Recently I had one of those days. It was day that I had a list of things



Fall Sports Recap

Nebraska Christian's fall sports teams recently finished their seasons with winning records and individual accomplishments.

Cross Country wrapped up its season at the state meet in Kearney on October 23. We had four qualifiers: seniors Katie Cumpston and Nolan Kohmetscher, junior Alyssa Prettyman, and sophomore Brennan Nokelby. Cumpston (5th), Kohmetscher (3rd), and Nokelby (7th) all placed at the meet and were selected to the Nebraska All-State Team. Both the boys' and girls' teams placed first

at the inaugural Goldenrod Conference Meet, with Cumpston and Kohmetscher winning individual titles.

The football team's season

also ended on October 23. Due to enrollment numbers, the team was ineligible for the state playoffs, but it posted an impressive 6-2 record, losing only the first and last games.

The volleyball team had anoth-

Several things have happened recently that have me thinking about the undeniable truth that I am growing

older. Less than a month ago, my oldest daughter turned 30, and less than one month from now I will turn 55. Both Kentucky Fried Chicken in Sioux City, Iowa, and Pizza Hut in Central City, Neb., have assigned me senior citizen status.

These aren't the first clues. There was the guy at my dad's funeral who shook my hand and said, "You must be Danny's brother." There was that time when I was helping a friend move, and I noticed a young man going out of his way to make sure I didn't have to handle anything too heavy. More recently, a couple of our current parents concluded that one of my uncles, whom they know very well, must be my brother. The truth is undeniable. I am growing older, and yet denial comes so easily.

I may continue to deny the increasing signs of my approaching "old age," but one thing I am 100% sure of is that, some day, I will not only be "old"; I will be dead. The Bible makes that truth very clear. The writer of Hebrews tells us in chapter 9 verse 7, "And just as it is appointed to man to die once and after that comes judgement…" (ESV)

My 8th grade math class is another little hint. Nearly a third of the students in that class are children of my former students. We have been opening class with sections from the first few chapters of Paul's letter to

the Romans. Paul makes perfectly clear in the first three chapters of his book that no one has any chance of standing before God at the judgment and being justified by their works. Like growing older, this is an inevitable truth. Like growing older, many people never come to terms with this truth until they are dead.

In the midst of Paul's discussion of man's unjustifiable condition, he speaks often of the gospel. In chapter one, he declares it to be the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes. In chapter two, he says that part of his gospel is that God judges the secrets of men by Christ Jesus. In Romans chapter three, he lays out the good news very clearly and gives some guidance to those who would consider the inevitability of death and judgement before they die.

"For by works of the law no human being will be justified in his sight, since through the law comes knowledge of sin. But now the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law, although the law and the prophets bear witness to it—the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus, whom God put forward as a propitiation by his blood, to be received by faith." (Romans 3:20-25a, ESV)

My prayer for all of you is that even if you are now or eventually do struggle with the truth of getting older, you will not attempt to deny

been able to work on the things that I had designated as important for the day. I didn't have much of anything to show for my time. Thankfully, I still had a few days to complete all of the things that I had hoped to finish that afternoon. The distractions I faced that afternoon ultimately didn't keep me from finishing my to-do list or have a known eternal impact, but they did remind me of Mary and Martha.

In Luke 10:38-42, we are shown Mary and her sister Martha. Mary stayed focused on the most important thing—Jesus—while Martha concerned herself with other things. Mary had her priorities in the right order, and her attention that afternoon was focused on something lasting, not the busyness and everyday distractions that Martha fell victim to. Jesus said, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things, but one thing is nec-

essary. Mary has chosen the good portion, which will not be taken away from her." (Luke 10:41-42, ESV)

This is the time of year that many people struggle to keep their eyes on Jesus, as Mary did, and instead, like Martha, look at some worthwhile distractions. Christmas is when we celebrate the birth of Christ, Emmanuel—God with us. Even though this is the focus for Christians, we have many good things that often compete for our attention. Often it's the busyness of Christmas and family itself that pulls at us. As Jesus reminded Martha, she was anxious and troubled about many things, but not the most important thing. Do you allow anxiety and worry to distract you from keeping Christ at the center of Christmas?

This year, be intentional with where you place your attention, and keep Christ at the center of Christmas.

Cumpston Named National Merit Semi-Finalist



When I look at Wikipedia there is a definition at the top that says *change* is "the process of becoming different."

Webster's Dictionary gives us a few definitions:

- · To become different
- To make (someone or something) different
- To become something else

We know that God is in the *change* business...he wants us to be different than we were yesterday or last week or last year, and he promises to do that if and when we are willing.

Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work."

Verses 10-14 go on to say: "Now he who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will also supply and increase your store of seed and will enlarge the harvest of your righteousness. You will be enriched in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generos-

ity will result in thanksgiving to God. This service that you perform is not only supplying the needs of God's people, but is overflowing in many expressions of thanks to God. Because of the service by which you have proved yourselves, others will praise God for the obedience that accompanies your confession of the Gospel of Christ, and for your generosity in sharing with them and with everyone else. And in their prayers for you their hearts will go out to you, because of the surpassing grace God has given to you."

Would you take a minute and read back through these words from the Apostle Paul?

I don't understand everything he is saying here, but it seems that God *changes* a lot of hearts through obedience to Him when His child sows generously!

Myers, Flynn Selected to All-State Chorus


