



WHAT'S HAPPENING

in the classrooms

Kindergarten

Kindergarten students spent several weeks in October investigating pumpkins. We read lots of books about the life cycle of pumpkins. We learned about the insides and outsides and used lots of different words to describe each. We picked the pumpkin growing in our garden box, and observed several that were brought in by a few different teachers. Our unit culminated with an art project to show the parts of the pumpkins. This project was done in all area kindergarten classes (Canaan, Colebrook, Pittsburg, and Stewartstown) in an effort to align our curriculums. In Math, we have been working on reading, counting and comparing numbers 0 to 10. In Fundations, so far, we have learned the lowercase letters a, b, c, d, e, f, g, i, m, n, o, r, s, t, u. The students are very excited to be able to recognize the letters and start reading consonant-vowel-consonant words, such as bat or mug, as well as putting them together to write words on their own. Now that they know all their vowels, there are









First Grade

It is hard to believe we are already at the end of October! We continue to read stories about friendship and being good citizens. In Social Studies, we finished learning about being responsible citizens and have completed a Fall themed unit in Science. We have been learning about apples, pumpkins, and the changes we observe in the fall. We concluded the unit by creating a Fall picture. Students had to explain what was in their picture and what changes happen in the Fall. They then compared this to another season of their choice. This performance assessment will be completed in Colebrook and Pittsburg. It will be exciting to see the similarities and differences between students' work!



In Social Studies, we have started learning about life in the past and life now. We have learned how homes, cooking, transportation, schools, technology, and the roles of women have changed over the years. We will continue learning about life in the past over the next few weeks.



n Math, we have continued learning about addition and subtraction. First graders have been practicing these skills using many different strategies including adding on a part-part-whole chart, using a tens chart, using a number line, using counters, and unifix cubes

Fourth & Fifth Grade

We are keeping our minds well occupied in 4th and 5th grade. Students have finally become used to being in school and are comfortable with the new school year. Everyone has figured out how to work together and offer help to one another when needed--a conscientious group indeed.

Within the month of October, we finished our review of addition and subtraction concepts, expanded on it in fourth and added the element of decimals in fifth, and have moved on to multiplication at the various grade levels. In ELA, we completed the novels in which we focused on story elements. We are now working on the individual skills of finding the main idea of texts and using context clues to determine the meaning of words or other content of a text.

Our most recent topics in Science have centered around different forms of energy such as heat and light. In November, we'll start a unit on sound energy and then things will become electric. Students should enjoy what is coming.

Social Studies content has probably been the most challenging. We have been studying early European Explorers, where they came from, why they wanted to explore, what they thought they could do or find, and what actually happened. They all thought it was cool to learn that America was named after the explorer named Amerigo Vespucci! Next up...Native Americans of North America.



Junior High Math/Science


6th Grade

Second and third graders are now writing longer pieces while trying to use proper punctuation and correct mistakes as they go. It's great to watch them using their active imagination and expressing their thoughts and feelings on paper.



Grade 8

.Everyone knows what the square root of 64 is? Answer 8! But, do you know the answer to the square root of 63? Not so easy because it is not a perfect square like 64. Ask an 8th grader how you solve it! They are also learning about the Pyrethrum Theorem involving right triangles.

Library & Computer Class

Greetings from Library and Computers!!

Wow! This month has gone by fast! In Computers, Kindergarten and 1st grade students have been focusing on practicing mouse control with ABC Mouse and a few other websites. Classes are doing so well, we will be moving away from these websites and begin working on word processing skills through Google Docs to correspond with classroom lessons. Second/Third and Fourth/Fifth grade students have been focusing on Computer Basics, beginning with 'All About Computers' and now moving to 'Cyber Citizenship' units. Sixth/Seventh have joined Eighth grade students in computer research methods by applying evaluating strategies to determine if a website would be considered 'strong' or 'weak' in providing accurate information for research projects they are doing in their home classes.

Library has been very exciting as well! Kindergarten and 1st graders have been practicing their presentation skills by 'reading' excerpts from the books they are returning. Each student is able to share their favorite part of their book in front of the class. This has been a lot of fun and is a tool used to help students practice speaking in front of an audience in a safe and supportive environment. Second/Third and Fourth/Fifth grade students have been looking at the operating practices of the Dewey Decimal System and getting familiar with different genre identifications. We will be moving into a more formal unit of 'Identifying Parts of a Book' where students will produce a mock up of their own book cover with all identifying information and end pages specific to their stories. Sixth/Seventh and Eighth graders have also covered Reference and Resource books, along with review of the Dewey Decimal System and Genre Identifiers. Each of these classes has begun a 40-Book Challenge to read a specific amount of books from 11 different genres categories.

A lot of work done and more on the horizon - way to go Bulldogs!!
