### Logic and reasoning . . .




### Preparing for the future . . .

#### Students are acquainted with the armed services . . .

in the JUNIOR DIVISION RESERVED OFFICERS' TRAINING CORPS, new to the curriculum this year. A course offered solely to male students in conjunction with the college division of ROTC -Objectives include the development of leadership, responsiveness to authority, and a sense of personal honor. 
### Highlanders' sharpshooting . . .


#### New track records . . .
