
What does your room look like? Plaids? Checkers? Pastels? Laces? These are just a few patterns we look at when we decorate our rooms.




Prayin' for a **Cold Front**

Although many thought the time change would put a damper on spirits, the Highlander spirit could not have shown brighter.

In the first quarter the Highlanders held the Hornets at a 0-0 score while they geared up for the second. Daniel Williams threw a seven play, 47-yard drive with a 21yard touchdown pass to Willie Larkin for 6. Then Thomas Shuler made a two-point conversion run which made it 8-0. Just seconds later the Hornets fumbled at their own 19yard line. Williams then threw a perfect pass to Melvin Pearsall to make the score kick to end the half at 15-0.


To open the second half the Highlanders Hornets 27-14.





Other activities which she has enjoyed here in the United States are tennis, aerobics, and horseback riding.


This summer Anja will return

When asked if she missed home, Anja replied, "Sometimes a little bit, but everybody is friendly and nice and helps me. I really like it here!




JOBS STRENGTHEN THE HEART








JV THROBS WITH SPIRIT


INSTRUMENTAL AND VOCAL TECHNIQUES


The students were separated into small groups and representatives from different businesses spent the morning with the students explaining their jobs, their business, and how the free enterprise system related to them.

First Day of School








The A-Team:
