Family Newsletter Envelopes

Staff at Evaline want to make sure we clearly communicate all our plans and activities with all our students' families. Again this year we are continuing our Friday Envelopes for school-to-home communication. We hope this will make it easy for you to stay up to date with all that's going on at Evaline. Here's how our system works:

#1. "Family Envelope" consisting of weekly newsletters and other information will be sent home each Friday with your student. If you have more than one student, we will send it home with the oldest student in the family.

#2 A parent or guardian must remove the contents, complete any forms inside, read the newsletter, and then sign and date the envelope to show they have received it.

#3 Send the envelope back to school the next school day.

This is a great opportunity to teach students responsibility. Since this envelope is used for the entire year, careful handling of it is most appreciated. We do not recommend using it for transporting cash. Any confidential information will be either sent in a sealed envelope or mailed.

Our classroom also practices professionalism. We will be learning that professionalism is using respect and responsibility for a purpose.

HOMEWORK-

Please expect students to bring home a "Boomerang" folder each day. Inside you will find 1. Materials such as completed work that will stay at home and 2. Any notes or work that needs to be returned to school.

Do not expect a lot of homework coming home with your child. There is so much value in play for 1st and 2nd graders. My hope is that students will have time to explore and invent at their homes after school.

Students will have a "Book Baggie" that will carry a book to and from school each day. Please listen to your child read aloud for ten minutes each night and then either read aloud with your child or continue listening to him/her read aloud for an additional ten minutes. Students should be engaged with reading for at least 20 minutes every evening. Please sign the reading log each evening and have your child return his/her book baggie and Boomerang Folder every day.

By mid-September your child will have weekly spelling or sight words and addition/subtraction facts as homework as well.

I am so eager to begin working with your child and am truly honored to have the opportunity to be a part of his/her educational journey. Hello Families,

Welcome to 3rd and 4th grade, we have an exciting year ahead! I am so glad to be able to start this year with students learning in the classroom. In class this week we took some time to talk about what a student's civic duties in the classroom look like. Students came up with things such as being ready to learn, helping others, staying on task, and wearing a mask to keep others safe. As a class we read about Camdyn Cole, a BMX champion to learn how she sets goals and works to achieve them. She related BMX to school by saying "it isn't always a smooth ride" and "you have to work hard and put in extra effort when you can." Hello Parents and Students,

Welcome to a new year at Evaline! I hope you had a great summer and are ready to get back to school. This year we are starting out the year with a new location for the 5th and 6th grade class while we wait for the new portable to arrive. Until it does, we will have class in the classateria and will make the transition to the new space when it's ready.

So far students have gotten settled into their new space and new routines. After a couple days of adjusting we have begun our regular lessons in ELA, Math, Social Studies and Science. We are starting 5th grade ELA out of order this year and so they have begun with their poetry unit and so far I've been most impressed with their writing. 6th grade is starting a lengthy unit on the "Hero's Journey" by exploring Greek mythology through the book Percy Jackson and the Olympians: The Lightning Thief. Both grades have started with chapter 1 in their math books. Because Constitution day falls in September, we started a month-long look in both grades at the founding of the nation and the writing of the constitution. Next month the grades will split in Social Studies and study their own topics for a while. In science, 5th grade began learning about the orbit of Earth in space sciences and 6th grade began learning about weather patterns and what causes changes in our day to day weather.

I am excited to be starting up school again and am excited for the plans we have to provide what I think will be a great school year for our students.

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Special Education-Title1/LAP- Social Emotional Learning (SEL)

This week's Words of Wisdom by Mrs. Duren

Well it's the start of a new school year, and the air around the school building is brimming with excitement and hope. We have all been SO excited to see not only the faces of our returning staff and students, but also of those who are new to our school as well. It has been exciting to get used to new learning spaces, new groups of students and for some grade levels, different teachers in our classrooms, and new strategies and resources for learning. We had a fantastic turn out at our recent Meet The Teacher event - thank you to everyone who was able to participate. We look forward to many upcoming opportunities for families to participate in their children's learning, and to actively participate in the activities that make Evaline special and unique.

I spoke with my dad this week about some of his memories of his first day at school and he shared about what it was like back in 1949 when he began at Evaline as a first grader (There was no kindergarten here back then.) Back then, things at school were a bit different than they are now, with grades 1-4 in one room and grades 5-8 in the other, with each room having 4 rows of desks, one row for each grade, and about 25 students total per classroom. Evaline had no bus back then, so no bus driver either. However, the Winlock HS bus did pick up Evaline students in the morning to drop off at the corner of the property, but students were expected to walk home at the end of the day regardless of how far or the weather. There were no para professionals, office staff, lunch staff, nor nurse. There was one custodian who cleaned the school with her own children helping at night. The school day was focused on Reading, Math, Penmanship, and Art. In the older grades History was also introduced, but Science was not a focus. The classrooms had chalkboards on 3 walls of each room, no white boards, limited books, and no computers. Learning was based on repetition, and students learned to pay close attention to what each grade ahead of them was learning and getting to do in their room, as they had that to look forward to for when they got older. At lunch, students brought their lunch in a thermos and a lunch bucket, not a bag, and there was no school lunch like we have today. Outside recess usually consisted of softball if you were in the older grades, in preparation to the annual games against the Jackson Prairie School (also a 2 room schoolhouse), and inside recess might be working on woodshop projects in the shop in the basement on one side of the school or playing dodgeball or dodge baseball in the other side of the basement, with the coal furnace for heating the school located in between the two down stairs spaces, as well as the bathrooms with the elevated bathroom stalls.

What resonated the most for me after talking with him was that regardless of the differences between then and now, at the core, the most important things have never changed. Evaline is still about coming together as a learning community, helping each other regardless of the challenges and differences, working hard, and making learning fun. We may teach more subjects and in different ways now, and have more staff and classrooms, but yet at the core it still remains the same. Whether we are staff or students, then or now, we each will face challenges, experience uncomfortable feelings, and find a need to exhibit positive character traits, such as courage, especially as each new school year begins. This realization made me appreciate even more the fact that I have the privilege of introducing our district's new social emotional curriculum, Purposeful People (part of the Character Strong curriculum), in each classroom, and to each student in our school this year. I am additionally thankful our first

character trait we are focusing on this fall is that of "COURAGE.", especially as so many of our students, and staff have been able to identify with the fact that the start of a school year can cause a person of any age to feel uncomfortable feelings, and that making an effort to act out courageously can go a long way to help others and yourself feel better about the school year. Please be watching for more information throughout the school year from both staff and your students regarding our 10 focus character traits, and how we all can benefit from, and grow in our use of them in our daily lives, both in school and outside of school.
