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The importance of student-led conferences

Student-led conferences are such an important part of our students' growth and development.

These conferences are more than just a chance for families to hear about classroom progress. They are an opportunity for students to take the lead, reflect on their own learning, and build confidence in sharing their strengths, challenges, and goals with their families.

The conferences provide an opportunity for families to hear directly from their children about their experiences in school. This builds a stronger partnership between home and school, ensuring that everyone is on the same page when it comes to supporting the student's learning journey. **How You Can Support Your**

Child During the Conference

- Encourage Reflection: Ask them to think about what they've learned, what challenges they've faced, and what they're most proud of.
- <u>Be an Active Listener</u>: Give your child the space to lead. Listen attentively to their reflections and celebrate their progress.
- <u>Ask Thoughtful Questions:</u> Ask questions that help them think critically about their learning. Questions like "What's something new you learned this year?" or "What's one thing you want to improve?" can prompt valuable insights and further reflection.



2-5 are designing a Fall Food Truck Festival! Developing a theme, a menu, and designing/building a 3D truck prototype.






Westshire Votes

When you think of Westshire, which Raptor do you feel best represents our community? Choose 1:



Imagination Research: Help the Dartmouth Child Development Lab understand how kids think about possibilities. We're looking for kids ages 4-12 to help us explore how we learn to generate good options when faced with open-ended problems. Adults easily come up with ideas for questions like, "What should we have for dinner?" — even though there are endless possibilities, we tend to think of just a few. Our lab seeks to understand how this ability to automatically generate good ideas develops as kids grow. What influences the options they come up with? And how do those options shape the decisions they make? To participate, your child will play a variety of thinking games for 20-25 minutes (options on zoom and in-person at Dartmouth's campus!) It's a great opportunity for your child to exercise their creativity and contribute to the science of education.
