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

groups will focus on skills needed to enhance the learning for each scholar. In
addition, Guided Math instruction will be provided as a means to focus
instruction on individual need and enhance and enrich the learning for each
scholar. Scholars will also follow the workshop model for writing. Lucy Calkins
Units of Study will be utilized during this instruction. Technology enhanced
lessons will also be provided to each scholar during small group instruction and
individual practice.

Small group instruction will be the primary method teachers will use to strengthen the academic program at Glasgow. During this workshop model, teachers will use research based instructional strategies such as Marzano, Hattie, Kagan, Resnick, and Lamov.
