Dr. Zabrina Cannady, Assistant Superintendent for Student Services and Past President of the Georgia Association of Educational Leaders (GAEL), accepted the Eli Wolff Award for Advocacy for her role in promoting adapted sports through the GAEL organization. This award is presented to a male athlete who showed leadership not only on the court, but also in the classroom. 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TEACHER Spotlight




Student Services Report - January 2024

Sensory Rooms

The Houston County Student Services Department, along with the help of the Maintenance Department facilitated the installation of fifteen sensory rooms across the county. The District contracted with Sensory Room Solutions to tailor the rooms for the unique needs of our students. The team planned and installed each component in the rooms to ensure maximum student engagement and safety. ARP IDEA funds distributed during the 2021-2022 school year provided financing for this project. To ensure equity throughout the county, schools were selected based on program type. The first schools completed were HCHS, VHS, MCMS, FMMS, TMS, MAES, QRES, CBWPS, PSES, PKWD, HTES. These are schools that have programs that serve students with severe and profound intellectual disabilities. Additionally, The Lindsey Behavior Support Program, The Lindsey Student Support Center and the Houston County Annex Child Find programs all added sensory rooms.

Moving forward, the District plans to phase in sensory rooms throughout the county using IDEA funds. This semester, Langston Road Primary School, Langston Road Elementary School, and Hilltop Elementary School will have sensory rooms installed. Each of these schools house classrooms for students with autism, emotional and behavioral disorders, and/or special education Pre-K. During the 2024-2025 school year we will continue to expand with a focus on autism and EBD classes, outfitting eight elementary schools with state-of-the-art sensory rooms. The addition of sensory rooms will be an ongoing project, with schools being evaluated each year to determine necessity of installation.

As the District continues to grow, the goal is to make sensory rooms available to students with disabilities throughout the county. To ensure safety and proper use, each room will include guidelines to educate users and adult facilitators accordingly. Use of the sensory room as an antecedent intervention for students that may become dysregulated is a proactive strategy for reducing problematic behavior, including physical aggression toward peers and staff.
