These reports contain the following information:

School Accountability Data

- Includes information on schools' performance on various measures such as student proficiency and growth on state assessments, graduation, and attendance rates. Performance is measured on 0-100 index scales
- Reports schools identified under three federally required categories for further support: Comprehensive Support and Improvement, Targeted Support and Improvement, and Additional Targeted Support

Student Assessment Data

- Includes the following three assessments: M-STEP (Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress), MI-Access (Alternate Assessment), and College Board SAT
- Presents assessment information for English language arts and mathematics for grades 3 to 8 and 11, and MI-Access science for grades 5, 8, and 11, compared to state averages for all students as well as subgroups of students

National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) Data

- Provides state results of the national assessment in mathematics and reading every other year in grades 4 and 8

Educator Qualification Data

- Identifies the number and percentage of inexperienced teachers, principals, and other school leaders
- Reports teachers who are teaching with emergency or provisional credentials
- Includes teachers who are not teaching in the subject or field for which they are certified

Civil Rights Data

- Provides information on school quality, climate, and safety

Please review the table below listing our schools. For the 2025-26 school year, schools were identified based on previous years’ performance data using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that had at least one underperforming student group in 2024-25. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that had at least one student group performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state in 2021-22. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance was in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state, had a graduation rate at or below 67%, failed to exit CSI status in 2024-25, or failed to exit ATS status in 2021-22. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no status label is given.

Midland Public Schools did not have any schools identified with a label.

- **Spring 2025 M-STEP Results:**
 - MPS students in grades 3-7 who took the English Language Arts M-STEP scored an average of 19% higher than their peers across the State, with 59.7% of students receiving advanced or proficient scores.
 - MPS students in grades 3-7 who took the Mathematics M-STEP scored an average of 14.6% higher than their peers across the State, with 50.6% of students receiving advanced or proficient scores.
 - MPS students in grades 5 and 8 who took the Science M-STEP scored an average of 19.5% higher than their peers across the State, with 60.2% of students receiving advanced or proficient scores.
 - MPS students in grades 5 and 8 who took the Social Studies M-STEP scored an average of 17.5% higher than their peers across the State, with 55.9% of students receiving advanced or proficient scores.
 - 76.2% of MPS students had average to high growth in ELA in 2025.
 - 74.1% of MPS students had average to high growth in Math in 2025.

- SAT: Of the 539 MPS students who took the SAT - Evidence-Based Reading & Writing (EBRW) test in 2025, MPS students scored an average of 54.9 points over their peers across the State.

- SAT: Of the 539 MPS students who took the SAT - Math test in 2025, MPS students scored an average of 67.9 points over their peers across the State.

- International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme: During the 2024-25 school year, our students took 436 IB exams in 27 subject areas. 78% of the examinations taken by MPS students received a score of 4 or higher. 19 students earned the full IB Diploma.

- Advanced Placement Assessment: During the 2024-25 school year, 392 Advanced Placement exams were administered in 23 subject areas. 84.3% of the MPS students who took an AP exam achieved a qualifying score of 3 or higher. 82 MPS students achieved the distinction of being named an AP Scholar, meaning that they earned a score of 3 or higher on a minimum of 3 AP subject area assessments.

- The IB Primary Years Programme is thriving at all six elementary schools as well as our PrePrimary Center. MPS elementary schools represent 35% of the IB PYP authorized elementary schools in Michigan.
- MPS offers countless rigorous and engaging student learning experiences in art, career & technical education, music, physical education, STEM, and world languages throughout the district.
- High school students have access to over 83 co-curricular and extracurricular student clubs and organizations to support and enhance learning.
- Families and community members volunteer hundreds of service hours to schools in various ways, such as reading in elementary classrooms, mentoring student clubs and organizations, providing expert content in classrooms, serving on PTOs and Booster groups, and ensuring student safety by monitoring hallways.
