CLASS HISTORY

FOREWORD

I am very sorry that I could not begin this history in the customary manner about green little Freshmen, but we have never been considered green, since arriving in the Lake Wales High, having lost all signs of greenness in the eighth grade.

I have a friend, a great artist, whose name is Memory. All who have ever lived have viewed his wonderfully realistic pictures, full of sorrow, happiness and mirth.

I visited him the other day. After looking over pictures of school years long gone by, he noticed that I was looking quite mystified, for the past four years were not in view. So he quickly led me to a secluded place. He opened a door and I found myself in a very pleasant room, upon each wall was a picture. He explained to me that the reason for the seclusion was because he realized that these would be the dearest of my youth, although I could not fully appreciate it now. The four pictures were of the class of '26, four years in the Lake Wales High.

The first was of the freshman year of 1922-23, in which my beloved classmates and I were the setting, showing twenty of us. The new faces were those of Margaret O'Sullivan, Louise Clothey, Sarah Kissane, Evelyn Parrish, Edwin Emory, David Thomas, Donald Williams, William Kissane and Omer Doud, and to our delight we had Charles Donoho from last years' graduating class, who was taking a post-graduate course. Mrs. Ellis had been chosen again for our class teacher, for we loved her and knew that she understood us. The operetta, "Love Pirates of Hawaii," given by our class, proved a great success. The chicken perleau picnic at the beginning of the holidays was enjoyed by all. The Junior-Senior banquet was enjoyed, too, for we were the entertained, a new experience. The joy on each face when our class rings arrived cannot well be expressed. The "Orange and Black," a weekly paper, was published by the high school during this, our fourth year. The success of this paper was largely due to the members of the Senior class, who really controlled and edited this paper, as well as receiving substantial backing from the citizens of Lake Wales. Burnice Johnson acted as editor-in-chief, while Louise Clothey as literary editor added a grace and dignity, and a journalistic tone which would have been credit to a higher institution of learning. Lake Wales was one of the few high schools in the state publishing a weekly paper. The picture presented the last few months flitting rapidly past with the class gazing rather reluctantly upon the few fleeting moments granted them as Seniors. Out of the confusion of the last attendant moments, clung to so tenaciously, appeared many varied and beautiful pictures of true and lasting friendships, the expression and manifestation of maturer and higher characters developed, interspersed here and there with a social and scholastic ray of duties to perform and functions to attend, all leading grandly forward to the ultimate goal—commencement and graduation. With the sun on the horizon casting shimmering shadows and dimming lights casting a rosy hue over a stage encircled by serious classmates, each eagerly receiving in turn a ribbon-tied scroll from Mr. Donoho, and then the last sad music of farewell, as my friends and classmates of four years passed down the aisle to enter our school no more as students. Then just as the leader was about to pass out of the picture the sun rose in a still greater blaze of glory and each upturned face reflected the light of hope and ambition in this, this end of the artist's picture and the beginning of a still greater and broader existence well-armed by their Alma Mater to plunge into stern Reality and emerge strengthened and unscathed.

Review of Football Season

About fifteen men answered the call for candidates for the football team upon the opening of the second year of football for Lake Wales High. Our team was still green and inexperienced when they met Mulberry, our first opponent, and after forty minutes of furious battling with the ball in Mulberry territory the greater part of the time, the game ended in a scoreless tie. This was considerable improvement over the previous year.

Our next game was with Ft. Meade, another good team that had defeated us the year before. A touchdown following a blocked punt and a safety counted eight points for Ft. Meade while Lake Wales was held scoreless.

A shaken, bruised and broken team made the long trip to Bradenton the following Friday to meet the Manatee Buddies and suffered the worst defeat of the season, 32 to 0.

Our next game with the objective of the entire season, the annual clash with our hereditary enemy, Winter Haven. A week's hard drill, new plays, and an unbending spirit proved too much for anything Winter Haven could do, Lake Wales winning 12 to 0, with Walker starring at end runs and broken field running, and Hall showing rare ability in line plunging.

The next game was a return engagement with Winter Haven on their grounds, and as both teams knew the other's plays, it was just a question of fighting spirit which decided the game. Lake Wales put over a lone touchdown, Darling carrying the ball on a double criss-cross, the final score being 7-0 for Lake Wales.

With two straight victories to their credit, the Highlanders were anxious to take on bigger game, and after a 19-0 victory over Haines City, traveled to Kissimmee to meet the Cowboys. This was the most bitterly fought game of the season, Lake Wales winning 19-13.

The next game was with Sebring, a new and inexperienced team, and after a preliminary skirmish the Highlanders piled up 45 points in thirty minutes of playing time.

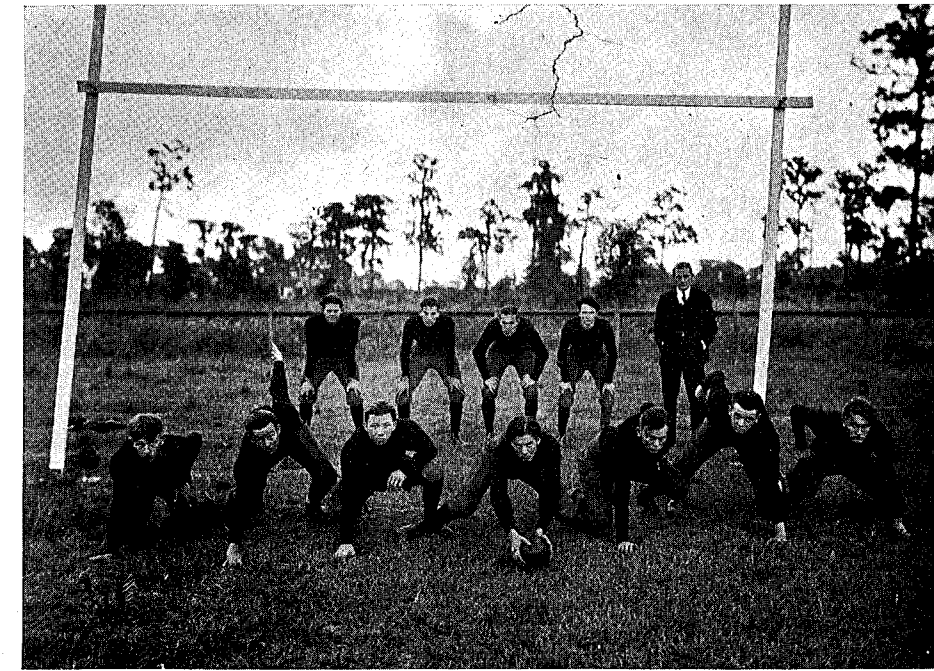
The last game of the season was our annual Turkey Day clash with the Sarasota Sailors, who had defeated us the year before. A fine defensive game, coupled with the line smashing of Woolfolk and Hall, and the end runs of Walker outranked the Sailors, Walker going over for the only touchdown of the game. Score was 7-0.

Thus ended Lake Wales' second and highly successful football season with six victories, one tie and two defeats, garnering 109 points to 52 for our opponents. The team was the undisputed champion of the Ridge, an exalted position for a two-year team.

Captain Woolfolk at quarterback managed the team on the field in a brainy way, showing exceptional ability in generalship, and was always good for five yards of tackle.

Hall was the best line plunger we have seen in scholastic circles and a fine defensive back, while Walker has thrilled the spectators time after time by his beautiful dodging and twisting.

Dopler and Darling were deadly men under punts and with their two step-cut were wing men invincible. The entire team played like veterans and deserve great credit for their excellent showing and express their appreciation to the citizens of Lake Wales, who backed them at every stage of the game, and in particular to Art Hutchens and Dick Taylor, two ex-college stars who were largely responsible for the successful season.
