To Staff, Parents, and the General Public:

In Spring of 1989, an inspection of all buildings used by the Rhea County School System was conducted by an accredited environmental consulting firm to determine the presence and location of friable and non-friable asbestos materials in all Department of Education facilities. All buildings were inspected in accordance with E.P.A. guidelines for asbestos-containing materials (i.e., 40 CFR Part 763). Asbestos containing materials were found in several older school buildings and a management plan was implemented by the Rhea County School System – copies of which are available at the Superintendent's office in Dayton, Tennessee.

Asbestos poses a widespread concern for everyone since it was used extensively in buildings and homes constructed from 1946 through 1973 for insulation, acoustical purposes, and / or fire retardation. During that time, asbestos was a government-approved building material and was considered almost a miracle substance because of its fire retardant and insulating properties. However, airborne asbestos fibers are a health hazard and have been linked with different types of abdominal and lung cancers. We are therefore committed to taking corrective measures and our asbestos control efforts are based on the advice of experts knowledgeable in asbestos control and abatement techniques.

The purpose of this letter is to advise you that **Spring City Middle School** - built in 2002 - has been certified by the Architect/Builders as having been built with no asbestos material either specified nor used in the building's construction. Copies of the letter certifying this as well as any other pertinent information is available for viewing in the school office and at the Rhea County Department of Education in Dayton, Tennessee. To Contractors, Vendors, & Service Technicians:

In Spring of 1989, an inspection of all buildings used by the Rhea County School System was conducted by an accredited environmental consulting firm to determine the presence and location of friable and non-friable asbestos materials in all buildings. All buildings were inspected in accordance with E.P.A guidelines for asbestos-containing materials (i.e. 40 CFR Part 763). Asbestos containing materials were found in places in all school buildings then in use. A management plan was implemented by the Rhea County School System for all buildings - copies of which are available in the school offices, at the Superintendent's office, and in the County Centralized Maintenance Director's Office. Only two facilities still in use today have asbestos containing materials remaining in them. Those facilities are:

Spring City Elem. School Frazier Elementary School

Asbestos poses a widespread concern for everyone since it was used extensively in buildings and homes constructed from 1946 through 1973 for insulation, acoustical purposes, and/or fire retardation. During that time, asbestos was a government-approved building material and was considered almost a miracle substance because of its fire retardant and insulating properties. However, airborne asbestos fibers are a health hazard and have been linked with different types of abdominal and lung cancers. We are therefore committed to taking corrective measures and our asbestos control efforts are based on the advice of experts knowledgeable in asbestos control and abatement techniques.

The purpose of this letter is to advise you as to where asbestos-containing materials are located at the above listed facilities. **Management plan books – complete with detailed listings of rooms and areas containing ACBM are available in each facility's main office.** Warning posters have been placed in all locations on campus where asbestos has been found, to notify the entrant / occupant of the situation and its potential hazards. It is very important that all county maintenance workers, contractor employees, vendor employees, and service technicians observe carefully any areas that are marked / listed to have asbestos materials and always obey all cautions and warnings. County maintenance employees will also be given training and advice on the basic techniques of asbestos control. At that time, guidelines and policies will be given to further streamline our approach to the asbestos problem.
