Report cards are issued as follows, based on 180 days of school:

High School: every 18 weeks at the end of the semester (about 90 days), with progress reports issued close to six and 12 weeks of each semester.

Activities and Clubs

Students must be passing five or more of the seven classes in which they are enrolled to be eligible to participate in any and all extracurricular activities. They must also be on track for graduation. Students participating in GHSA events or sports must have received a minimum of 2.5 credits from the previous semester to be considered eligible.

AFJROTC- Lt Col Alford, Chief Spears, and Sgt Hemphill- Room 703 cont.

Purpose: The objectives of AFJROTC are to educate and train high school cadets in citizenship, promote community service, instill responsibility, character, and self-discipline, and provide instruction in air and space fundamentals.



Aero Club

Purpose: The purpose of this new club will be to explore various aspects of aerospace science through drones, remote-controlled airplanes, and rockets. Cadets will also be given the option to work toward a Private Pilot's License (PPL) with a flight simulator and in a real airplane. Cadets will build and program a drone, with the goal of competing in local and regional drone races. Cadets will build and launch a rocket with the goal of competing in local and regional rocket competitions. The Aero Club Team will be authorized to wear a special patch on their uniform.

Financial Obligations: \$30 for T-shirt and supplies. There will be opportunities to raise money to offset this cost.

Drill and Color Guard

Purpose: The Color Guard Team performs ceremonies at sports events, military retirements, and other school and community events throughout the local area. The Color Guard Team will compete against local area JROTC units and will compete in the National Drill and Color Guard Competition in Daytona Florida.

Financial Obligations: \$300 for Daytona Competition in May

Kitty Hawk Air Society

Purpose: The objectives of AFJROTC are to educate and train high school cadets in citizenship, promote community service, instill responsibility, character, and self-discipline, and provide instruction in air and space fundamentals. It is the academic honor society of AFJROTC. Its purpose is to promote high academic standards and achievement. It promotes the development of leadership abilities, recognizes academic excellence, and furthers the members' knowledge of the Air Force Role in aerospace.

Raider Team & Fitness Team

Purpose: The Raider Team competes in athletic competitions against other JROTC units throughout the nation in events including obstacle course, rope bridge, team foot race, rope climb, tire flip, and sled pull. Perry's Varsity Boys Team won the Raider's Air Force National Championship in 2023 at Molina, Georgia, and look forward to a competitive 2025 season. Raider team members are authorized to wear the Raider competition shirt with their uniform on Fridays.

Fitness team won the All Service National Championship in Daytona in 2024 and 2025! The team will again in May 2026 travel

to Daytona to defend their Title.

Financial Obligations: Raider dues: \$200

There will be opportunities to raise money to offset this cost.

Band- Mr. Ingram- Room 707

Concert

Purpose: The concert band offers opportunities for students to perform and compete. Students must be enrolled at PHS and must be able to read music. Students must have approval from the director.

Financial Obligations: Annual band fee, including uniform rental- An additional fee is charged if a school owned instrument is rented.

Marching

Purpose: The marching band offers opportunities for students to perform and compete. Students must be enrolled in PHS and must be able to read music. Student must be physically able to rehearse outdoors for extended periods of times. Students must have prior approval from the director.

Financial Obligations: Annual band fee, including uniform rental- An additional fee is charged if a school owned instrument is rented.

Color Guard

Purpose: Students must try out and be selected (in the Spring). Students must be physically able to rehearse outdoors for extended periods of time.

Financial Obligations: Annual band fee, including uniform rental

Chorus- Mrs. Dumas- Room 706

Purpose: To develop independent choral musicians through group singing, performance, and sight reading.

Requirements: Students must be enrolled in chorus class at PHS. Students must participate in evening performances several times a year.

Financial Obligations: Semester fees as well as a One-time purchase of chorus uniform (fundraisers are available to help or to cover expenses)

FBLA- Mr. Dunbar, Mrs. Arnold, and Mr. Andrews- Rooms 806, 802, and 804

Purpose: Future Business Leaders of America-Phi Beta Lambda is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) education association of students preparing for careers in business and business-related fields. The Association has four divisions: FBLA for high school students, FBLA for Middle Level junior high, middle, and intermediate school students, PBL for post-secondary students, and the Professional Alumni Division for business people, educators and parents who support the goals of the association. Purpose: The Spring Musical is an exciting, audition-based production that brings together performers, musicians, and technicians to create a full-scale theatrical experience. The NAHS goal is to promote the arts in our schools and communities. Activities include promoting school spirit, beautifying the school and community, exploration of the arts and service projects.

Membership requirements: Must be a 10th-12th grade PHS art student who has completed the Comprehensive Art I/II (Intro.) class and be actively enrolled in an art class.

Financial Obligations: \$25 per year

National Honor Society: Mrs. Lord and Ms. Barajas

Purpose: The National Honor Society (NHS) is the nation's premier organization established to recognize outstanding high school students. More than just an honor roll, NHS serves to honor those students who have demonstrated excellence in the areas of Scholarship, Leadership, Service, and Character. Chapter membership not only recognizes students for their accomplishments but challenges them to develop further though active involvement in school activities and community service. Four main purposes have guided NHS chapters from the beginning: "to create enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to render service, to promote leadership, and to develop character in the students of secondary schools." Students with a cumulative GPA of 92 or higher are eligible to apply and, if accepted, students must maintain a cumulative GPA of 90 or higher to remain a member of the Perry High NHS Chapter. To receive Senior honor cords, members must document a minimum of 45 service hours by April of their senior year.

Financial Obligations: One-Time membership dues are \$45, collected at the time of induction only (not an annual fee)

PHS Frequently Asked Questions

What do I do if I...

1. AM LATE/Tardy?

If you arrive to school after 8:10 you must report to the Attendance Office to get a check in (tardy) slip for class. Anything over 20 minutes out of a class is considered an absence. For your tardy or absence to be excused, you must bring a note from your parent, doctor, court, or other approved written documentation within 5 days of your tardy/absence.

It is the student's responsibility to be in every class on time. Students are subject to consequences for repeated tardies. If a student is more than 10 minutes late to class without a valid pass, it is considered skipping and students are subject to consequences.

2. HAVE BEEN ABSENT?

If you have been absent, you must bring a written excuse from your parent, doctor, court, or other approved entity stating the reason for your absence. This written note is to be turned in to the office and placed in the **EXCUSE BASKET** at the Attendance Office. This excuse must be provided to the attendance clerk within 5 days after the absence and must contain the following information:

Name of Student
Date of Note
Date of Absence
Reason for Absence
Parent/Doctor signature
Phone number of parent

Notes written after the 5th day grace period will remain unexcused and will be filed in the student's folder.

****<u>All absences, both excused and unexcused, do count towards exemption</u>. <u>After 5 absences, exemption status is lost, even if</u> those absences are all excused.****

The State Board of Education policy allows only the following circumstances as excused absences:

- *Personal illness
- *Death or serious illness in the immediate family
- *Recognized religious holidays
- *Absences mandated by a governmental agency
- *Conditions which render school attendance

impossible or hazardous to the students' safety and health.

- *Students who serve as a page in the Georgia
- **General Assembly**
- *The school is only able to accept ten (10) parent notes before requiring note from medical or legal office.

3. AM GETTING A LICENSE OR LEARNER'S PERMIT?

Stop by the main office to fill out a <u>Certificate of Enrollment</u> form. The form will be ready for pick up at the end of the school day. The **ADAP Certificate** will be attached if the student is getting a license.

4. NEED TO LEAVE SCHOOL EARLY?

A written parental request must be made before permission will be given for a student to leave campus early for any reason. <u>The written request must be taken to the office prior to the beginning of the school day.</u> All notes requesting an early dismissal must contain the full name of the student and a telephone number where a parent may be reached for confirmation. At the time of the dismissal, **the student must sign out in the office**. Students must provide an excuse from their doctor/dentist or a written excuse from the parent in order for school time missed to be counted as excused.

*Once a student arrives to the school campus, he/she is subject to follow all school policies and procedures. Between the hours of 7:15am to 3:00pm, or from the time a student arrives on school property, that student must get prior permission and must check out through the front office before leaving campus.

5. NEED TO RIDE A DIFFERENT BUS?

Sorry, you cannot ride a different bus. A student can only ride the bus assigned based on that student's address on infinite campus. If you move, you must provide proof of residency to central registration to have the address and bus changed.

6. GET TO SCHOOL EARLY?

Students cannot be on campus before 7:15am. Students who walk, drive, or get dropped off, will go directly to the Staples gym. Students who ride a bus will go directly to the cafeteria. Any student assigned to In School Suspension is required to go directly to the ISS room (in Staples gym conference room). You will need to pick up your breakfast from the cart in the Staples Gym Lobby on your way. You may eat your breakfast in the ISS room.

7. NEED TO USE THE PHONE OR ANOTHER ELECTRONIC DEVICE?

The office phone is available for use with the

permission of office personnel. Students will not be permitted to leave class to use the office phone. Students are not permitted to use their cell phones during the school day. Students may NOT use ANY electronic device, other than their school provided Chromebook, during school hours (7:15am-3:00pm). Electronic devices include but are not limited to: phones, AirPods, iPads, headphones, apple watches, etc. Students cannot have their phones out during the school day at any time without prior permission. Students are subject to consequences for violation of electronic devices.

8. HAVE LOST SOMETHING?

Students who lose, misplace, or feel that they have had something stolen, need to report the incident to school personnel immediately. A lost and found area is located in the front office. All misplaced textbooks that are turned into the office will be returned to the teacher that issued the book. Students are responsible for all items issued to them by the school. Although school personnel will try to help locate items, the student, not the school, is responsible for all items.

9. NEED TO STAY AFTER SCHOOL?

When the bell rings at 3:00pm, students should exit the building or go directly to their assigned area. If involved in an extracurricular or co-curricular activity, the student will report directly to that activity. Students staying for tutoring or academic priority time should go directly to the appropriate location. Students who drive should go directly to the student parking lot. Those who are picked up will report directly to the parent pickup ramp. Students who ride a 1st round bus report directly to the bus ramp. Students who ride all other buses should report directly to the cafeteria and sit at assigned table. All students who walk should exit the building and campus when the bell rings.

10. NEED TO TAKE MEDICINE AT SCHOOL?

As needed and prescription medications must be checked in at the office as soon as the student arrives at school. <u>Students are</u> <u>prohibited from carrying medications with them during the school day.</u> <u>All</u> medications should be given to the medical technician or school nurse in the front office. A parent permission form to dispense medication to students is available in the front office.

11. NEED TO GO SOMEWHERE DURING CLASS TIME?

You must have permission from your teacher and have a pass.

12. DO NOT HAVE MY COMPUTER AT SCHOOL?

First, charge your computer each night and bring it to school daily. If you forget or are unable to bring your computer, you are still responsible for the work. Teachers have a limited number of computers in the classroom for student use. If you borrow a computer from a teacher, you must return it before leaving that class. You are responsible for the computer and any damage that may occur during the time of possession

13. WANT TO SEND/RECIEVE A DELIVERY?

DELIVERY OF FLOWERS AND BALLOONS TO SCHOOL FOR STUDENTS BY PARENTS, FLORISTS, OR OTHER STUDENTS IS NOT PERMITTED.

ALL food deliveries are also prohibited. NO Door Dash, Uber Eats, Grub Hub, etc. are permitted. Students are subject to consequences for all food deliveries. This includes any deliveries from outside establishments made by parents, guardians, siblings, friends, etc.

14. AM IN AN INAPPROPRIATE AREA? You should always be in the appropriate location. If you are in the wrong area, quickly return to the correct area. You are subject to consequences. If you are in a location where someone is violating a procedure or rule, leave that area immediately. For example, there should only be 1 person per bathroom stall at all times. If someone else walks into your stall, leave immediately. Report all inappropriate behaviors. (All students in the same area are subject to receiving the same consequence).

15. NEED TO REPORT SOMETHING TO AN ADULT?

Students can talk with any Perry High School staff member. Students and parents may also alert an administrator of a situation by completing an anonymous alert.

16. WANT TO EXEMPT FINALS?

A comprehensive final examination in each course grades 9-12 will be given each semester. Students may exempt final examinations provided: 1. They have a B average (80 or above). 2. Are absent no more than 5 days during the semester; this includes both excused and unexcused absences. 3. Must not have been assigned to ISS or OSS during the semester. 4. Must have cleared all obligations to the school, including media center, textbooks, school property, fees and the like. 5. Must not have received Hospital Homebound Services. No other students may be exempted from tests. In courses for which a State-mandated end of course exam is required, the grade on the end of course exam shall count 20 percent of the final grade. No student may exempt the end of course exam.

17. HAVE FORGOTTEN SCHOOL RELATED MATERIALS/PROJECTS IN MY VEHICLE?

Students are not permitted in the parking lot during the school day for any reason. In situations where it is imperative for the student to get an assignment from the car, the student should get permission and a pass from an administrator.

18. WANT TO PARTICIPATE IN GHSA SPORTS?

To be eligible to participate in Georgia High School Association (GHSA) interscholastic activities, student-athletes must pass at least 2.5 credits per semester that count towards graduation. This includes students enrolled in dual enrollment programs, who must pass at least 2.5 units each semester at both their high school and postsecondary institution. Students gain or lose eligibility on the first day of each semester.
