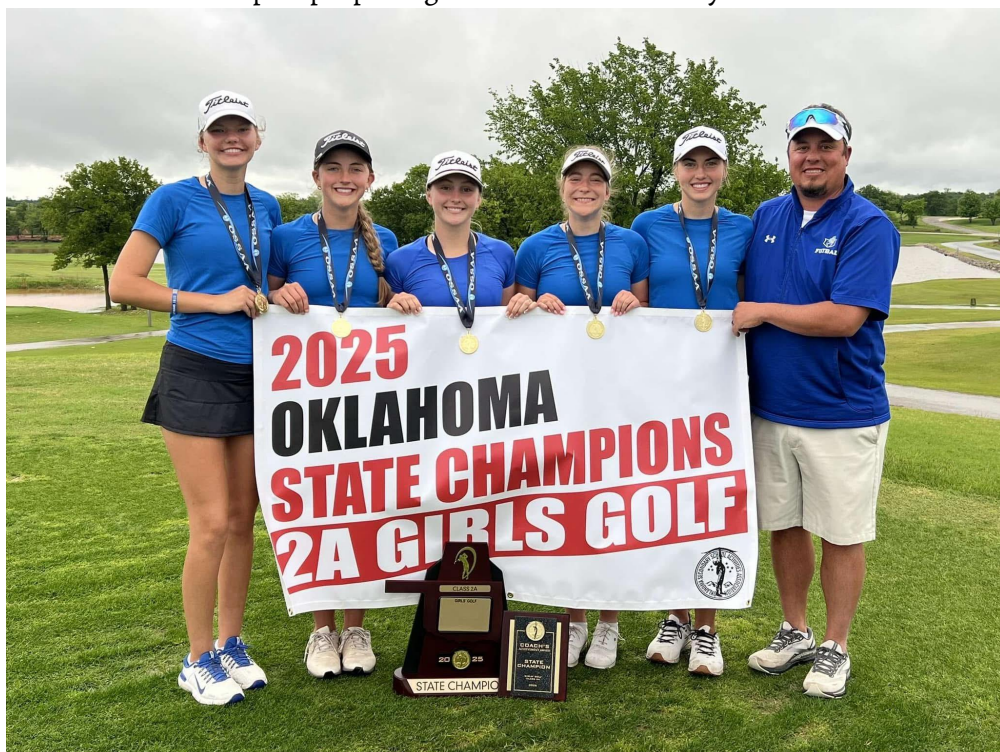
Lady Dogs Golf Bring Home Gold

The Hooker High School girls' golf team proudly represented their school at the Class 2A State Golf Tournament held on May 5th and 6th at Winter Creek Golf Course in Blanchard, Oklahoma. Despite preparing

for two full days of competition, uncooperative weather ultimately shortened the event. Still, the Hooker girls pulled it off—bringing home a State Championship. Due to heavy rainfall on May 6th that resulted

in flooding on the course, officials were forced to cancel the second day of play. As a result, final standings and scores were determined solely by the results from day one. The Lady Bulldogs delivered a strong showing in the opening round. Loryn Rose led the team with an impressive score of 92, earning Top 10 individual medal. She was followed closely by Devry Metcalf with a 93. Allie Metcalf carded a 100, Sayde McBride finished with a 103, and Mollie Baird rounded out the team with a 104. The team demonstrated skill, determination, and composure under pressure as they pursued their goal of bringing home the gold. They finished their season undefeated—a testament to the hard work and dedication they have put in over the years.



Bulldog Esports is State Runner-Up

In their premier season our Bulldog Esports Black Ops 6 team made it to the State Tournament. After a hard fought battle, they came home as the State Runner-Up! The Black Ops 6 team consists of freshman Noah Parish, freshman Roy Herald, freshman Jaden McCann, freshman Preston Jacobs, and (alternate) Julio Casas, coached by Ethan Kennedy.



Hooker Dogs Dominate at State Track Meet, Lady Dogs Earn Runner-Up Honors

The Hooker Dogs and Lady Dogs track teams left it all on the track at the state championships this past weekend, delivering standout performances in a grueling two-day meet. While the Lady Dogs came up just short, finishing as state runners-up, the Hooker Dogs stormed to a commanding victory to claim the state title.

The Dogs were dominant from start to finish, taking first place in numerous events and showcasing their depth and athleticism across the board. Keilan Robinson set the tone in the sprints, capturing gold in the 200-meter dash with a blazing time of 21.73 seconds, tying the school record. Ryan Carter added a solid 5th-place finish in the 400 meters, while Alejandro Perez and Ulisses Jimenez delivered strong performances in the distance events, placing 5th and 8th in the 1600 meters, and 9th and 6th in the 3200 meters.

In the relays, the Dogs were untouchable. They swept all four relay events — 4x100, 4x200, 4x400, and 4x800 — setting school records along the way. Those standout times included 3:22.60 in the 4x400, 1:28.12 in the 4x200, and 42.83 in the 4x100. Their relay dominance sealed the team's path to the state championship. Nate Hidalgo soared to the top of the podium in the high jump, clearing 6-6 for the win. In the field events, Tatum Trimble earned 6th in the pole vault, while Peyton Parker placed 7th in the discus.

On the girls' side, the Lady Dogs battled fiercely to secure second place overall. Analisee Gonzalez shined in the 400-meter dash, winning the state title with a time of 57.90 seconds, setting a new school record. Izabella Neville clocked 2:21.51 in the 800 meters to earn 2nd, and Yarel Mesta continued the trend with a 3rd-place finish in the 1600 meters, setting a school record with a time of 5:28.91.

The Lady Dogs' relay teams proved just as competitive, finishing 2nd in the 4x200, 4x400, and 4x800 meter relays, and 3rd in the 4x100. The state title came down to a grueling race in the 4x400 meter relay, where the Lady Dogs came up just short of the win. However, they still secured the school record and beat the previously held state record by more than a second with a time of 4:01.56. Their teamwork and consistency kept them in the hunt for the team title throughout the weekend.

Other notable performances included Yarel Mesta and Izabella Neville, who placed 5th and 6th in the 3200 meters, and Ember Stevens and Finley Duncan, who placed 7th and 8th in the 1600 meters.

Though the Lady Dogs narrowly missed a team championship, their resilience and podium finishes in nearly every event made a strong statement.

In a weekend defined by grit, speed, and determination, the Hooker Dogs and Lady Dogs made their mark on the state stage. For the boys, it's a title well-earned. For the girls, it's a step away from the crown — and fuel for next season.



State Bound! Dogs and Lady Dogs Qualify for State Track Meet After Strong Regional Showing

The Dogs and Lady Dogs are headed to State after an outstanding performance at the Regional Track Meet in Cherokee. Both teams brought home top finishes across a variety of events, securing their place at the state championships.

On the girls' side, Analisee Gonzalez won the 400-meter dash with a time of 59.38, and Izabella Neville took 1st in the 800-meter run, followed by Finley Duncan in 2nd. The trio of Mesta, Duncan, and Stevens placed 3rd, 4th, and 5th in the 1600-meter, while Neville and Mesta also finished top five in the 3200-meter.

The Lady Dogs swept all four relays, earning first place in each. In the field events, Summer Fischer earned a trip

to state with a 2nd-place finish in pole vault (8-0).

The boys' team matched that energy. Keilan Robinson won the 200-meter, and Justin Palacios took 2nd in the 100-meter, with Leo Heredia in 4th. Slade Stalder placed 1st in the 800-meter, and Alejandro Perez claimed 1st in the 1600 and 2nd in the 3200, while Ulisses Jimenez won the 3200.

The boys also swept all four relays with dominant first-place finishes. In field events, Nate Hidalgo took 1st in high jump (6-4), Tatum Trimble won the pole vault (11-0), and Peyton Parker placed 2nd in discus. With a mix of experience and talent, the Dogs and Lady Dogs are ready to take on the best at State. Congratulations to all athletes and coaches!

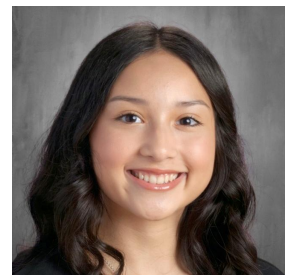

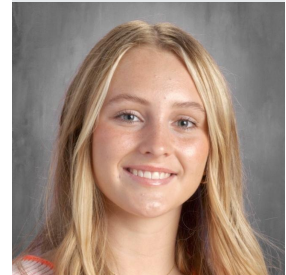
