Early Childhood Education and Educational Leadership, at NAU just across the same location, where I first experienced at it felt like growing up as a Native American kid in this environment of discrimination and social Injustice.

I retired eight years ago and moved to Page, AZ to be close to my grandchildren. With the closure of Navajo Generation Plant the family was transferred to Phoenix three years ago. But, my husband and I will continue to stay in Page to spend our golden years.


















Desert View Students Break Records at Track and Field Day
