Education Needed

A bachelor's degree and some healthcare experience is required for **admission** into a Physician Assistant Program.

To increase your chances of gaining admission to a PA graduate program the bachelors degree should be a B.S. in a science major; such as biology, chemistry, etc.

The **actual PA program is a Master's degree**, which is a 2 year full time program.

A Day in the Life of a Physician Assistant

Physician Assistants are medical professionals who diagnose, treat, and counsel patients under the supervision of a physician.

As a Physician Assistant, you will work in a hospital, medical office, intensive/urgent care clinic, or a physician's office, providing many of the same patient-care functions as physicians. Individual State laws regulate the specific responsibilities of a Physician Assistant, but most general duties include prescribing medication, performing physicals, administering medicine, and conducting patient consultations. You will give injections, suture wounds, and manage patient infections. You also may assist during surgery, visit patients during hospital rounds, or make house calls. What you do is under the supervision of a medical doctor. In some cases, a doctor who is located off-site and connected via telecommunications might perform the supervision.
