- Check to make sure items are correct on transcript
 - Name
 - Address
 - Credits
- Service hours are now on the transcript
- Check graduation requirements 28.5
- Copy of profile included with transcript to all colleges
- ACT/SAT Tests are not displayed on transcript
- All transcript requests will go through Naviance
 We are a non-ranking high school
- We are on a 4.5 scale



To Think About

- Clean–up social media sites Instagram, Twitter, etc…
- Email addresses choose an appropriate email name - do not use <u>hotbikinimomma@ymail.com</u> or <u>cooldude@gmail.com</u>
- Do not be afraid to email college reps
- Name used on testing information & applications needs to remain consistent
- Start organizing college information (Parents are great with helping organizing your info)
- Use Naviance to help with college search
- Take advantage of college admissions reps visits & local college fairs





Service Hours

- Need 100 hours by end of 1st semester Senior Year
- You need at least 50 hours and a plan for obtaining the rest if you are applying for membership to the National Honor Society
- If less than 100
 - Loss of Sr. privileges
 - Will not walk at graduation
- Service hours show a pattern of your likes and interests; they tell colleges/universities something about you
- Many scholarships/awards are directly related to service
- Community Service Hours are prorated based on years attending JPII
- 75% of your service hours before you return to school in your Senior year to have a Senior privilege.



National Honor Society

- Bylaws are in place and used to select its members – Mr. Jones
- GPA criteria: 3.75
- Students complete an application
- Need to have at least 50 hours (entered into MobielServe) of service completed with a plan for obtaining the remaining hours by end of 1st semester
- Watch demerits! There is an emphasis on character as well as GPA!
- Invitation to apply will be issued in mid-January 2023



PSAT/NMSQT

- October 15th.
- May need to split the start times for all students testing.
- Speak with Mrs. Ehemann if you need to borrow a laptop. Cannot use a chromebook!
- All juniors are tested in the same area of school; in classrooms of about 15-16 students
- Prepare for the SAT[®]
- Enter the National Merit[®] Scholarship Program & Other Scholarships
- See which AP[®] courses you might be ready for
- Get admission and financial aid information from colleges through Student Service Search

How to Avoid Running Out of Time on the SAT/ACT

Consider applying these time-management techniques to maximize your score on the SAT or ACT:

- Dedicate just 60 seconds to each math question.
- Skim passages and question stems first, then reread as needed.
- Go with your gut on the language sections.
- Practice and take a prep class

Types of Colleges & Universities



Public

Funded by local and state governments (your taxes!)

• Offer lower tuition rates than private colleges for students who reside in the state where the college is located

Example:

University of Alabama

Total Cost = \$33,452

Direct/Indirect Cost

VS

Private

- Funding is mainly through tuition, fees and private sources.
- Private donations can sometimes provide generous financial aid packages

Example:

Spring Hill College

Total Cost = \$34,822.00

Direct/Indirect Cost

Vanderbilt University Direct/Indirect Cost Cost \$98,426



Indirect and Direct Cost of College

- Direct costs are billed costs that are paid directly to the institution, and typically include your student's tuition, fees, housing, and meal plan charges.
- Indirect costs are student expenses associated with college attendance that are not paid directly to the institution, and may include your student's books and supplies, travel, living, other bills, etc.

Community Colleges

- Offer associate's degrees designed to transfer to a four year college/university
- Offers associate's degrees and certificates designed to prepare students for a vocational/technical career
- Most schools have open admissions but may have required prerequisites for specific programs.
- Typically public colleges with affordable tuition and options for students to be full or part-time
- Often career driven.

Liberal Arts Colleges

- Offers a broad base of courses in the liberal arts which includes: literature, humanities, languages, mathematics, life sciences
- Offers mostly undergraduate degrees
- Most are private and lead to a four-year bachelor's degree
- Traditionally emphasize interactive instruction
- Have smaller enrollment, class size, and higher student-teacher ratio than universities
- Prepare students for a variety of careers or graduate study



Universities

- Larger schools offering more majors and degrees options than colleges
- Students can obtain bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees
- Tends to be more research based
- Larger classes that may be taught by graduate assistants or TA's
- Contain several colleges within the university such as colleges of liberal arts, engineering, or health sciences.



Art Colleges and Conservatories

- Focus is on visual, performing, and/or creative arts
- Applications may require a portfolio of your work
- Conservatories place an emphasis on practical performance training and experience, not academics.
- Lower number of general education requirements in both the art colleges and conservatories



Military Academies

- Five Academies: Naval, Air Force, Army, Merchant Marines, & Coast Guard
- High standard for admission physical and academics (Most rigorous courses & grades)
- Must be nominated by a senator, congressman/woman, VP or the President of U.S.
- Military service required upon graduation
- Tuition is free!
- Less freedom than other schools and incorporates physical training and discipline



Special Programs or Accommodations

While colleges and universities in the United States are required by law to offer certain services for students with disabilities, these services only guarantee the bare minimum regarding academic assistance and accommodations.

What to think about as you explore different types of colleges:

- The pro's and con's of each type of school
- Your learning style and where you will thrive academically
- Graduation rates (four year, six year)
- Job placement Where are graduates getting jobs and what employers are recruiting at the school?
- Overall, how does each school fit with your goals and needs
- Try to have college list (8-10 schools) ready by the end of Junior year



Student's Role

- Should be initiating the college search
- Should be the ones asking questions at college visits or college fairs
- Should email a thank you to a rep after meeting with them
- Speak with Mrs. Cobb if you need help
- Be proactive!

Parent's Role

- Be supportive, try not to nag
- Help student make a calendar with important dates
- Have that financial discussion now, if you haven't already
- Be careful of forcing your or their siblings alma mater upon your child, it might not be the right fit for them
