- In accordance with the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act, service dogs1 (hereinafter 1 referred to as service animals) are permitted for use by individuals with disabilities on district property 2
- 3
- and in district facilities provided the individuals and their animals meet the requirements and
- responsibilities covered in this policy. 4
- When an individual with a disability seeks to bring a service animal into a district facility, the district is 5
- entitled to ask the individual if the animal is required because of a disability and what work or task the 6
- animal has been trained to perform.² The district is not entitled to ask for documentation that the animal 7
- has been properly trained, but the individual bringing the animal into a district facility will be held 8
- accountable for the animal's behavior. 9
- Any service animal brought into a district facility must be trained to take a specific action when needed 10
- to assist the person with a disability. Service animal means any dog that is individually trained to do 11
- work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability, including a physical, sensory, 12
- psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability. Other species of animals, whether wild or domestic, 13
- trained or untrained, are not service animals for the purposes of this definition. The work or tasks 14
- performed by a service animal must be directly related to the individual's disability. Examples of work 15
- or tasks include, but are not limited to, assisting individuals who are blind or have low vision with 16
- navigation and other tasks, alerting individuals who are deaf or hard of hearing to the presence of people 17 18 or sounds, providing non-violent protection or rescue work, pulling a wheelchair, assisting an individual
- during a seizure, alerting individuals to the presence of allergens, retrieving items such as medicine or 19
- the telephone, providing physical support and assistance with balance and stability to individuals with 20
- mobility disabilities, and helping persons with psychiatric and neurological disabilities by preventing or 21
- 22 interrupting impulsive or destructive behaviors.
- The crime deterrent effects of an animal's presence and the provision of emotional support, well-being, 23
- 24 comfort, or companionship do not constitute work or tasks for the purposes of this policy.
- Individuals with disabilities shall be permitted to be accompanied by their service animals in all areas of 25
- a public entity's facilities where members of the public, participants in services, programs or activities, 26
- 27 or invitees, as relevant, are allowed to go.
- A service animal shall be under the control of its handler. A service animal shall have a harness, leash, 28
- or other tether, unless either the handler is unable because of a disability to use a harness, leash, or other 29
- tether, or the use of a harness, leash, or other tether would interfere with the service animal's safe, 30
- effective performance of work or tasks, in which case the service animal must be otherwise under the 31
- 32 handler's control by means of voice control, signals, or other effective means.

- 1 A service animal will be removed from the premises if:
- 2 (1) The animal is out of control and the animal's handler does not take effective action to control it; or
- 3 (2) The animal is not housebroken.
- 4 (3) The animal's presence would fundamentally alter the nature of the service, program or activity.³
- 5 If the district excludes a service animal due to the reasons listed above, the district shall give the
- 6 individual with a disability the opportunity to participate in the service, program, or activity without
- 7 having the service animal on the premises.
- 8 The District and its staff are not responsible for the care or supervision of a service animal brought onto
- 9 district property or into district facilities by an individual with a disability.
- 10 The District shall not ask or require an individual with a disability to pay a surcharge, even if people
- accompanied by pets are required to pay fees, or to comply with other requirements generally not
- 12 applicable to people without pets.
