HIST108: The United States Since 1877

The Course: (Meets M-F __Period, Office Hours: all day) This US History course is designed to provide students with both the skills and the content knowledge necessary to deal critically with the problems and materials in US History. The course prepares students for intermediate and advanced college and university courses by making demands on them equivalent to those made by introductory college-level courses. The course will trace US History from the era of Reconstruction following the Civil War to the present (1877 – present).

Primary Goals: Students should learn to assess historical materials—their relevance to a given interpretive problem, reliability, and importance—and to weigh the evidence and interpretation presented in historical scholarship. The student should, during the course, demonstrate their progress in developing the skills necessary to arrive at conclusions on the basis of an informed judgement and to present reasons and evidence clearly and persuasively in a variety of formats.

Student Responsibilities and Rules:

- Students must participate to the best of their abilities in a respectful manner to all.
- You must utilize the LMS in order to access and complete many of our assignments.
- Be in class every (reasonably possible) day. The vast majority of your learning will occur inside the classroom.
- Be on time (in your seat, ready to work when the tardy bell rings)
- Homework is due (must be checked and/or turned-in) BEFORE the tardy bell rings.
- Planned/athletic absences: work must be turned-in before you attend event.
- If you must be absent, talk to Mr. Dodson about potential make-up opportunities outside of class time and/or via email.
- Each week's schedule, and most of its assignments, are posted on the LMS. Therefore, students can usually keep up with their work even if they are absent.
- Students MUST have their SMJUHSD-issued tablets in class each day NO PHONES!!!
- Make-up tests will be given ONLY with a doctor's note saying that the student couldn't possibly have been in class on (or taken the test prior to) the test date
- Parents and students can access and analyze student grades via the Parent and/or Student AERIES Portal on the PVHS website and through the LMS.
- Group work does not mean "group grades". That is, you will always be evaluated on your individual effort, work, and contribution.
- Electronics are allowed ONLY for instructor assigned purposes. Misuse of electronics in class cost the student participation/behavior and assignment points/credit.
- You have 6 bathroom passes per semester. These passes, if unused, could raise your grade by up-to (but no more than) one percent at the end of the semester.

- Non-disruptive food and drink are allowed, trash is NOT.
