



I was born in the fall of 1955. Coach John Conzemius had just completed his fifth season at the helm of the Wadena High School football team. Coach retired after the 1981 season. That spring my first child was born. A thirty-one-year coaching career spanning all or parts of four decades. To me, and countless others, John Conzemius was synonymous with "Wadena football." Many of his players went on to compete at the college level including one who was All-Big 10 for the Minnesota Gophers and later, an NFL All-Pro for the Pittsburgh Steelers. 
The "WHS Football Scrapbooks," for each decade of his tenure, are dedicated to coach Conzemius, a great teacher of both the game of football and of the lessons of life.

The Beginning

The Wadena High School football program started in 1903. The high school athletic teams' nickname of "Indians" came from the town's namesake, the great Ojibwe Chief Wadena, who lived in the later part of the 19th century.

In the 1980's the Wadena and Deer Creek school districts merged and the new WDC athletic teams' nickname was changed to the "Wolverines."

The pages that follow are about the history of WHS football in the 1970's. In addition to this "Scrapbook" there are three separate "WHS Football Scrapbooks." One for the 1950's and one for the 1960's. The first "WHS Football Scrapbook", released in the fall of 2022, covers the first five decades, from 1900-1949.

Rosters, records, team, and individual achievements are provided where possible. Accuracy has been a goal but cannot be guaranteed. Feedback to provide missing information, or to point out inaccurate information, is encouraged. Old memorabilia including team and individual player photos would also be appreciated.

WHS Gridders Sting Jackets 26-0

The Wadena Indians, on a perfect fall evening, buzzed to Perham, Minnesota attacked the Yellow jacket hive, and came away with all the goodies, a 26 to 0 victory.

On offense two of the peskiest wasps in the Yellowjackets hive all evening were Don Schmidt and Dave Larson.

Donnie scheed two touchdowns, picked up 95 yards in 24 carries while Dave in 2 tries carried for 75 yards and 2 and 0. One coming on a 58 yard perfectly thrown pass from quarterback Scott Welson.

The defense again came up with an outstanding performance as it shut out the Yellowjackets competely in the first half as far as rushing yardage is.concerned. The final result in total yardage was Wadena 301, Perham 99. The defense led by the middle of the line. Bob Larson, Dave Lindberg and Phil Uselman contained the Yellowjackets. In the first quarter Steve Skalisky picked up a Perham fumble and raced 23 yards to the '3 yard line when he was tackled from behind. Don Schmidt then pushed the ball across.

The second quarter saw Schmidty hitting the line play after play and then from the counter with Dave Larson rack (yards to pay dirt. Joe Lorenzen kicked the extra point for a 13 to 0 lead at half.

In the third stanza, the Indians staged a long drive which was capped when Don Schmidt ran 7 yards for a TD. Flyers' Defense Rugged

The score may suggest an easy victory but this was far from the truth as the Little Falls Flyers air show at Wadena on Friday evening September 25 proved to be one tough demonstration.

The Flyers' defense held Wadena to just 2 yards on the ground and 23 yards through the air in the first half. The second half was not much better as the Indians could only manage 7 first downs 52 yards rushing and 61 passing for the entire game. The Indian defense also was its stubborn self as the Flyer were held to 89 yards along the ground, but true to their name they picked up 126 yards through the air on 7 of 18 pass completion for 12 first downs and 215 yards total.

During the opening kickoff to Little Falls Don Schmidt got tapped just below the knee and the bruise put him out of the game for the remainder of the evening. Donnie had been averaging 100 plus yards per game. This injury inspired Donnies buddy Dan Carpenter as on the 6th play of the evening "Carp" picked a Little Falls fumble off in mid air and raced 35 yards for first blood. Joe Lorenzon hit the extra point and with 9:32 to go in the first quarter the Indians led 7 to 0. Approximately one minute later Mark Vierkant decided to get into the act as he intercepted a Kevin Opatz aerial and the Indians took over in Flyer territory. In just 4 plays one a 17 yard pass to Steve Skalisky, . Scott Nelson

engineered a drive that found Mike Johnson hitting paydirt with 7:02 to go in the first quarter. Joe again converted and the Indians moved in from 14 to zip.

From this point on the Indians had tough going. The Flyers put 6 points on the score board in second quarter on Kevin Opation5 yard quarterback draw and at intermission the Indians were on top 14 to 6. The third quarter found the Flyers scoring with 4:46 to go as Phil DeRoiseir ended a 25 yard drive with a 8 yard run on the 6th play. A p 2 was incomplete and the Indians work was cut out very plainly as the score stood 14 to 12. ' The Indian defense stood the test and a test it was as the Flyers had the ball for 57 plays and the Indians controlled the pigskin only 19 times. Duck hunting started on Saturday, October 3, but the Wadena Indians "went a hunting" another type of bird on Friday night.

The result was very satisfying but the hunt was of the utmost difficulty. The Indians tried to bring down their limit of Aitkin Gobblers and unloaded all barrels full flast but the result was in doubt until the horn sounded.

The Wadena Indians gained a slight edge in the statistics 11 to 5 in first downs, and 199 yards to 128 yards in total offense. The Indians at the close of the first quarter put together one of the few sustained drives of the game.

They marched 46 yards in 7 plays, 20 yards of which Scott Nelson hit Mark Vierkant with the only pass completion of the game, and then Dave Larson hit paydirt with a 14 yard counter play with 1:08 to go. defense rose to new heights as the



WHS Indians Blank 'Shakey' Aitkin 14-0



WHS Indians Trip Park Rapids 15-0


★ ★ Tabery Gains 137

For the second week in a row the defense besides not allowing a point did not let the opposing team anywhere near the goal line.


Tom "Rug" Young, a few fellows from Little-Falls know him quite well now, led the attack with 12 individual tackles and 3 assists for 15 points.

The Indians and the Vikings may have battled in the 11th century in Minnesota but no battle then could have been as closely a contested affair than the one Friday evening in Pelican Rapids land.

The first quarter found both teams putting together only short drives and the total yardage rested 32 to 30 in favor of Pelican as the scoreboard read 0 to 0.

The Wadena Indians put something on the scoreboard first as Galen Bayer recovered a Pelican fumble on the Vikings' 24-yard line and four plays later Gerald Stover rambled 9 yards to score.

Just as the 3rd period was ending after a fine 44 punt return by Mark Komula this set the Indians up for another score. Eight running plays and one

passing play later Gerald Stover again ran across the goal line from 3 yards out Although the pass was complete the Vikings stopped the try for 2 points and Wadena held a shaky 13 to 8 lead as the 3rd stanza ended. Tom Hamerlinck's big toe sailed the ball into the end zone and the Vikings had to start from their own 20. Like the long trip from Norway to Minnesota and just as steady the Vikings pushed 80 yards in 11 plays as Johnson blasted over from 2 yards out.

The try for 2 failed and with 7:25 to go Pelican lead 14 to 13. Pelican had a short kick-off and Wadena moved to mid field as Mark Beckel ran the ball 13 yards straight ahead. The Indians put together a fine drive and moved what appeared to be in scoring territory.

Things looked bleak as the Indians lost the ball with about 2 minuts to go on the Viking 7 yard line. It appeared that the Vikings had the game safely tucked away when Jeff Reineccius sank their ship as he tackled quarterback John Lund 2-yards deep in the end zone for 2 points.

Four way battle seen in Mid-State

The 1973 Mid-State Conference football race, league coaches predict, will be a four-way battle.

Schools drawing mention as favorites include defending hampion Detroit Lakes, perennial titlist Crosby-Ironton, champion Detroit Aitkin and Little Falls.

After an opening 6-6 tie with Aitkin last year, Detroit Lakes reeled off five straight victories to claim its first clear-cut Mid-State grid title since it joined the conference in 1969-70. (Detroit Lakes and Wadena shared the crown with 5-1 records in 1969.)

The Laker championship of 1973 ended a two-year reign coach John Davies' Crosby-Ironton clubs Coaches around the league mention both Detroit Lakes and

in the title picture, but also feel that Little Falls and Aitkin -- who had junior dominated teams last fall -- will be in the thick of the race.

A summary of each of the seven Mid-State schools and how the coaches see the 1973 season follows (records in parenthesis are for 1972):

While coach Harlon Buisman lost eight offensive starters, he has 13 lettermen back, including all-conference players Greg Paulson and Pat Sullivan. "Our attitude has picked up as a result of last year and we hope to be fighting for the conference title," Buisman says. Other returning letter winners are end Keith Knutson, tekle Dave Rom, halfback Ed Hermel, halfback Paul Hoge, tackle halfback Ken Torgerson, guard Mark Swanson, end Terry DeSutter, guard Wayne Appel, guard Larry Goble, fullback Rock LaBounty and tackle Mark Lucck.

CROSBY-IRONTON (4-2 in conference and 4-5 overall) John Davies, who has directed the Rangers to one successful football season after another during his years at C-1, says Detroit Lakes "was the best team in the league in 1972 is the best in 1973 until some other team proves differently

"Aitkin has its blue chip athletes returning and Little Falls is going to be tough," Davies adds as he seeks to place his squad back on top the Mid-State standings.







With 2:54 to go in the first quarter Tom Hamerlinck kicked the pigskin through the uprights and the scoreboard registered 7 to zip.





Terry Pulju, Wadena linebacker was in on nine tackles and five assists against Long Prairie.



Indians rally to stopBreckenridge

Breckenridge's Cowboys controlled the first quarter running up a total of 110 yards in 20 plays on the ground against the Indians and scored one touchdown. Wadena had the ball for six plays and 16 yards in the first quarter in a non-conference battle of unbeatens at Breckenridge Friday afternoon.

The Cowboys scored with 7:19 to go in the first quarter as a 78-yard march in 13 plays. Cowboy quarterback Brady Lipp raced 10 yards around his right end for the score. Wadena's Jerry Hertel did a good job in turning Lipp inside other defenders were blocked out on the play. The kick for PAT failed and the Cowboys led, 6-0.

The Cowboys took the ball after an Indian drive failed in the early going of the second quarter and shoved it right down the throat of Wadena defense. Breckenridge's drive went 63 in 13 plays for a 12-0 advantage.

Halfback Doug Milbrandt with 9:57 to go in the half raced four yards for the touchdown. A running play was stopped, but it looked as if the Cowboys were on their way to a victory. John Hamerlinck's kick failed and with 7:22 to go in the first half the Indians trailed 6-12.

On third down or fourth down they converted to a first down all but once. The Indians completely shut the Cowboys out in the second half.

Breckenridge was unable to convert a first down from a third down situation in the second half. Wadena's defense was led by the linebackers Terry Pulju (14 tackles) Jim Carter (12) and Reg Hooten players Other (11). strengthening the second half defense were Keith Tabery, Steve Wallgren, Chuck Heins, Bud Engstrom and Phil Kraemer, Agile Nick Lun-dquist in the secondary intercepted two passes andknocked down a number of others. . eight tackles, intercepted a pass and picked up a fumble. While the Wadena defense did an outstanding job the second half the offense also





night. Scoring 14 points in each of the first and final quarters and matching the Lakers' lone TD in the second, Wadena dominated play throughout the contest. The Indians are now 2-1 in conference play and Detroit Lakes has a 2-2 mark. Senior quarterback Mark Condiff scored four of the Indians' five touchdowns, with halfback Dale Vierkant opening the scoring on a fiveyard run in the first period at 7:21. Vierkant finished the night with 181 yards rushing

and Condiff with 99 yards. Reggie Hooten and Ronald Olson were sidelined with injuries and did not see action against the Lakers. The Indians marched 67 yards with the opening kickoff to start their bid for a homecoming win. Wadena gained a 14-point advantage when the Indian defense forced a Laker punt midway through the first quarter. The Indians then marched 52 yards with quarterback Condiff going over from the one at 1:09.

Detroit Lakes jumped back in contention in the early going of the second quarter as the Lakers marched 61 yards mainly on the passing of quarterback Jeff Hanson. Gregg Johnson then scored from the one but the point after kick failed and Wadena led, 14-6.

Condiff's second TD came just prior to halftime to give local fans a 20-6 halftime advantage to crow about.

Neither team scored in the third period but Wadena's Condiff one-yard plunge gave the Indians a 26-6 lead. John Hamerlinck's kick for PAT was true and Wadena enjoyed a 27-6 margin. The Indians in seven plays carried for 65 yards and the TD.



The Indians' offense came alive in the third quarter moving for three successive touchdowns.







Indians compiled a total of 182 points to their opponents 111 in nine games during the 1975 season.

Wadena finished the season with a 7-2 record and a Mid-State conference 4-2 mark to finish in third place.

Wadena blanked its opening non-conference foe, Long Prairie, 20-0, and was shutout by Mid-State conference opponent Little Falls, 6-0.

The Indians' biggest scoring production was 41 points against the Crosby-Ironton Rangers. Park Rapids scored the most points, 33, against the Indians this season.

Waden's scored a total of 61 points in the fourth quarter in 1975. The Indians had a total of 46 points in the second quarter, 41 in the first and 34 in the third quarter.

The local varsity averaged 20.2 points per game to the opponent's 12.3 points. In total offense, Wadena averaged 278.6 yards per game while the opposition averaged 222 yards.

Halfback Dale Vierkant was the leading Indian rusher who averaged 6.2 yards per carry. He amassed 997 yards on the season. His longest gain was a 56-yard run against Aitkin in the final game of the season. Dale Vierkant's most yards gained in one game were 181 against Detroit Lakes.

Halfback Reg Hooten was the second leading Indian rusher with 636 yards in 114 attempts for a 5.6 average. His longest carry was 45 yards and the most yards he gained in one game was 149 against Detroit Lakes.

Wadena quarterback Mark Condiff netted 227 yards in 70 carries for a 3.2 yard average. Fullback Jeff Wynn gained 221 yards rushing in 43 attempts for a 5.1 yard average. His longest carry was 74 yards against Detroit Lakes. Terry Pulju, Wadena fullback, gained 46 yards in 13 carries for a 3.5 yard average.

The Indians passed 53 times, completed 30, for 316 yards. Their opponents passed 138 times completing 55 for 683 yards. nine passes for 100 yards, fullback Terry Pulju caught four for 66 yards, halfback Reg Hooten three for 105 yards, Dale Vierkant two for 16 yards, Ron Olson one for 25 yards and Lauren Lundquist one for four yards.

Nick Lundquist was credited with four pass interceptions, Ron Olson and Dan Kupfer two each, Jeff Wynn, Terry Pulju and Mark Condiff one each.







munity college. He has seen limited duty at defensive end as well, and is expected to be a strong starting candidate next year, according to defensive coordinator Dave Olson.







Wadena scored again on the third play with Burns breaking cross the goal line from the three. Hooten again kicked the extra point to put the pressure on Breck.


The Cowboys tried a pass on fourth and five when Pete Beckel came up with the crucial interception.





It's the same old refrain this fall in the Mid-State Conference, with Crosby-Ironton rated the favorite to win the football title.





Wadena's total offense equated 262 yards, 57 better than the Rangers.


Crosby-Ironton capitalized on several Wadena turnovers, which provided the winning margin.






HOMECOMING PASS. Wadena's Indians amassed 232 total yards in its homecoming game Friday night against Park Rapids. The Indians went to the air as





Coach Conzemius had high praise for his charges in defeat as the Indians gained twice as much yardage as in earlier





Wadena got back on track in the fourth quarter with linebacker Jeff Carlson's second interception of the night. Carlson returned the ball to the Indians' 39-yard line to



1980 summary of Wadena football

The Wadena Indians ended their 1980 football season with a 0-9 season record. Although the record shows no wins for the Indians, there were some outstanding performances by the players.

John Miles led the team in scoring with five of the teams ten touchdowns. Miles also led the team in kick-off returns with an excellent average of 39.2 yards. Miles was second in total rushing with 231 yards in 62 attempts.

Bob Pudas led the team in rushing with a fine 5.4 average per carry. Pudas also grabbed ten passes this year for 156 yards and led the Indians in punt returns with a ten yard average.



Conzemius resigns as Wadena grid coach after 31 years

John Conzemius, head football coach at Wadena high school for 31 years, has resigned from the position following Wadena's successful (5-4) grid season. He will, however, continue his roles as athletic director, assistant too the senior high principal and supervisor of driver education.

During his 31-year reign as head football coach, Conzemius compiled an impressive of 145 wins-118 losses and nine ties. He directed the Wadena football teams to Mid-State Conference tilles in 1961, 1962 and 1969. His best season as a coach came in 1961 when he guided the Indians to an 8-0-1 record.

A 1945 graduate of Breckenridge high school, Conzemius enrolled at Moorhead State College, where he participated in football, baseball and track for four years each. He also played basketball for two years as a Moorhead State Dragon.

Upon receiving B.S. degrees in Health, Physical Education and Social Studies, he returned to Breckenridge high school to pursue his career as teacher and coach. After one year of duty at Breckenridge (1950-51), he was hired on at Wadena, where he began his long career as teacher and coach.

"As far as memories go, there are a lot of them," he commented, "but one thing that still sticks in my mind is my first game as coach in Wadena. We lost to Aitkin 12-0."

In 31 years, Conzemius has seen a lot of changes in the "The game of football. "The equipment went from allleather to fiberglass gear and plastic-type helmets,' he recalled. "The shoe changed from cleats to the molded bottom, or soccer-style shoe. Hand and other protective pads now protect both the offensive and defensive player, where pads used to protect only the player delivering the hit. The kids are more knowledgable about the rules nowadays," he continued. "There's more teams (junior high, etc.) and more games on television for the kids to watch and learn from. We also make use of films of our games to replay to the team now.

Other than being football coach, Conzemius coached senior high track until 1970 and also was assistant basketball coach for many years. He's been the athletic director at

Wadena since 1958. In 1970 he was named the District Coach of the Year and was also named Regional Coach of the Year.

Other honors achieved by Conzemius included officiating in five successive state basketball tournaments from 1956-60. He began officiating during his first year of college (1945-46) and finally ended his officiating career at the end of the 1968-69 season.

Conzemius' family includes his wife, Donna, and three children. Cathy (Peterson) teaches health and coaches volleyball and gymnastics at Park Rapids. Tom, ironically, is also a teacher at Park Rapids. He coaches ninthgrade basketball and is an assistant football coach. Tom is a Phy. Ed. instructor. Mark is presently a senior at North Dakota State university.

"With my resignation, I'll be able to devote more time with other fall activities. Right now, I haven't had time to think about not being a coach. But maybe by next summer I'll be getting ready to start another football season."

Many athletes have played for Conzemius during his 31 years, and many have gone on to play college football. But the player that stands out would be former Wadena gridder John Campbell. "John was an offensive ad defensive end for the University of Minnesota and was with the Gophers when they went to the Rose Bowl. He also played professional ball for Pittsburg and Minnesota," Conzemius recalled.

Over a 31-year span as football coach, Conzémius has seen a lot of coaches come and go, but he listed off some area coaches that were friends, but rivals when it came to Friday night action. Some of those that he mentioned include: John Davies, Crosby-Ironton; Ted Meinhover, Perham; Delmore Moberg, Detroit Lakes; and Andy MacCarty, Park Rapids.

A coach, as well as a friend, to the hundreds of young men he guided through the field of competition, his 31 years of dedication and thoughtfulness to Wadena high school athletes won't soon be forgotten.



A junior at MSU, the 6-1, 208 pound Brummer transferred to Moorhead State last spring from Anoka-Ramsey Com-




munity college. He has seen limited duty at defensive end as well, and is expected to be a strong starting candidate next year, according to defensive coordinator Dave Olson.





My football career started early with neighborhood games in Grandma Zosel's yard. I learned from some of the older neighbor boys and was a non-factor in the game but just happy that they let me play. My older brothers, along with the Fossen boys and a few others would gather for the game. The neighborhood super star, whom we youngsters idolized, was Gene Goedel, a standout receiver for the Wadena Indians. I had hopes of someday playing for the Indians too.

By the time **5**th **and 6**th **grade** rolled around I had teamed up with my friends, my brother John, and whoever else might show up for Saturday games at the varsity field. On Friday nights the varsity would play, and we seldom missed a game.

Reg Mead's **7th and 8th grade** team gave us our first crack at organized football. We had two games on the schedule and won them both. In the second game, time was running out when I scooped up a fumble and ran for a last second touchdown to win the game. Now I was sure that someday I would be a Wadena Indian.

During my **freshman year**, coach Don Hamerlinck chose me to quarterback the B team. John Geiser, my good friend from Bluffton, was my center. We learned a lot that year playing with sophomores and juniors. We won a few games and lost more than a few.

When early practice started our sophomore year, I started the season on the B team and dressed for the varsity games. By the third contest of the season, coach Conzemius surprised me by announcing that I was to become the starting quarterback. My stomach dropped to the floor as I contemplated the schedule ahead of us.

Coaches Conzemius and Larson did their best to prepare us. Our next game was to be against the powerful Alexandria team. It would be a real "David and Goliath moment."

Though we played tough to the season's end we came out of it with just one more win after an opening victory at Long Prairie, to end with a 2-6 record.

They say suffering is a great teacher. We had a lot of young players on that team and most of the time we came away licking our wounds. But we were building for the future. As a junior I was playing both ways, and also punting and returning punts.

Senior Year (fall of 1961)

Our senior year came around with great anticipation. We had experience across the line and we were talented in the backfield. Our coaches were tough and demanding, thinking this could just be our big year. John Conzemius was our head coach. He was competitive and had a strong desire to win. The line coach was Bill Larson, a tough ex-marine. Also, John Campbell (WHS '56), star Rose Bowl champion, Gopher, and eventual NFL All-Pro, worked out with us and helped coach the two weeks before school started.

Our fourth game was homecoming. We would meet the Staples Cardinals, who were coming off another great season By 6:00 we had ankles taped, pads adjusted, and headed in stocking feet to the gym for the pregame plan and the inspirational speech that someone would be invited to deliver. Tonight, it was Reg Mead's dad. He was a retired Methodist pastor from Duluth. He stood up in front of us, trench coat and classic Ivy cap in place. With his surly growl he proceeded to convince us that there was no other option tonight but to win. He reminded us that we were playing for each other, for our coaches, for the pride of our school, and for our own self-respect. The only way to be successful was to operate as a single cog, perfect teamwork, with everyone doing their part. He prayed that the Lord would help us play hard, play fair and be good sports. On that note, with a loud cheer, we headed for the bus.

Homecoming was indeed special. The whole town was excited about our team, and by game time, the stands were packed. After warm-ups, we gathered at the sideline for our final instructions. Staples lined-up for the kickoff and I stood back on the 20-yard line and awaited the kick. I glanced at the stands, checked out where my parents always sat, looked over the field, and glanced up into the lights. This was it – what I had always hoped for. *Friday night, under the lights and I'm the guarterback*. I was truly a Wadena Indian. The sound of the whistle caught my attention. I focused my eyes on the little torpedo tumbling toward me through the misty night air. At that point, training, instinct, and adrenaline take over and you cease to think. You merely react. Homecoming game in the fall of 1961 was underway.

We beat Staples 13-0. Through the first 5 games we were not only unbeaten, but we were un-scored upon. We were starting to get the attention of the sports media around the state. In our final 4 games we did allow a few points, but our only disappointment was a 25-25 tie against Detroit Lakes.

When our season was over, we were 8-0-1, Mid-State Conference Champions, and ranked 5th in the final state poll. As it turned out, our team was coach Conzemius' only undefeated squad in his illustrious 31-year coaching career in Wadena.

What a season it was!


WHS Collegiate Players



Honors continued to pour in for the Gophers, should-be football champions today with three members of the famed Minnesota line—Bob Bell, Julie Hook and John Campbell—being named to both all-Big Ten honor teams selected separately by the Associated Press and United Press International.

Bell gained further acclaim by becoming the only repeater on the All-American team selected by the 500-member American Football Coaches Association.

The great Gopher tackle, hub of the still raging discussion on the roughingthe-passer penalty at Wisconsin, was the only unanimous choice on the UPI's All-Big Ten team and shared that distinction with Wisconsin end Pat Richter on the AP all-conference outfit.

Campbell was named a first-team end

by both wire services and Hook, the tremendous linebacker, was honored at guard on both selections.

No other school placed as many as three on the first team. Richter and quarterback Ron VanderKelen gave Big Ten champion Wisconsin two berths on both the AP and UPI teams.

Center Bill Armstrong and halfback Paul Warfield gave Ohio State two representatives on the UPI all-stars and Michigan State gained two AP spots with fullback George Saimes and center Dave Behrman.

The Gophers did well below the first All-Star level, too,

Carl Eller, Minnesota's junior tackle, was honored with a second-team all-conference berth by both services. Bill Munsey was placed at halfback on the third teams by AP and UPI while Duane Blaska was named to the AP's third-team backfield in gaining UPI honorable mention. Fullback Jerry Jones was a third-tream choice by UPI and gained AP honorable mention. Center Paul Renson and halfback Jim Cairing also earned UPI honorable mention

Meanwhile, Coach Murray Warmath himself praised the Gophers again and again—at the Tribune Quarterback Club luncheon and last night at the 46th annual Minneapolis Athletic Club football stat.

Today the Gophers were to clect their captain whose identity as successor to Dick Enga will be announced at Wednesday's 11:30 convocation in Coffman Union.

On the Coaches' All-American, the only other Big Ten players outside of Bell to be picked on the first team were Michigan State's Saimes and Wisconsin's tremendous Richter.

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Why Football Scrapbooks?



In 2019 I did some research on three Wadena High School basketball players, from the 1950's, that played for my dad Harold Willis (1955-64). Upon completion of that I decided to work my way back in time as far as the archives would take me. The result was the "Wadena H.S. Basketball Scrapbook 1900-59." After that I knew I had to do the same for what came after 1959. Project #2 culminated in the "Wadena H.S. Basketball Scrapbook 1960-80." Neither have been a commercial success. They were never intended to be money makers. Their purpose is to bring back memories, or to confirm a dad's or a grandpa's claim of greatness in their youth. Or at least be forced to modify said claims. And ultimately, I want our Wadena sports history documented.

I resisted the thought of doing something similar for Wadena High School football. It is such a "long haul" process. Time consuming and monotonous. Besides I was a cross country runner in high school. I loved football but wanted to be in shape for the basketball season. Plus, I was not a very good football player. Then I started to think about my youth and WHS football. In 1966, at the age of 11, I was the "water-boy" for the high school football team. My brother Greg was a sophomore on that team. I loved being around those guys.

Then my memory took me back a little further. Dave Campbell* ('66) played for WHS in the falls of 1963-65. He lived on the corner of Dayton Ave and 4th St. SW, just a stone's throw from the football field. Behind his back yard was a playground and behind that, the Wadena elementary school. One beautiful spring day I was at the playground alone. I do remember very clearly sitting under a big tree in Dave's backyard and talking with him. Dave Cambell, quarterback. He was a star football player, and he was talking with me. He may have been my first sports hero. It was then that I realized many of the guys that would be in this football scrapbook were sports heroes to the youth of their era. In the 21st century it is more likely the youth of the day have sports heroes that make \$100's of millions of dollars. That's not a bad thing, it's just a sign of the times. I like the way it was when I was a kid, you could sit down and talk to your sports hero.
