- > Holds a BS in Civil Engineering and an


MFA in Writing from Vermont College of Fine Arts

Quick Facts — Writing:

Engaging Students with Breakout EDU

These students participated in their very first breakout in the JMS library. Using the 4C's — communication, collaboration, critical thinking, and creativity — they uncovered the correct lock combinations on the boxes and were able to Breakout the Superheroes!



What is Breakout EDU?

Breakout EDU is a learning games platform based on the popular escape room phenomenon. In a breakout, students follow clues to solve puzzles, while also communicating and collaborating with teammates. Basic breakouts include a story, clues and puzzles, locks, a time limit, and reflection.

Breakout EDU Kits

JMS purchased five breakout kits with a grant from Santee Electric. Each kit includes two boxes, several different locks, an invisible ink pen, a UV flashlight, and a red filter.





Breakout EDU Lessons

The JMS Library has access to Breakout EDU lessons for Math, ELA, Social Studies, Science, and the Arts. Keep reading to see what a few JMS teachers shared about the introductory breakouts.
