Big Idea: How can we learn from our past?

Ask your child how this week's reading selection helps him or her answer this question.

This week's reading selection: The Cherokee: Gold and Tears

Summary: This selection gives an overview of Cherokee history with a focus on early interactions with European settlers, adoption of European culture, and the eventual forced migration west that has come to be known as the Trail of Tears.

Essential Questions: What impact have Native Americans had on this country? How were early Native American communities forced to change?

DISCUSS with your child what it means to treat people fairly and without discrimination.
