I am in awe!

I have the privilege of working with the 20-member G-CASE Executive Board as they plan and participate in professional learning opportunities, conferences, webinars, presentations, Academies, Institutes, partnerships, GAEL events, legislative actions, and many, many other activities to support G-CASE and YOU.

This group meets for a three-day summer retreat and at least two other times during the year to review statistics, go over survey results, set the budget, and examine maps (locations of our members, places where Professional Learning is held, systems with people who attended conferences, etc.) to support the evidence-based decisions they will make for the new school year. And best of all, this group LISTENS. They listen to you to guide G-CASE in offering timely, needed professional learning. They listen while helping set legislative priorities. This year, your Executive Board carefully proposed issues and speakers for the Special Education Development Academy (ADA). G-CASE is dedicated to supporting you, and we sincerely need and value your experience, involvement, and expertise.



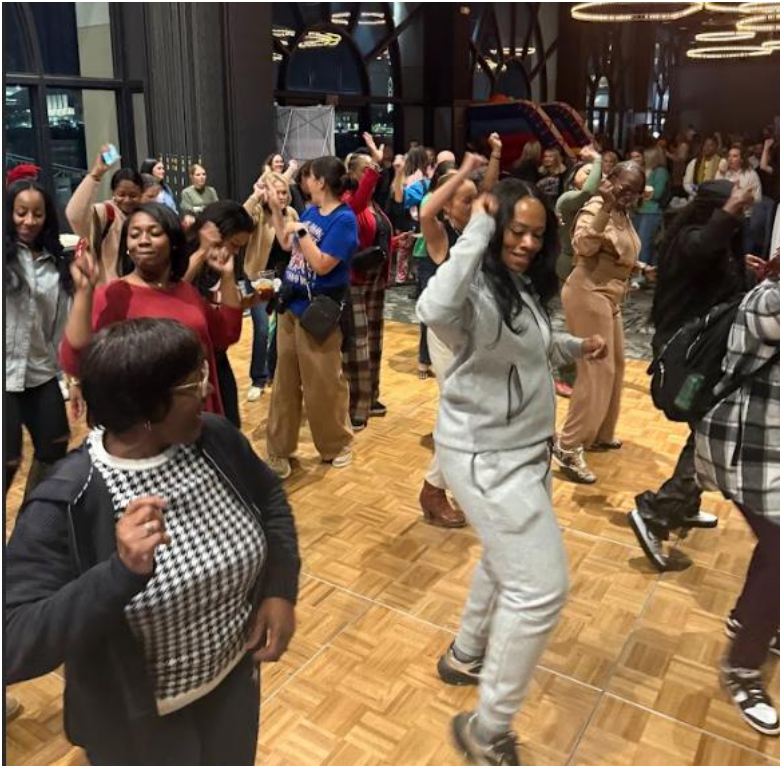

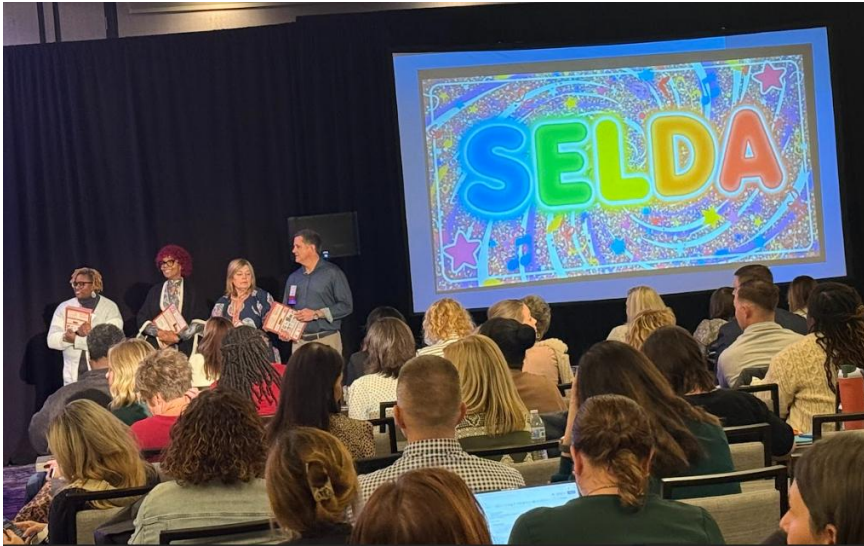

In just a few years, Mrs. Freeman has demonstrated a powerful commitment to equity, excellence, and empowerment for students with disabilities. Her leadership has transformed systems, built collaborative school and community partnerships, and improved outcomes for students and families across her district.

Elevating Special Education Systems

Mrs. Freeman has streamlined Pulaski County's special education program to ensure greater efficiency, clarity, and alignment with student needs. Under her guidance, staff are equipped with up-to-date legal knowledge, instructional strategies, and best practices. She re-delivers key professional learning from across the state to ensure her team is prepared, informed, and empowered to represent the system's vision.

Her efforts have led to **increased student assessment scores, greater IEP meeting engagement, and stronger access to appropriate accommodations**. Local leaders have recognized her extraordinary impact on system-wide improvement.

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Student-Centered Innovation

A champion for student empowerment, Mrs. Freeman expanded the **ASPIRE Ambassadors Program** to include student leaders from elementary, middle, and high schools. These ambassadors are trained to self-advocate and, in turn, support their peers—a program that continues to grow under her guidance.

She also played a key role in establishing a **work-based training program** at Hawkinsville High School. By partnering students with departments across the school, the program equips them with essential life and employment skills to support post-graduation success.

Early Learning and Inclusion

Understanding the importance of early intervention, Mrs. Freeman led efforts to begin serving the **three-year-old population** in an inclusive pre-kindergarten setting. This move reflects her strong belief in equitable, collaborative approaches from the earliest stages of learning.

Her leadership has ensured that 100% of students with disabilities in Pulaski County participated in state assessments, met LRE targets, and avoided high suspension rates—clear markers of her inclusive, effective approach.

Professional Leadership and State Engagement

Mrs. Freeman is a standout leader in Georgia-CASE. She serves as **Co-Chair of the Legislative Committee**, is an active participant on the **G-CASE Advisory and Executive Boards**, and has attended and contributed to more than **two dozen statewide professional learning events** since 2022.

She is also a graduate of both the **Special Education Administrator Development Academy (ADA)** and the **Special Education Leadership Development Academy**, where her final project—“**The Road to Transition**”—has already had a measurable impact, leading to a 100% postsecondary engagement rate for FY24 graduates with disabilities.

A Trusted Community Leader

Outside the school system, Mrs. Freeman plays an active role in the **Family Connection Collaborative**, **Heart of Georgia Transition Alliance**, and even serves as a Unit Clerk at

Bleckley County Memorial Hospital, where she supports individuals in crisis. Her leadership extends to planning events such as the **ICAN Conference** and the **Champion Awards Gala**, and she is a familiar, supportive presence at school and community events alike.

Empowering a Future of Possibilities

Lynn Freeman is more than a rising star—she is a force for positive change in special education. Her work represents the very best of what early-career administrators can achieve, combining vision, compassion, and a relentless commitment to students. 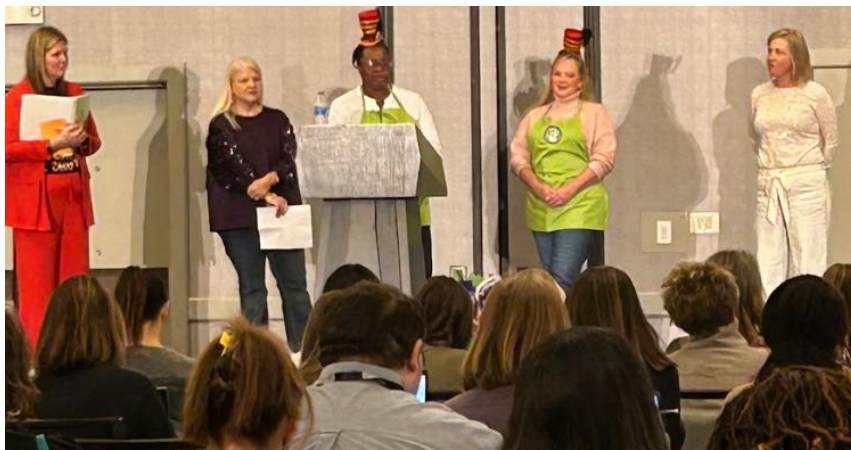

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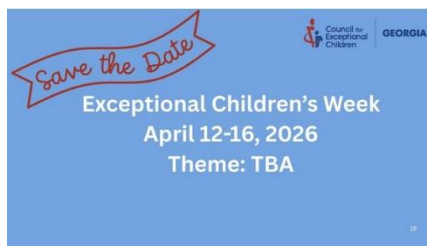

G-CASE Call for Nominations for Officers

The deadline to nominate strong supporting G-CASE members for officer positions on the G-CASE Executive Board for the next school year is January 10, 2026. 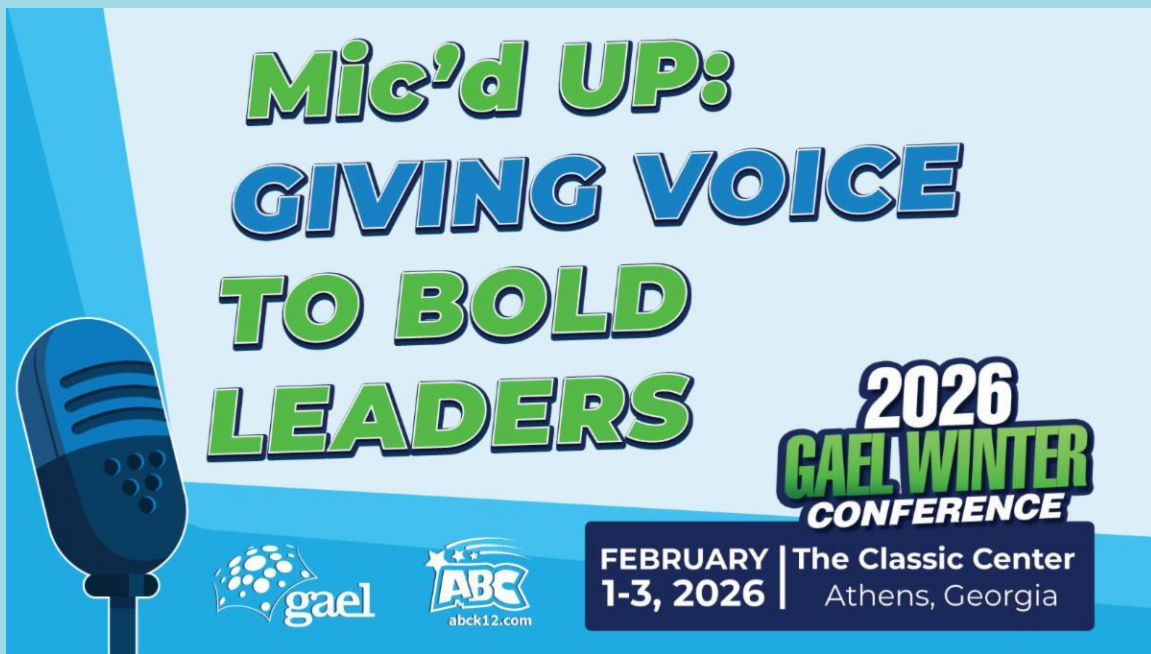

2026 GAEL Legislative Priorities

GAEL and the affiliate/associate organizations (GSSA/GAESP/GAMSP/GASSP/GACIS/G-CASE/GASPA/SSTAGE/GELFA), along with PAGE and GSBA, work together each year on current legislative priorities, as we have found strength in numbers when advocating for public education at the Gold Dome. The GAEL Legislative Committee (made up of representatives from each affiliate/associate organization – Dr. Ashly Hunter and Lynn Freeman, co-chairs of the G-CASE Legislative Committee, represented G-CASE) met numerous times this fall and presented the legislative priorities at the October 23 GAEL Board of Directors meeting. The legislative priorities presented below were approved by the GAEL Board for the 2026 Legislative Session:

Reduce Chronic Absenteeism

Fund school social workers at a ratio of one social worker per 1,856 students and expand mental health grants to elementary schools.

Partner to Support State Health Benefit Plan for Non-Certified Staff

Renew the partnership between local districts and the state to provide health insurance for non-certified staff by funding 25% of the per-member-per-month cost of the SHBP for non-certified staff for all districts and up to 50% of these costs for low-wealth districts.

Strengthen the Educator Workforce

Reauthorize Return to Work via HB 372 and/or SB 150 to sustain its impact;

Revise the end date of the Teacher Tax Credit to December 31, 2030, incorporate special education, math, reading, writing, and English language arts in the definition of high-need subject areas, and allow school districts to determine their high-need subject areas.

Provide need-based stipends to students who are enrolled in an undergraduate or graduate teacher education program approved by the Georgia Professional Standards Commission and are participating in student teaching as required by their teacher education program.

2026 G-CASE Early Career Special Education Administrator Award

NOMINATION:

Each year, G-CASE presents the Early Career Special Education Administrator Award to a Special Education Administrator with five or fewer years of experience administering special education programs and/or services who has demonstrated exemplary leadership and service. This individual characterizes resourcefulness, compassion, and professionalism as a leader.

Qualifications:

The Candidate must:

- be a current Special Education Director in his/her first five years administering special education programs and/or services who exemplifies G-CASE and CASE's ethics, values, and standards
- be a member of G-CASE and CEC/CASE
- demonstrate exemplary leadership and service as a special education administrator
- show care and concern for students and families with disabilities
- contribute to the field of special education
- be actively involved in professional and community affairs
- be recognized as an outstanding leader in his/her local district and/or by the state

Nomination Requirements:

Nominations may be made by an individual or group as long as the nomination originates within the nominee's school system and the nomination form is endorsed by a current active member of G-CASE.

- Completed nomination form (Next Page)
- Narrative detailing exemplary service as a Special Education Director (two-page max)
- Three letters of support
