

Project AWARE Training

Project AWARE recently held a two-day training session focused on verbal de-escalation techniques for supporting children and young people in crisis. The session was based on the LifeSpace Crisis Intervention model, a therapeutic approach designed to manage chronic crisis behaviors and turn difficult moments into learning opportunities. Participants, including educators, counselors, and school leaders, gained valuable crisis management strategies. Project AWARE plans to continue offering these sessions to provide evidence-based tools to improve support for students with disruptive or self-defeating behaviors and to foster a positive learning environment.



Social Morker Morkshop



Six school social workers attended the 2nd Annual Lead School Social Worker workshop hosted by the Georgia Department of Education's Office of Whole Child Supports. The event featured expert speakers and focused on key issues impacting students. Topics included grief support for students and strategies for coping with loss, as well as using data to address chronic absenteeism. The workshop provided valuable professional development, equipping social workers with tools to enhance student support and well-being.

Scoliosis Screening

Georgia law mandates annual scoliosis screenings for public school children in at least two grades during early adolescence. Scoliosis is defined as a spine curvature over 10 degrees, and signs can include uneven shoulder height, a protruding shoulder blade, uneven waist folds, or varying arm hang distance. In collaboration with the Health Department, school nurses will screen 6th and 8th grade students from February 3rd-14th. Approximately 3,700 students will be tested. Early detection is crucial to prevent future issues related to posture and spine compression. The Health Department will follow up with parents whose students present symptoms.
