

ST. LOUIS SPORTS LEGENDS SHARE BLACK HISTORY AT HIGHLAND

Olympic gold medalist Dawn Harper-Nelson and collegiate basketball and sportswriting Hall of Famer Earl Austin Jr. visited Highland Elementary School on Thursday, Feb. 23 for a Black History Month presentation.

Harper-Nelson is an East St. Louis native who earned gold medal glory in the 100m hurdles at the Beijing Olympics in 2008. She also won a silver medal in the 100m hurdles at the 2012 Olympics Games in London.

Austin is the sports editor for the St. Louis American newspaper and a play-by-play commentator for the Saint Louis Billikens men's basketball team. Austin was inducted into the St. Louis Sports Hall of Fame as a sportswriter and the Lindenwood Hall of Fame as a basketball player.

A MONOPOLY ON FINANCIAL LITERACY AT GIBSON

"Did you know, "The poverty rate for African American women is 28.6 percent? In comparison, the poverty rate of white, non-Hispanic women is 10.8 percent" (Fact Sheet: The State of African American Women in the United States, Nov 7, 2013).

Gibson is working to prevent its girls from facing poverty and financial hardship and burden. Every Thursday after school, the third-grade girls learn about the purpose and value of money through playing Monopoly. The scholars are exposed to financial literacy concepts, business principles and math techniques, such as using number sentences. These techniques can boost their MAP scores.

The theme: To empower girls to understand financial literacy and inspire entrepreneurship.

On Friday, March 3, the Gibson girls will sell popcorn for an authentic learning experience. They will understand key concepts and vocabulary such as product, sales, profit, gains, customer, etc.

CENTRAL MIDDLE ROBOTICS TEAM EARNS PLATINUM AWARD


The Central Middle School Robotics Team participated in the Clavius Project Jamboree on January 21, 2023. This annual robotics competition was held at St. Louis University High School.
