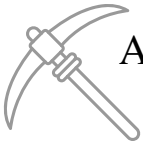

Students Connect Between Campuses

Grant School District 3 is excited to encourage fluidity between school campuses. Humbolt Elementary and Grant Union Jr/Sr High School are located only one block away from each other and work together in many different aspects of education. Many of the elementary students attend sporting events, drama productions, and other community-based opportunities at Grant Union. While many of these students look forward to the day when they will be old enough to participate, the sixth-grade students are already getting an introduction to life in junior high.

The majority of sixth-grade students are participating in at least one of the junior high sports teams, often walking together or riding the bus between schools for their sports practices. In addition, several sixth-grade students catch a bus to Grant Union to participate in

seventh-grade Math or Language Arts classes.

Seven students from Grant Union are choosing to use one of their elective classes to be a TA (Teaching Assistant) for an elementary teacher at Humbolt Elementary. These Juniors and Seniors are responsible for their transportation and communication with their supervising teacher. Their jobs may include copying and organizing paperwork and assignments for the teacher, or they may be tasked with walking around the classroom and helping students with their assignments. The elementary students love having these TAs in their classroom and the students are learning valuable skills in office and classroom management. Students who plan to earn their teaching degree may be able to enroll in an EOU online education practicum course to earn college credit for time spent in the classroom.

Lunch Buddy Program Connects Students

This year, Grant Union Jr/Sr High School has eighteen Juniors and Seniors participating in their Lunch Buddy program. The Lunch Buddy program connects high school students with an elementary “buddy” student. These students eat lunch, play on the playground, and get a chance to connect with an older student who believes in them and encourages them. “I love this program!” said Grant Union’s Tonia Seebart, who trains the high school students and coordinates the program. “It can hold significant importance for

fostering positive social, emotional, and behavioral outcomes for the young ones involved.” However, Seebart quickly points out there are also benefits for the high school students involved. “For our high school student volunteers, these programs teach about the importance of empathy and kindness, fostering a sense of community and shared understanding. The volunteers gain valuable skills, such as active listening, conflict resolution, and mentorship, which are transferable to personal and professional settings.”

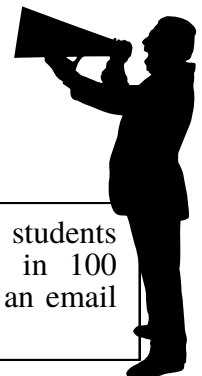

Alumni Focus on Ken and Shermayne Boethin

Ken and Shermayne Boethin were both born and raised in Grant County. They grew up working for their parents in the family businesses. Ken's dad, Bob, owned Boethin Plumbing and Heating, and Shermayne's parent's (the Stutesmans), owned Valley Meat Packing.

They grew up together and were in one of the first classes to attend first through third grades at Humbolt Elementary. They fondly remember teachers like Mrs. Taylor and Mrs. Bird, and they remember a variety of student activities, including vibrant May Day festivities with elaborate costumes and dancing as well as the decorating of the May Pole. Ken even served as May Day King during his third-grade year.

Fourth grade students met in the Junior High Annex, then moved into the John Day Junior High School for fifth through eighth grades. Mrs. Pocock and Mrs. Davis were a couple of their junior high teachers. Ken and Shermayne were good friends, and they began dating in the eighth grade.

Grant Union High School was an adventure for all ninth through twelfth grade students. Ken played football, basketball, and ran track. He credits Mr. Kosydar, the math teacher and track coach, as being a role model in his life. Grant Union did not have a track so the track team would practice by running laps around the outfield of the baseball field, which was located beside the football field. Ken also served as Senior Class President. Shermayne participated in the choir, was Homecoming Queen, a majorette and attended every school event.

The school began construction their junior year, adding the new gym, the cafeteria, the senior hallway, and two classrooms. Ken helped his father with the plumbing for the project, and they were the first senior class to use the addition in the fall.

Ken and Shermayne graduated in 1969 and headed off to college. He left for Oregon College of Education in Monmouth (now known as Western Oregon University) to pursue an education degree but changed his focus to law enforcement during his

sophomore year. Ken continued to run track in college, finally having a real track to practice on, and competed in the national competition in Arkansas during his senior year.

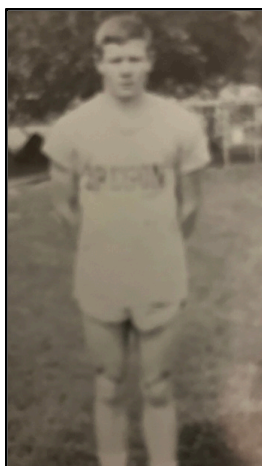
Shermayne attended Marylhurst for a year before joining Ken at Oregon College of Education. They were married in 1972 and graduated in 1973. Ken took a position with the Children's Services Division in Roseburg where Shermayne substitute taught for a year before taking a position teaching first grade in Sutherlin.

In 1979, they returned to John Day with their daughters Stephanie and Jenni so Ken could help his dad with the family business. Two years later, he was recruited for the Grant County Juvenile Department, where he worked until his retirement in 2015. Now, Ken enjoys gardening, yardwork, and working in his wood shop.

Shermayne substitute taught in Prairie City and John Day until the girls were in school and then she accepted a kindergarten teaching position at Sonshine. Two years later, she helped develop the Kindergarten program in Mount Vernon and worked there until the districts combined in 1991. She then taught many years of kindergarten, first, and second grades at Humbolt Elementary before her retirement in 2013.

Ken and Shermayne enjoy being active in the schools, their church, and the community. When Canyon Creek flooded the high school track, Ken and Shermayne volunteered their time to head up a committee to replace the existing track with an eight-lane track, spending countless hours meeting with the school board and completing grant applications and other paperwork. Although Ken is no longer helping to coach the track team, both Ken and Shermayne enjoy volunteering their time to help with the home meets.

In 2015, Shermayne was appointed to the position of Lay Leader Assigned at the United Methodist Church, where she continues to serve her community with her teaching skills and love for people.

Math Club Holds Local Competition

Grant Union's Middle School Math Club was created in the Fall of 2023. We hosted our first competition at Humbolt Elementary School in January 2024, then headed to the chapter competition at Blue Mountain Community College in February 2024. Although we were a young team, we still pulled off a 3rd place standing and brought home a trophy for the case.

This year, we started our practice season in October 2024 and held our 2nd Annual Grant Union Math Competition in the Student Commons on Friday, January 10, 2025. We were excited to invite

schools from all over Grant County to compete. We had two teams from Humbolt Elementary, five teams from Grant Union, and one Grant Union teacher team. Prairie City brought five student teams and a Prairie City teacher team! We had a packed house with 57 individual competitors! Next year, we hope to invite not only all of our Grant County schools, but also schools from Vale, Ontario, Baker City, and Burns.

Our Middle School Math Club will be headed to BMCC again this February with at least two teams! We are excited to go up against some larger schools with more experienced clubs.



Blue Mountain Hospital Partners with GU Health CTE

Blue Mountain Hospital and Grant Union Jr/Sr High School have been working collaboratively to put a strong emphasis on practical career readiness for our students at Grant Union Jr/Sr High School who may be interested in a healthcare career. Blue Mountain Hospital conducts a great Healthcare Career Day to expose students to the many different health fields and their future options for working in healthcare. The students are looking forward to this educational event later on in the schoolyear.

In addition, Grant Union students have access to a Health Occupation class, where they are able to connect to Blue Mountain Hospital. As a part of this class, students apply for a job shadow opportunity which includes the job application process, participation in mock interviews, and spending time watching healthcare in action. Last year, Blue Mountain Hospital had eight students participate in their Job Shadow program.

"Our job shadow program is designed to give students a comprehensive experience of what its like to work in healthcare. By integrating professional interviews into the process, we help them build confidence and skills they can carry into their future careers," said Maisie Taylor, Blue Mountain Hospital's Human Resource Director. Sylvia Ross, GUHS Health Occupation CTE (Career and Technical Education) Instructor adds, "It is so rewarding to see how excited the students are when they return from their job shadow days. The students are getting to see what that area of healthcare looks like and be empowered by getting to be a part of the healthcare system. Its so good for them. I strongly encourage students to participate in job shadows."

Blue Mountain Hospital also offers scholarships to Grant County students who are pursuing the healthcare field after high school, which is a great way to support our local students.



Students Help Carry Young Memorial

Lucie Immoos established the Carrie Young Memorial in 1993 after the death of her sister. That first year the nonprofit raised \$50.00 and followed Carrie's loving example of buying Christmas presents for residents of Blue Mountain Nursing Home. Since then, the nonprofit has grown and expanded to help care for the senior community of Grant County at Christmas and all year long. The Carrie Young Memorial holds a dinner and auction on the first Saturday of December, raising funds to give Christmas gifts and help pay for bills and services throughout the year. This year, the fundraiser raised over \$50,000.00, delivered over 50 loads of firewood, wrapped and delivered Christmas presents to nursing homes, and supplied groceries, heating oil, and electricity for seniors living at home—all in the month of December! This is in addition to helping with bills, medical transport, mowing of lawns, home repairs, and other services as needed. Lucie is always looking for ways to help the senior community of Grant County!

"John Day has excellent schools and its people have always been found standing shoulder to shoulder on all problems affecting the advancement of the educational interests of the town. This school district was established by Superintendent Rhinehart on January 2, 1865, and was known as district No. 3, which number it still retains. The first session of school was held in the summer of 1866. The pioneer board of this district was composed of A. G. Mulkey, N. W. Fiske, Wilson Harer, directors, and W. F. Vinegard, clerk. School has been maintained regularly since then, and at present about one hundred pupils are enrolled. This summer a new four-room schoolhouse, costing \$3,400, was completed, which is now in charge of Professor H. L. Mack and wife and F. S. Ottman. The school board is composed of Clarence Johnson, C. H. Timms and G. W. Porter, directors, and E. J.
