Big Idea: How can we prepare for weather?

Ask your child how this week's reading selection helps him or her answer this question.

This week's reading selection: Tornadoes!

Summary: Detailed illustrations and text show readers how a tornado forms, how tornadoes are classified, the damage twisters do, and what to do when a severe storm approaches.

Essential Questions: How can weather impact your community? What are ways we can protect ourselves from weather we cannot control?

DISCUSS with your child what he or she already knows about tornadoes and tornado safety. What procedures are followed at school during a tornado drill? What can you do at home to prepare for a tornado?

Language Arts

Writing: Your child will work with partners in writing conferences to revise, edit, and publish an informative piece about an animal. Then he or she will work individually on prewriting for a new informative text about a topic of interest.

Grammar: Your child will also be learning about the four types of sentences: declarative (*My bus comes at two.*), interrogative (*When does the bus come?*), imperative (*Wait here for the bus.*), and exclamatory (*I'm late for the bus!*).
