This holiday season, Camella's Cupboard hoped to create 175 "Christmas Eve boxes" to gift to New Milford families.



To help with this initiative, all twelve 3rd grade classrooms have been collecting hot chocolate, metal cookie cutters, marshmallows, candy canes, sugar cookie mix, and microwave popcorn to donate to Camella's Cupboard. Two huge carloads of items were delivered!

After taking a hiatus in 2020, Sarah Noble's 4th grade was back in action, ready to raise money for Connecticut Children's Medical Center by sponsoring the 4th Annual PJ Day to support children at CCMC. The event is always a fun and successful fundraiser!



Sarah Noble's 5th graders focused on the volunteer-run Santa Fund, which for over 40 years has provided gifts and food to area families who might not otherwise be able to provide a holiday celebration. Each 5th grade class adopted a local child and raised money to purchase a toy, a book, mittens/gloves, a winter hat, and a gift card. This year they adopted 12 children and earned a total of over \$1,500.00! Each class was able to wrap their gifts and send them off for a special Christmas morning delivery.



At SMS, the Student Council held a food drive to benefit Camella's Cupboard. Items collected included fruit cups, juice boxes, granola bars, fruit snacks/fruit roll ups, individual oatmeal packets, individual peanut butter cups, small bags of Goldfish crackers, and small boxes of cereal.



At NMHS, the giving was spearheaded by multiple clubs within the school. Camella's Cupboard was the lucky recipient of donations from the Asian Students International Club and the National Honor Society. Social Services was the beneficiary of donations from the Interact Club (toys), French Honor Society (books and boots), and New Milford Athletic Council (hats and mittens). SADD took its mitten collection to Tall Paul's Closet here in New Milford.

Instant Decision Week Yields 92% Acceptance Rate for NMHS Seniors

The 2021 NMHS Instant Decision Week for seniors has come to a close, with all applications being processed by Admissions Reps from *five* different schools including Western, Central and Southern Connecticut State Universities, Naugatuck Valley Community College, and the University of Hartford. The event generated on-the-spot acceptances for 92% of those applicants (34 students), with the remaining applicants (3 students) being wait-listed until after midterm. For the admitted students, they won't have to wait any longer to find out whether or not they've been accepted. For the wait-listed students, meeting the rep face-to-face virtually and making that personal connection allows the student to stand out individually as more than just grades on a transcript, or scores in a report when their application goes before the school's Admissions committee after the close of first semester. It also provides the wait-listed student with an opportunity to discuss alternate options for admission to the school, through a different program, as a transfer student, and the like. Congratulations to all the students who participated!




NMAE celebrated its Hall of Fame students for October and November.



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Happy (Almost!) New Year!

Around the world, cultures welcome the change of the calendar with unique New Year's traditions of their own*. Here are a few examples:

Spain

In Spain, it is customary to eat 12 grapes – one at each stroke of the clock at midnight on New Year's Eve. Each grape represents good luck for one month of the coming year.

Colombia

In hopes of a travel-filled new year, residents of Colombia carry empty suitcases around the block.

Denmark

Residents of Denmark greet the New Year by throwing old plates and glasses against the doors of family and friends to banish bad spirits. They also stand on chairs and jump off of them together at midnight to "leap" into January in hopes of good luck.

Finland

In Finland, people predict the coming year by casting molten tin into a container of water, then interpreting the shape the metal takes after hardening. A heart or ring means a wedding, while a ship predicts travel and a pig declares there will be plenty of food.

Scotland

During Scotland's New Year's Eve celebration of Hogmanay, "firstfooting" is practiced across the country. The first person who crosses a threshold of a home in the New Year should carry a gift for luck.

Philippines

You'll find round shapes all over the Philippines on New Year's Eve as representatives of coins to symbolize prosperity in the coming year. Many families display piles of fruit on their dining tables and some eat exactly 12 round fruits (grapes being the most common) at midnight. Many also wear polka dots for luck.

Greece

An onion is traditionally hung on the front door of homes on New Year's Even in Greece as a symbol of rebirth in the New Year. On New Year's Day, parents wake their children by tapping them on the head with the onion.
