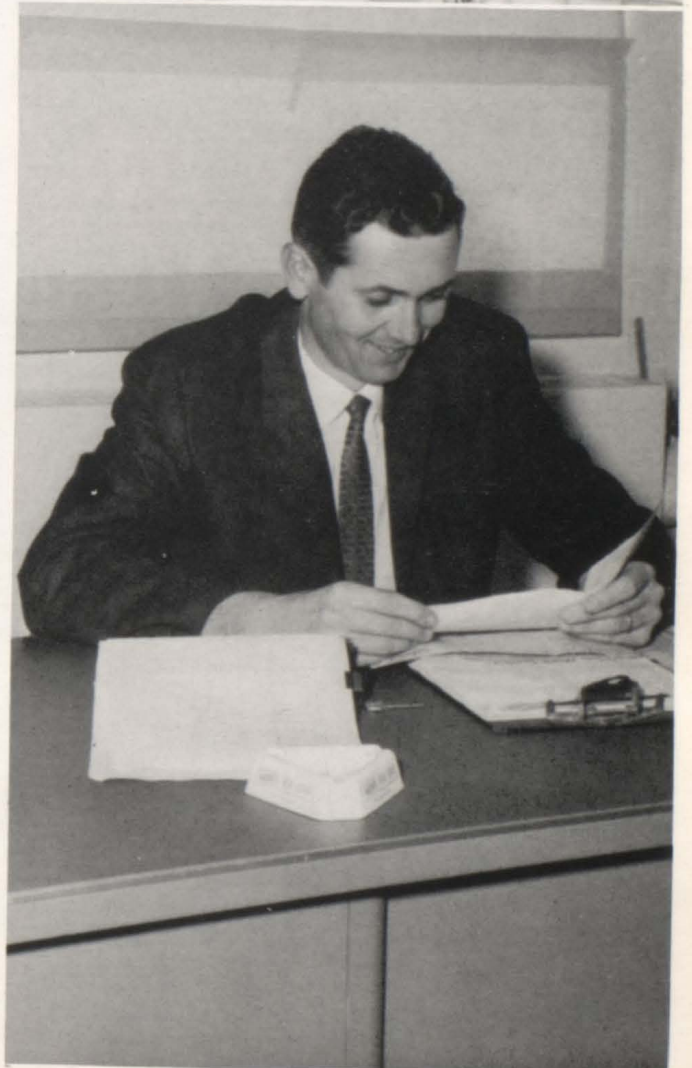

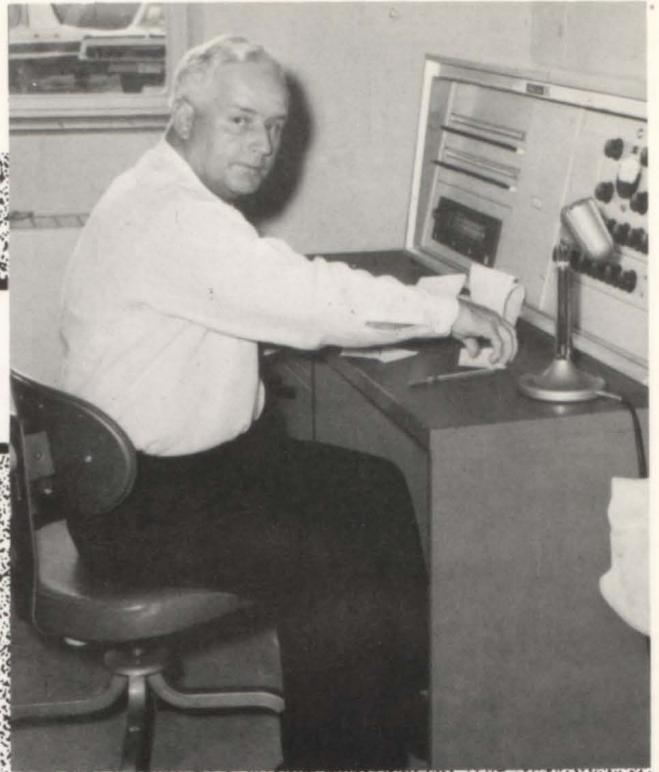


OUR PRINCIPALS

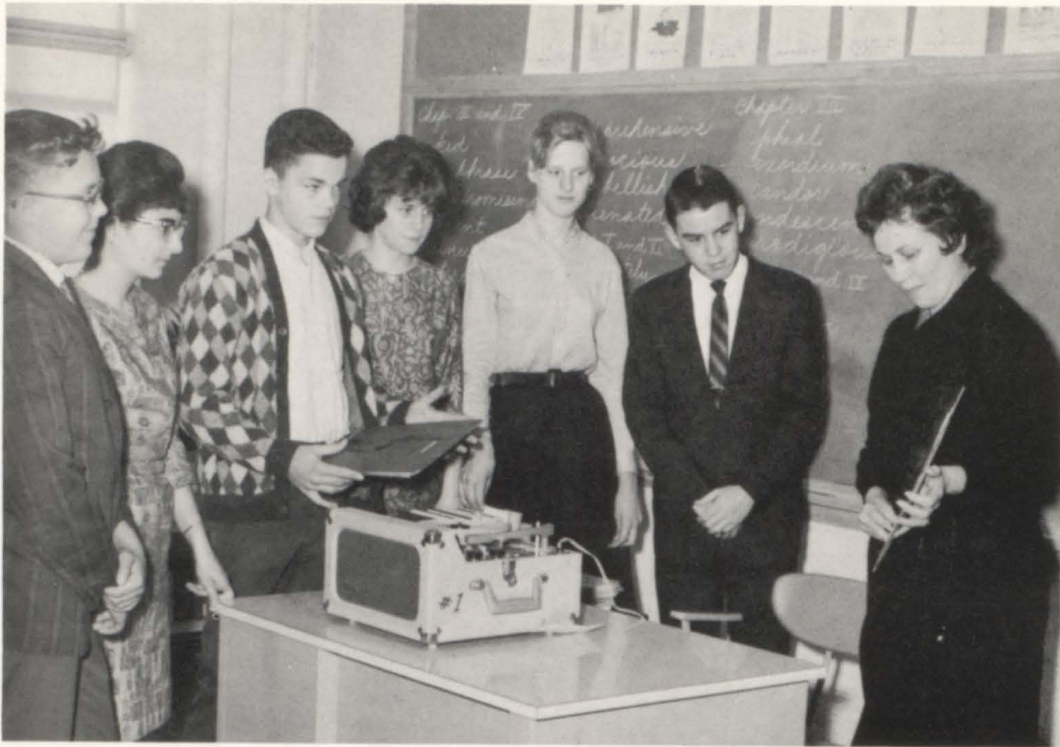

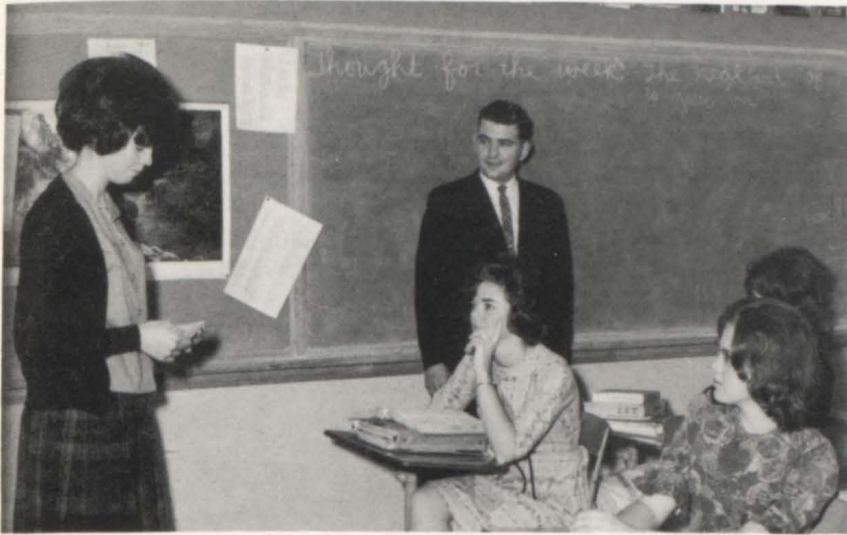

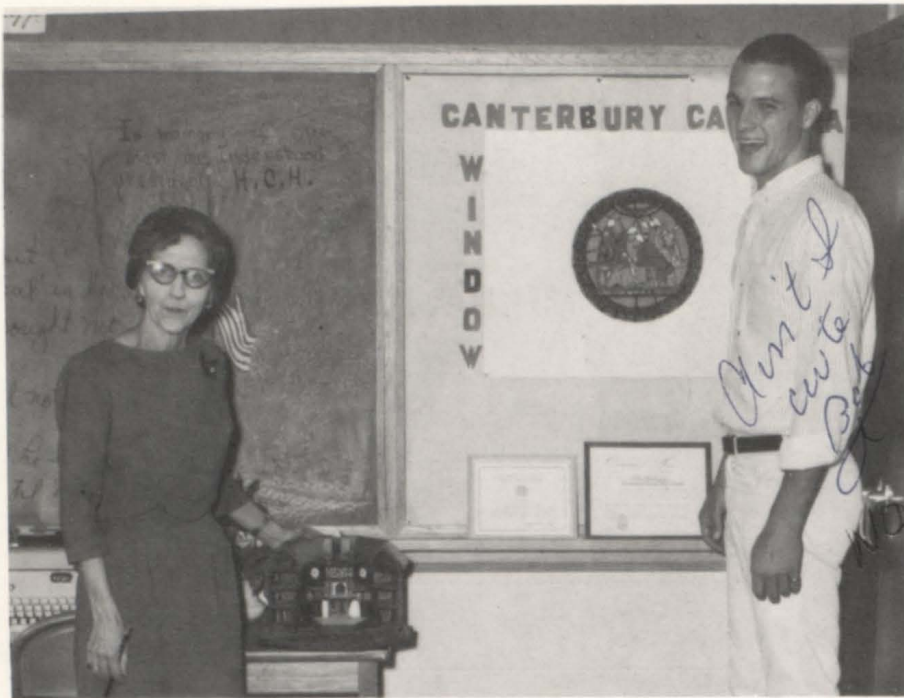

ENGLISH FOR THE NON-C.P. STUDENTS

Many of these students will go to college even though they are not in C.P. classes. It is, therefore, necessary to prepare them to do creditable work, in grammar, composition, and literature both in college, and in the work-a-day world. It is necessary to give them a cultural background sufficient to meet the needs of an intelligent person in a modern world. For those who will not further their education, emphasis is placed on reading, writing, speech, and vocabulary study. Projects and reports are also requirements of the course.

ENGLISH FOR COLLEGE PREPARATORY STUDENTS

Students are given a pre-view of college work through an accelerated program giving them a broad cultural background including Greek and Roman literature, a study of mythology, outstanding literary masterpieces of England, both early and modern, and masterpieces of world literature. Reports, projects, research, vocabulary study, motion pictures, film strips, art, and other devices are effectively used to add interest and content to the course. Students make trips intended to further their cultural interests, also. In the fall they saw *Oliver* in Knoxville, and in the spring, *Hamlet* in Cookeville. Though not mandatory, these trips enrich the lives of those who benefit by the opportunity.

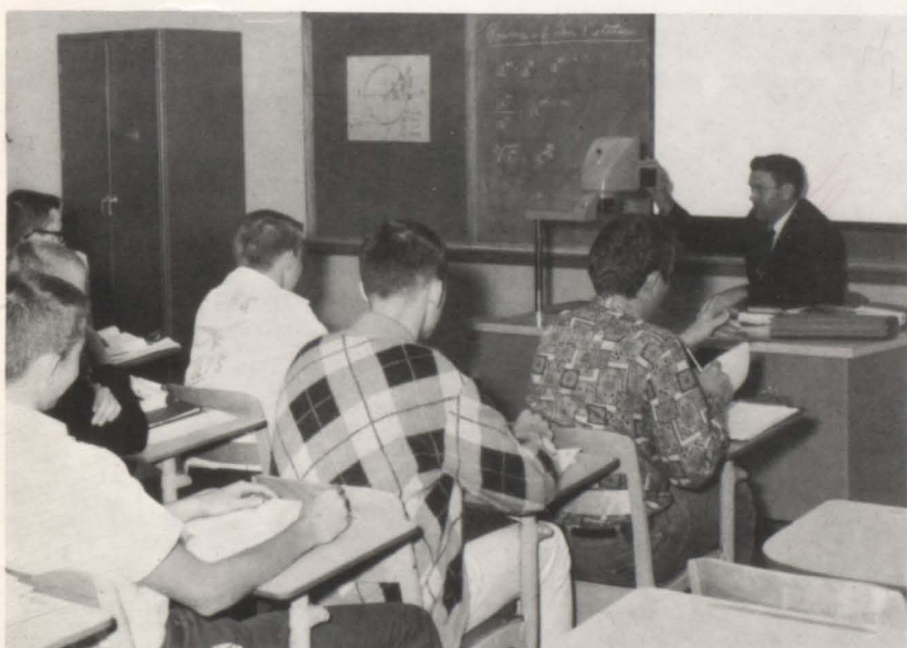

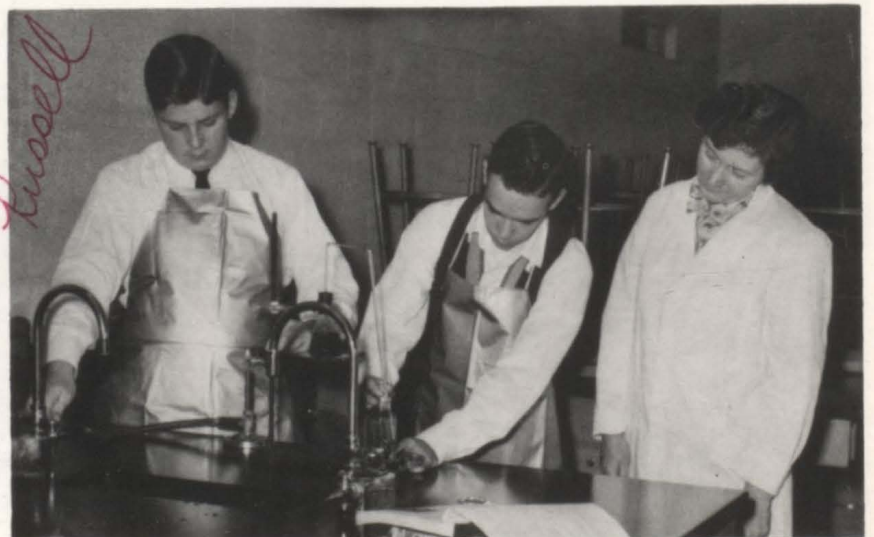

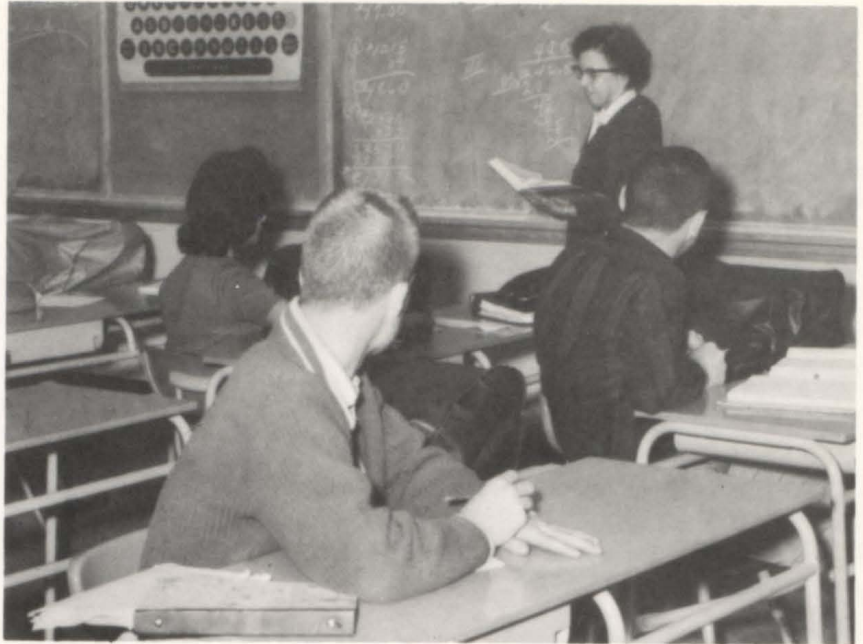

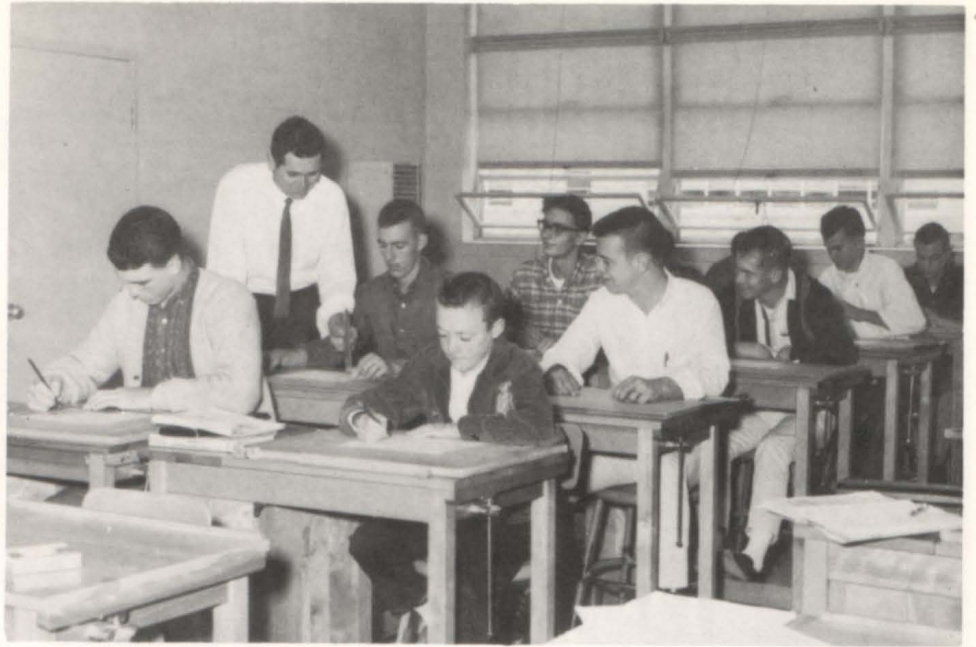

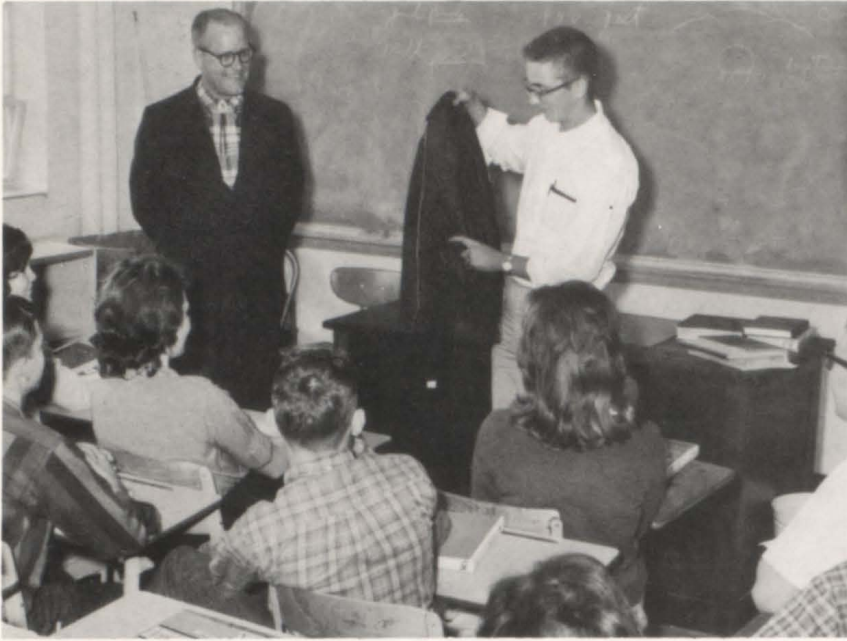

Dr. James R. Dotson, Co-ordinator of Laboratory Experiences at Tennessee Polytechnic Institute and Campus Supervisor at the Crossville, Center, explains the student teaching program:

The student teaching program at Tennessee Tech is an integral part of the total teacher education program. Through fulltime participation in a public school program, through observation of well-prepared regular teachers, and through actual instruction under supervision, the student teacher gains much in the development of a professional attitude and professional competence.

From living in a community, participating in business and church activities, student teachers grow more familiar with the total responsibilities of the teacher. Student teaching under these circumstances contributes then not only to professional development but also the production of more effective community members.

Cumberland County High School and Tennessee Tech have worked together in the cooperatively planned student teaching program for three years.

During this time, student teachers representing a wide range of academic areas, have lived in the community and assisted in the planning and implementing of the student body. The faculty of Cumberland County High School has been essential to success. We have received this aid and cooperation from all concerned. The students at Cumberland County High have reacted well to the student teachers, keeping discipline problems and instructional problems to a minimum. The teachers have accepted their student teachers as professional equals and have provided the necessary freedom and supervision to allow creativity and individual initiative while also providing a sense of security and support.

This year has been an excellent one for student teachers in Crossville. Their evaluations of your school and your people have always been highly positive. For the future I can only anticipate increased co-operation, growing understanding, of the mutual responsibilities involved in our joint program, and increasing benefits for Cumberland County High School, Tennessee Tech's Student Teaching Program, and the teaching profession.

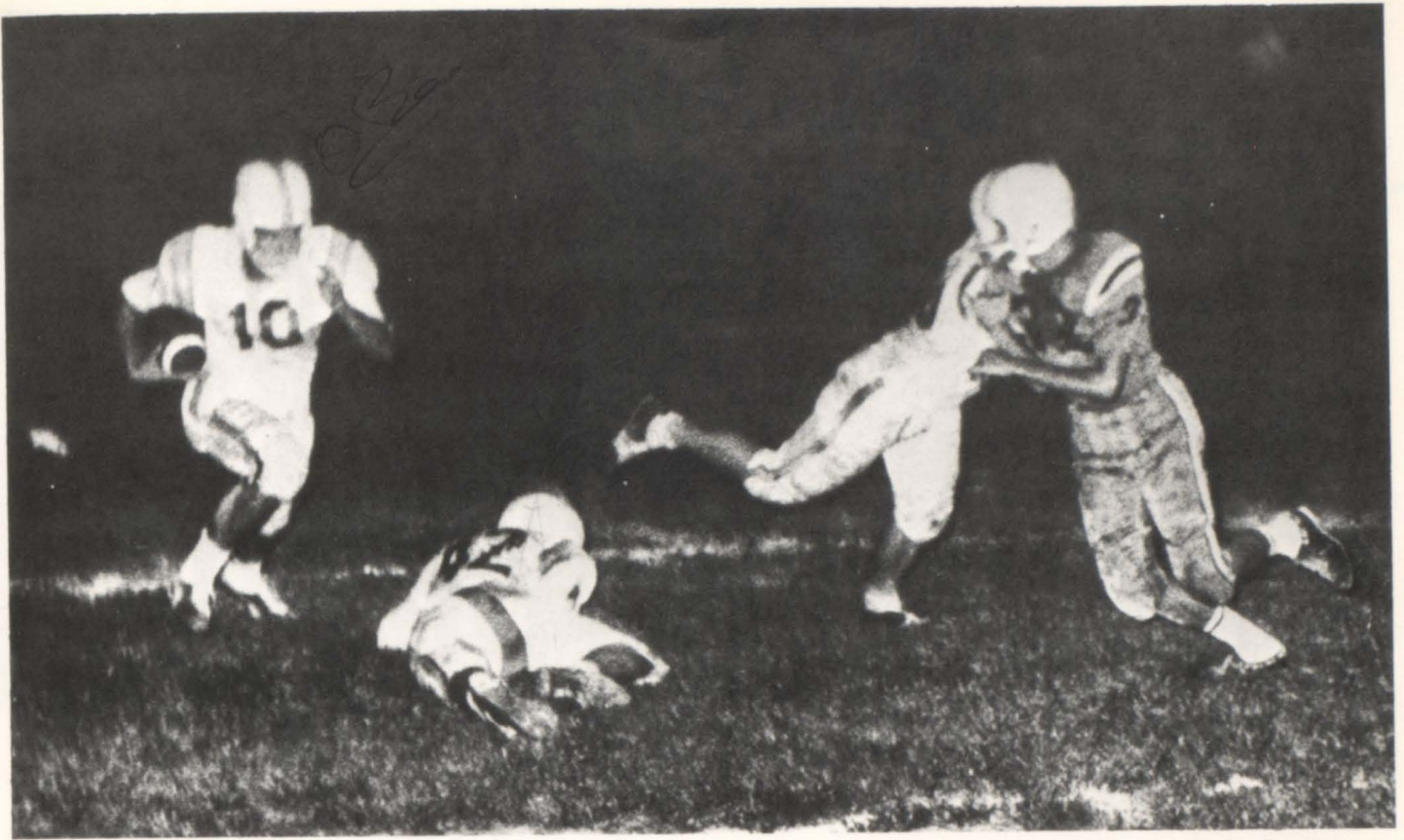

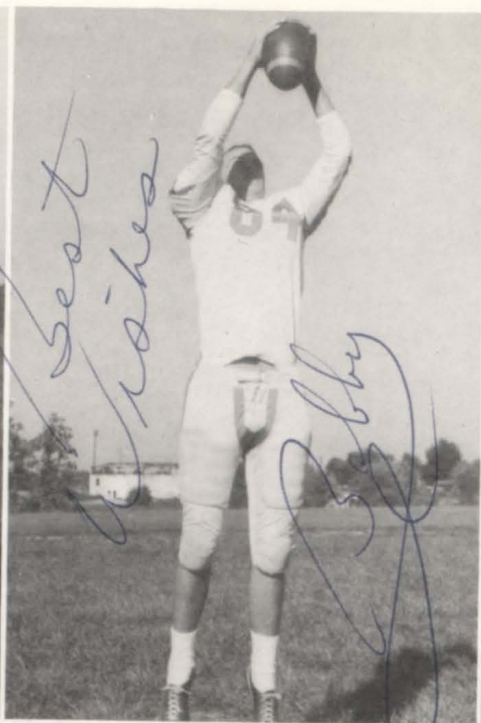

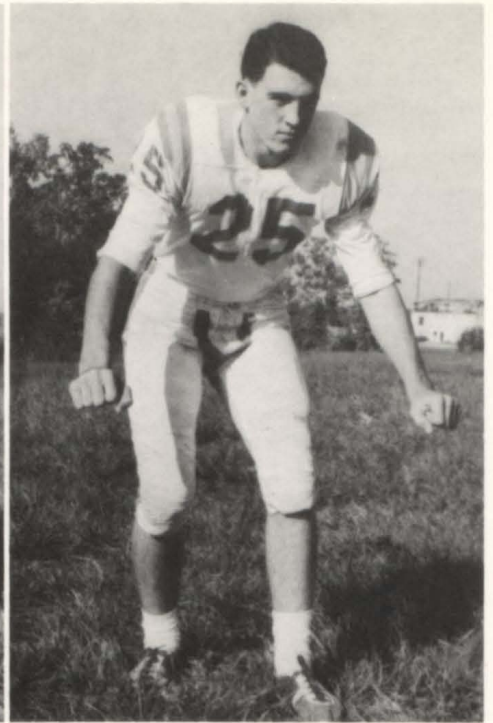

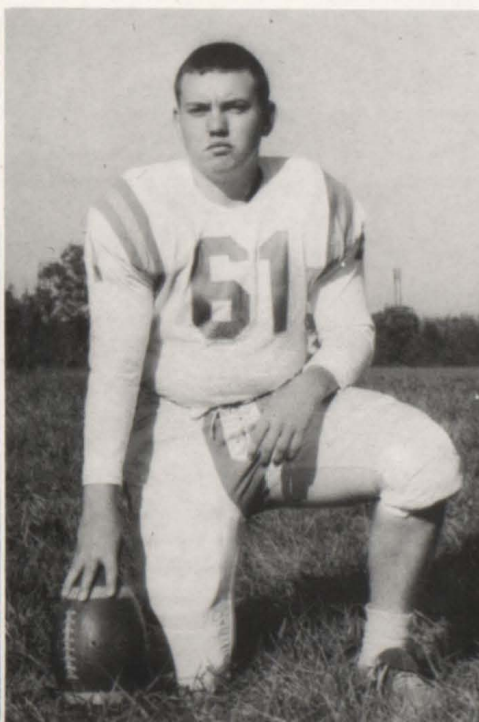

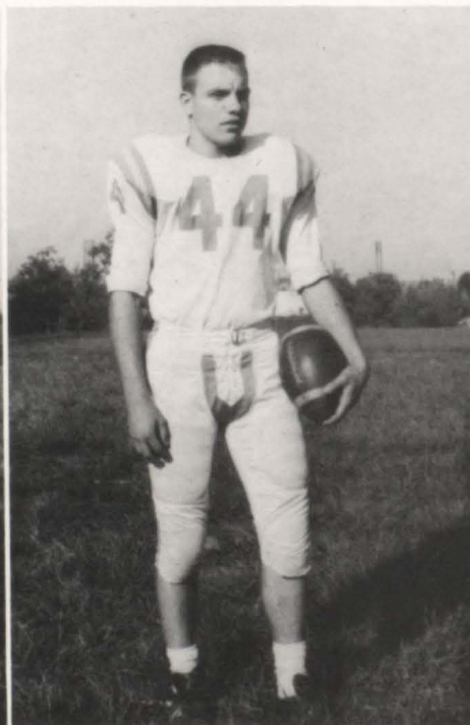

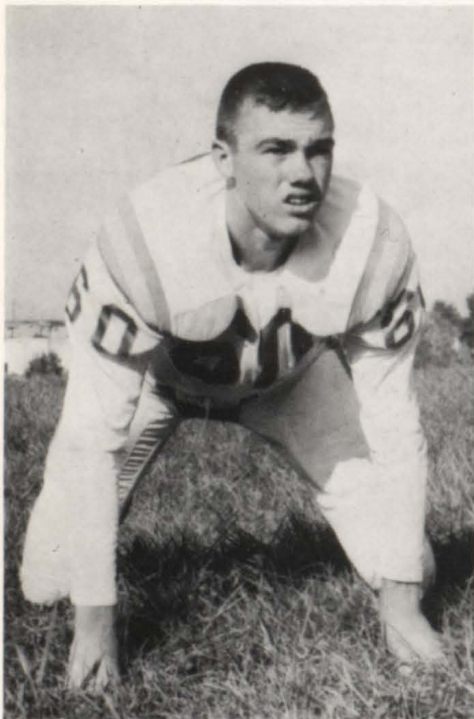

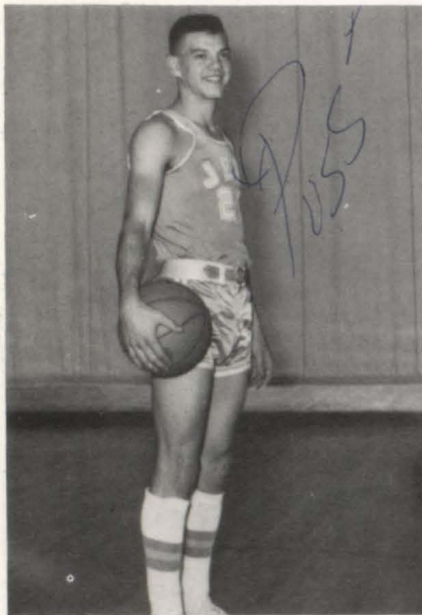

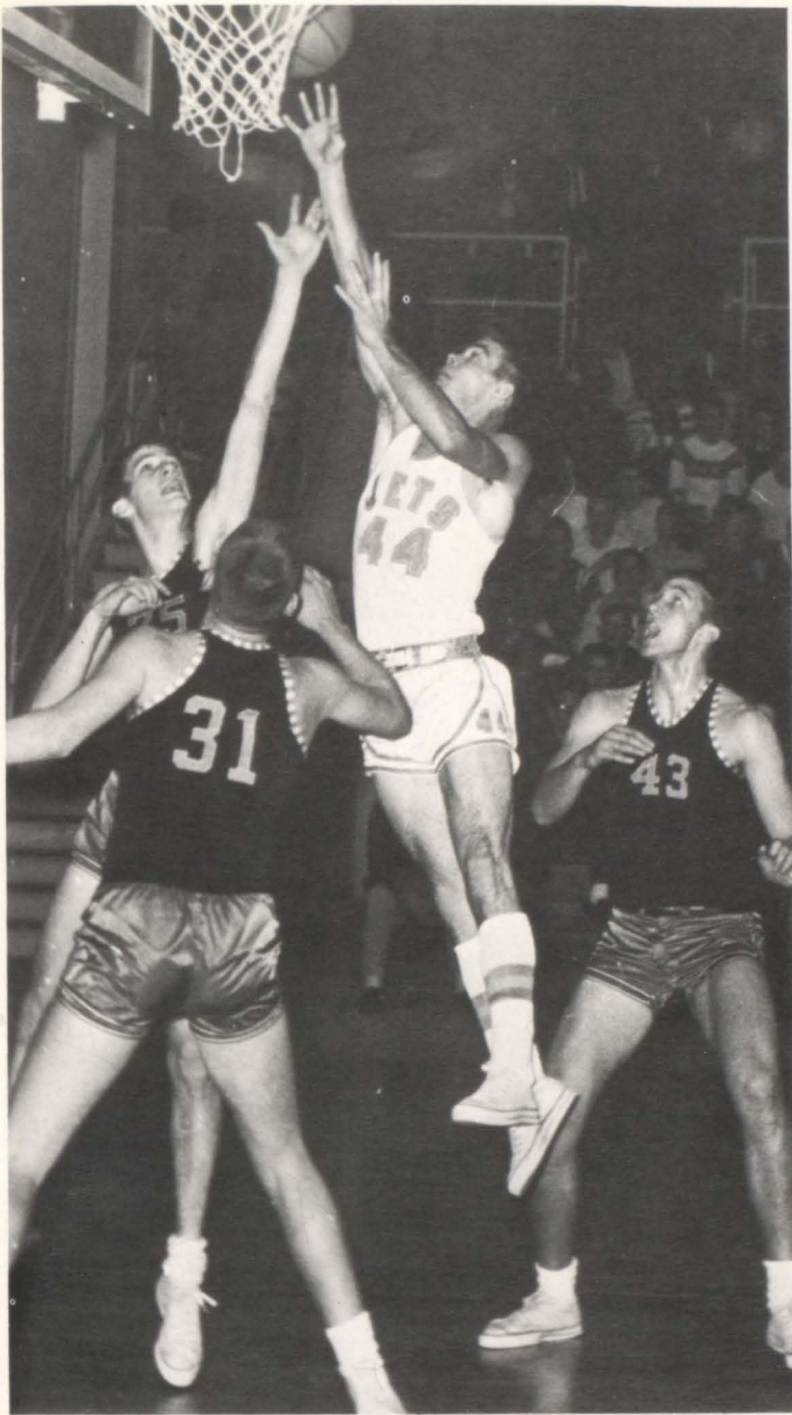

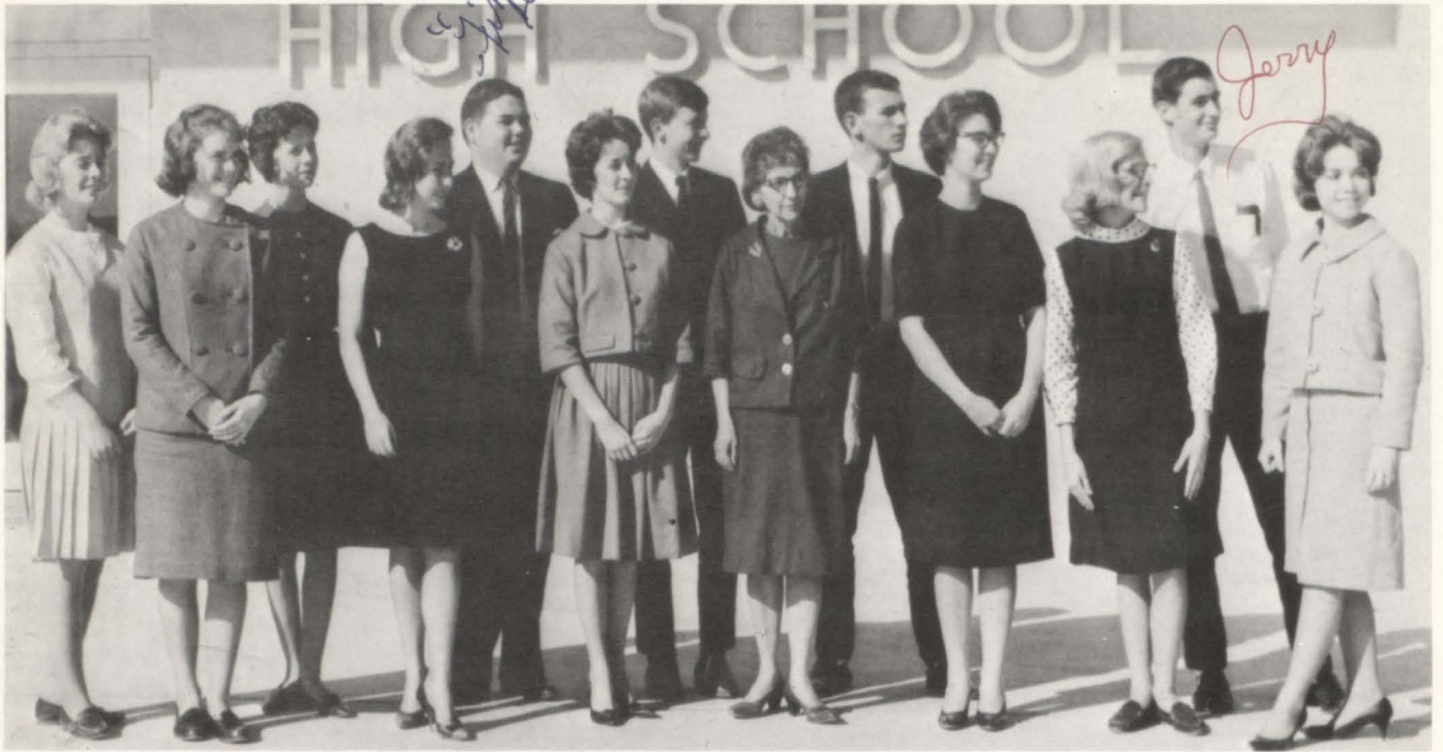

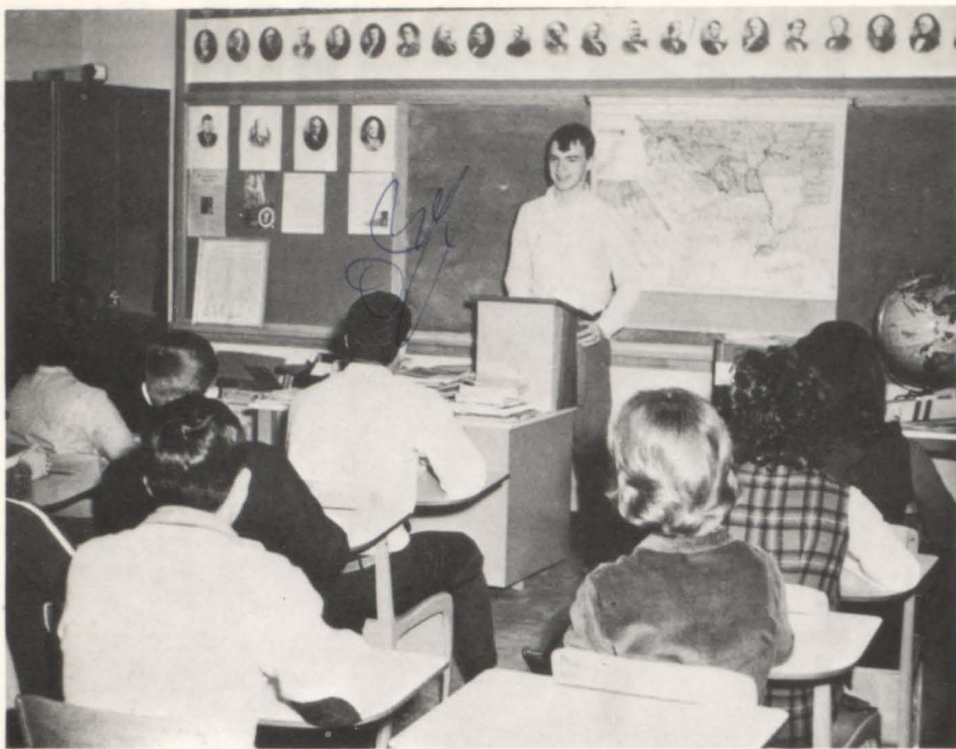

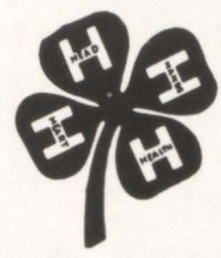

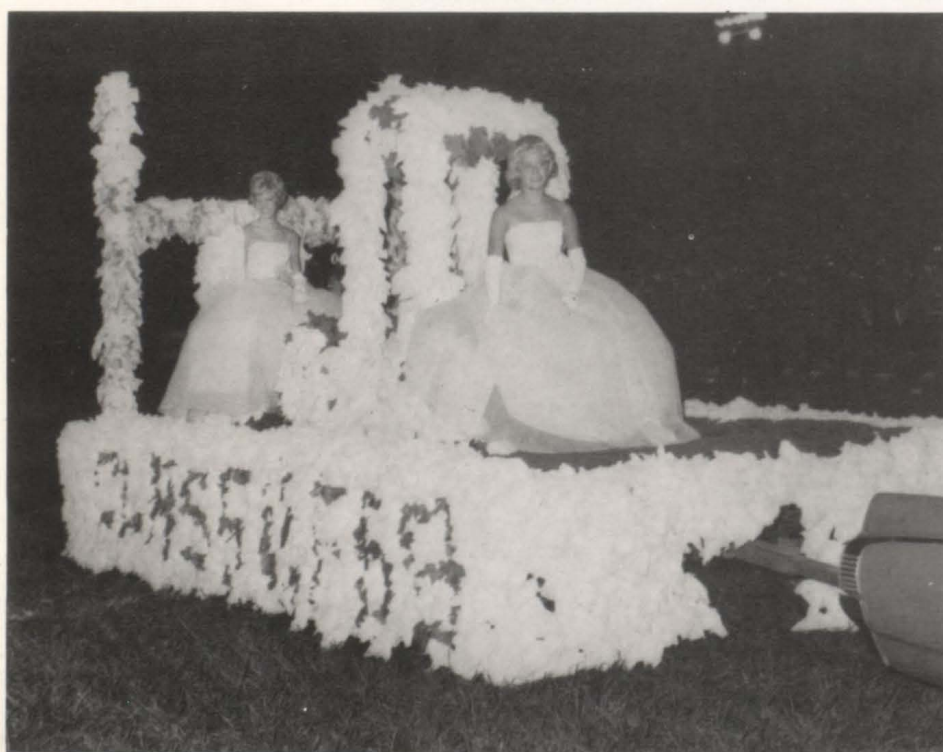

Cumberland County High School is a growing school in a growing community. In the three short years of the history of the new building, it has already been necessary to add new rooms and to increase the faculty.

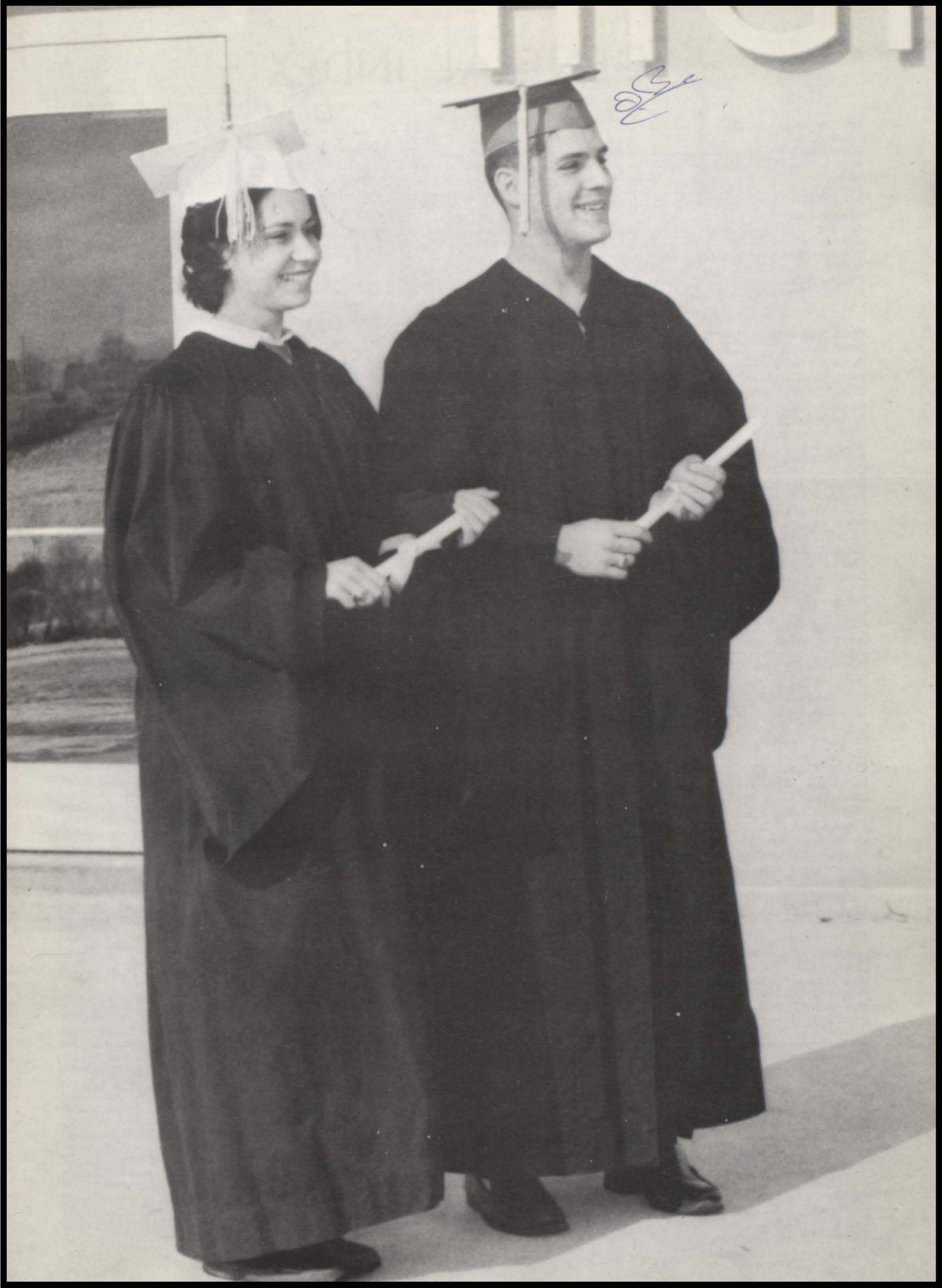
The school is striving to expand its curriculum so as to educate all of our young people, rather than a privileged few.
