Big Idea: Why are cycles important in nature?

This week's reading selection: A Handful of Dirt

Summary: Although we rarely stop to inspect it, the soil beneath our feet may be the most important substance on the planet. In addition to providing a home for millions of microorganisms, soil also contains nutrients that plants need to survive. Without soil, life on Earth would not exist.

DISCUSS with your child food webs and how different creatures are connected.
