Classroom Expectations In this classroom, you will learn HISTORY!!!

H: Homework and reading assignments are to be completed on time.

- 1. Every assignment and activity must be completed as the teacher explains without complaining and refusing to work and on time.
- 2. Always copy all notes from the board or projector as the teacher writes.
- 3. Follow all steps for annotation correctly.
- 4. Give 100% to all activities such as primary source readings, See/think/wonder, and Because/but/so.

I: Interruptions and rudeness are not tolerated. Raise your hand before speaking.

- 1. Always **TRACK** your target: board, video, teacher, peer, textbook, etc.
