Muffins With Mom - May 9th at 8:15am



Students have been taking excellent care of their mealworms! We are beginning to see our mealworms metamorphose and are conducting stimuli experiments to see how these animals respond to their environment.



Also on the life science front, students did some trail maintenance for Earth Day. We are eagerly anticipating the arrival of our incubating chicks!



Working Together To Reach A Common Goal..... COOPERATION. This month we are focusing our efforts in SEL class on refining our skills related to the character trait of Cooperation, and seeing how this character trait goes hand in hand with other character traits we have already covered earlier in the year. Your students are having a great time applying the skills and strategies they have been learning during fun small group activities. This gives them a safe space to practice implementing these skills and thinking about the importance of this character trait in their lives. They have been learning through their own experiences that cooperation is something done together in a helpful, not a harmful manner. It should be done for the “right” reasons, and not for sneaky or manipulative reasons, which could be harmful to ourselves or others. Cooperating relies on good communication, including clear directions, positive word choices, open body language, and active listening with all parties. It is inclusive, not exclusive, and cooperating means one person doesn't always get their way - sometimes you must compromise or share in a genuinely nice way, demonstrating a caring attitude, to get the job done effectively and have the result everyone needs.



When researching the importance of “cooperation” in our society, a significant number of studies and articles described how beneficial this character trait is in an extremely large variety of circumstances or scenarios. From home environments to school or work scenarios, from hobbies and interests to community service opportunities, cooperation appears to be seen as essential for individual well being, as well as the well being of our communities and society as a whole. Cooperation can be instrumental in the positive growth, ability to overcome challenges and achieve goals for both individuals and for groups. This month a great example of cooperation has been seen with our classrooms doing

their part to help clean up our school grounds and work on our garden together, especially on Earth Day, taking care of and showing pride in our school environment.

Many of us have heard the old saying, “It takes a village.” **Our staff wants to take this moment to thank our school volunteers, such as the members of our Booster Club for their countless hours of demonstrating teamwork and cooperation first hand in how they continue to support our staff and students, and in partnering with our school to help make learning fun.** A great example of this is the annual Egg Hunt which was held last Friday.
