
# Beginning of the Day Procedure



#### TES Principal Report May 2020

#### Students:

Remote/Distance Learning: TES students are working hard on their google classroom assignments. Teachers have organized it on a daily agenda model. Each class has a classroom meet time where they socialize and share what is happening in their world, as well as teachers making daily announcements. Students also have an additional time they can log in and meet with the teacher to get help with specific questions. We have also set aside time for those who need a bit more assistance and need one-on-one assistance.

IRI: Grades k-3 are taking their spring Idaho Reading Indicator (IRI) at home this month. The results will not be used in our accountability measures with the State but we do need to show compliance in participation. Teachers will also be able to review the data from the each month to see where some strengths and weaknesses are at this time.

Special Education Services: Special education services and IEP meeting are being delivered as well through google meets, telehealth, and zoom.

End of the Month Assembly: Students were able to enjoy a touch of our regular celebrations through their Google Classroom. Students and staff delivered the shout outs and Trojan All Star winners through recorded video.

#### Staff:

Staff is continuing the two way communication with families and students. We are monitoring daily their needs, and what is working on their end. So far, we are on track with connecting with all of our families.

Other staff members in the building are packing up personal supplies and belongings of each student. The plan is to deliver the materials by bus at the end of May and retrieve library books and chromebooks as well.

Evaluations: All certificated evaluations have been completed.

Distance Learning Credits: Teachers are taking advantage of the opportunity to apply the work they have been doing to learn and deliver the remote learning through LCSC.

Conferences: March 10th & 11th were very well attended. We had 96% overall.

Remote/Distance Learning: This month students have started their distance learning. TES started with one week of instructional materials in the form of a packet. We are now paperless and on Google Classroom, kindergarten through sixth grade. Each student logs in daily to see their agenda and activities. Google Meets are set up for each class to teach them the software process and see their classmates.

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#### **TES Principal Report September 2019**

#### Students:

<u>Back to School Night:</u> Troy Elementary hosted our annual <u>Back to School Night Dinner</u> sponsored by the TES Parent Group.
