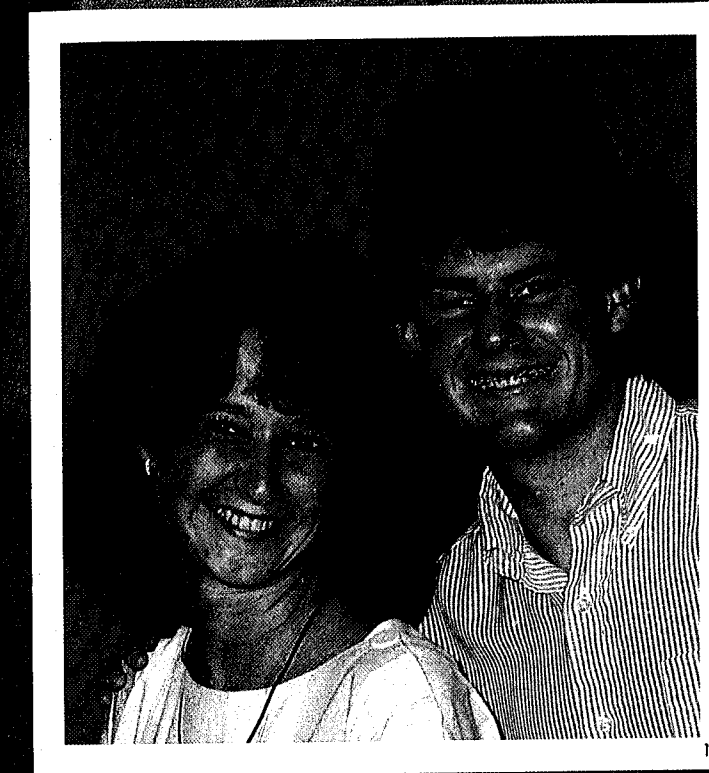

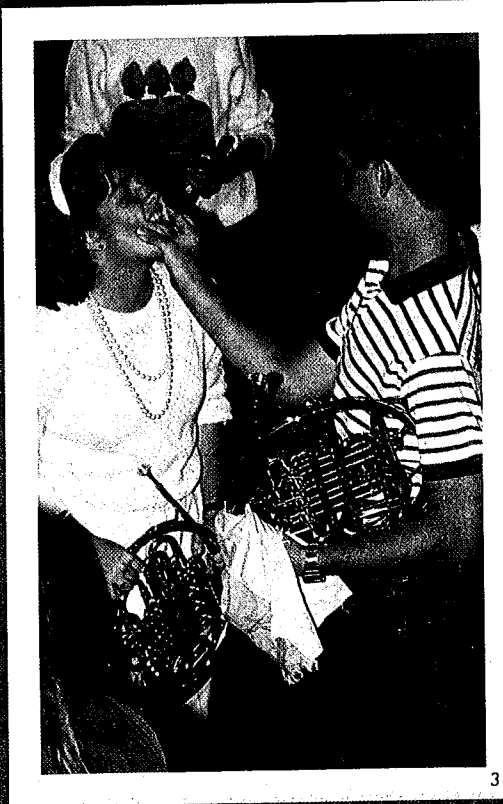
We All Stick Together

Teamwork and Talent to Victory

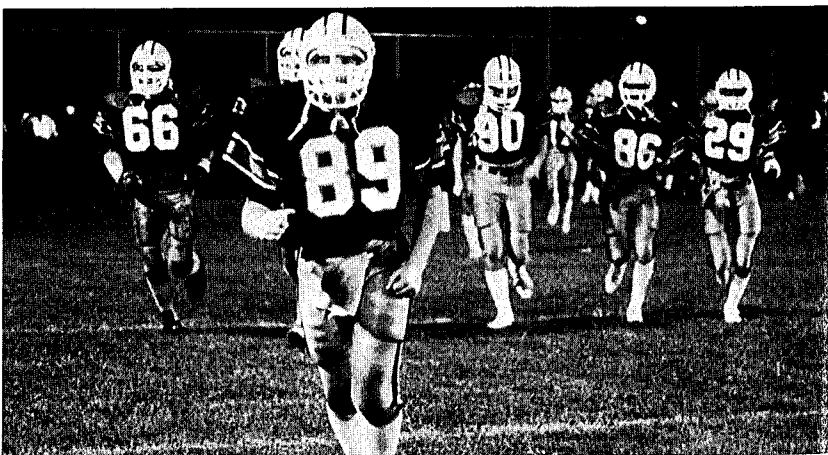

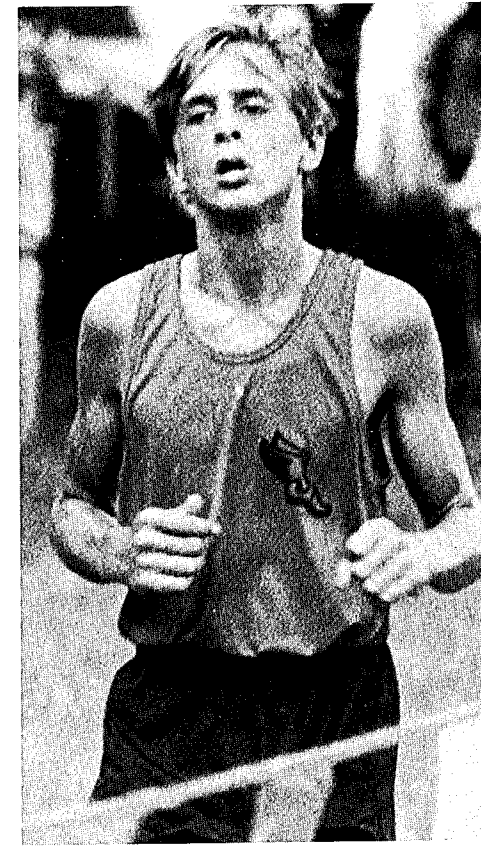

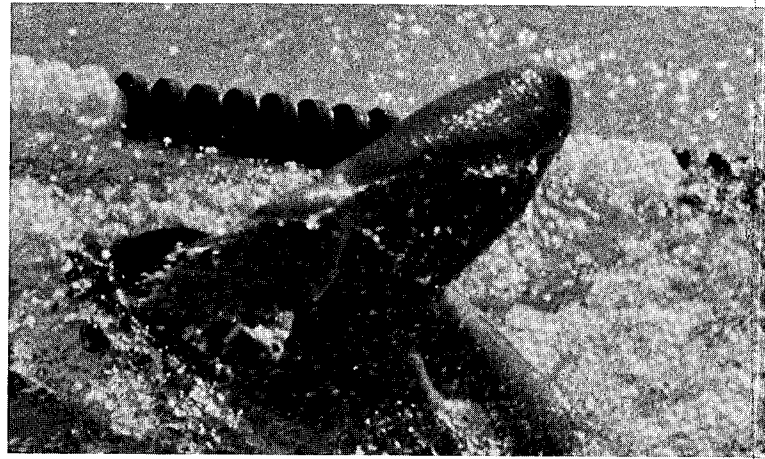

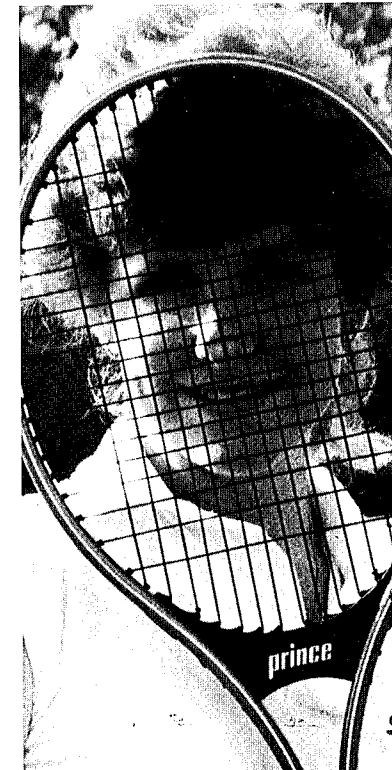

New Coach Leads Highlanders To Winning Season

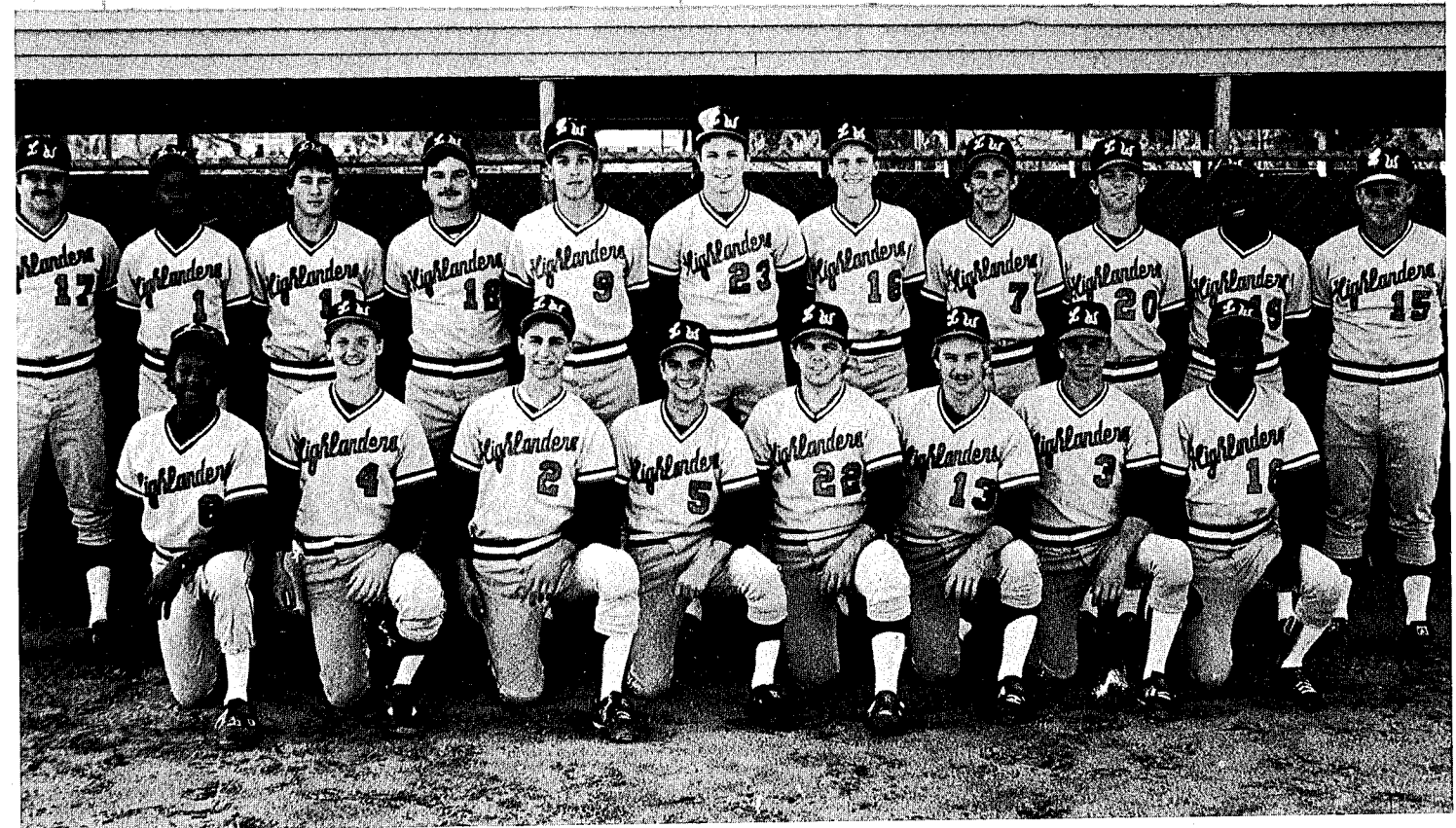

Industrial Arts Goes Metric

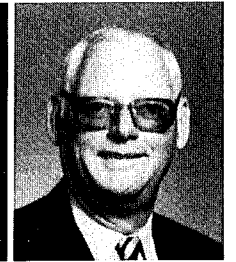

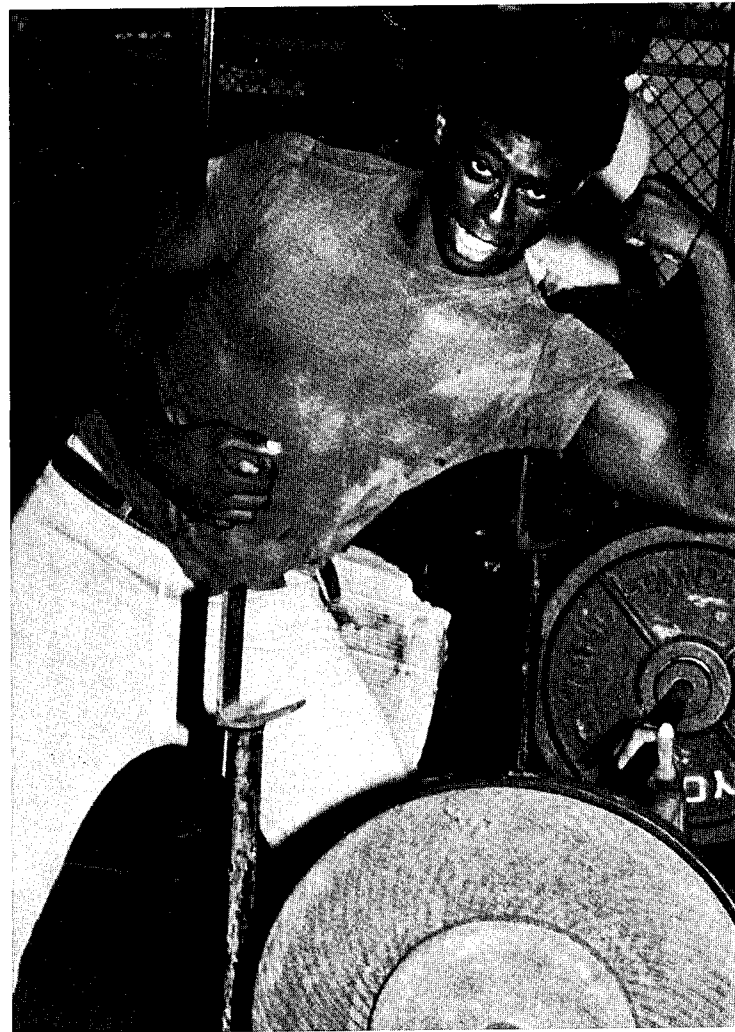
PE Hours Required

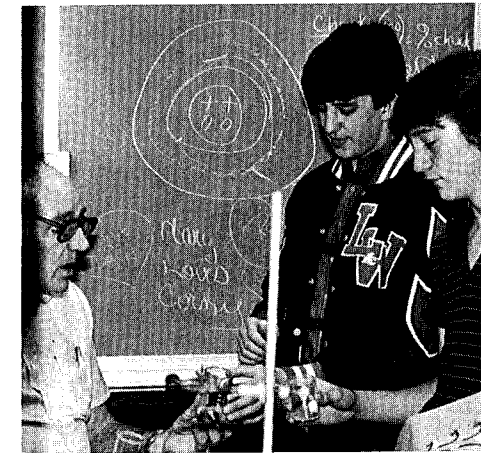
Science Department Adds Physics

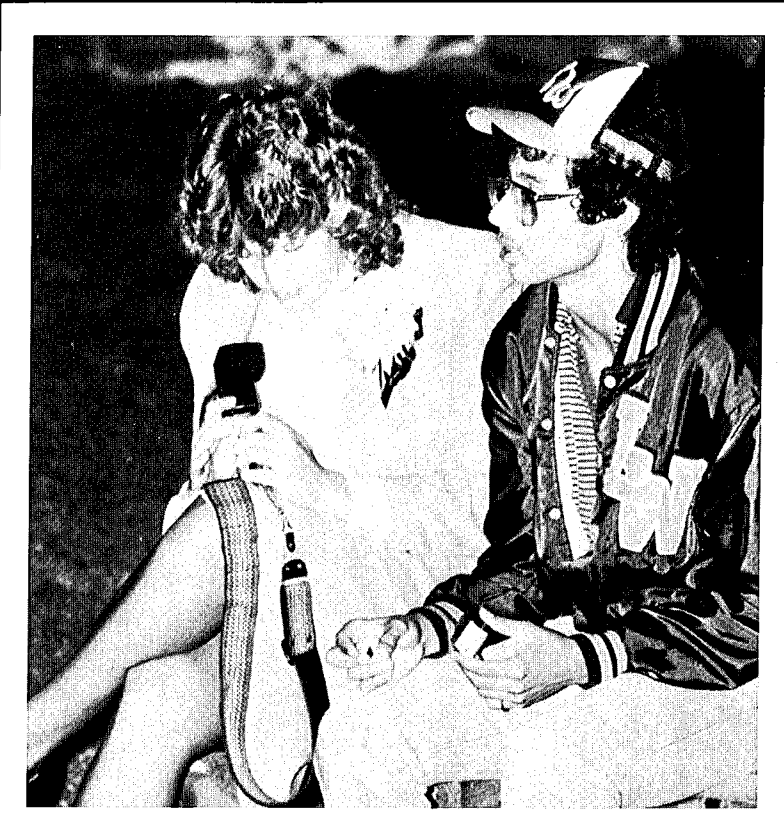
On the Job

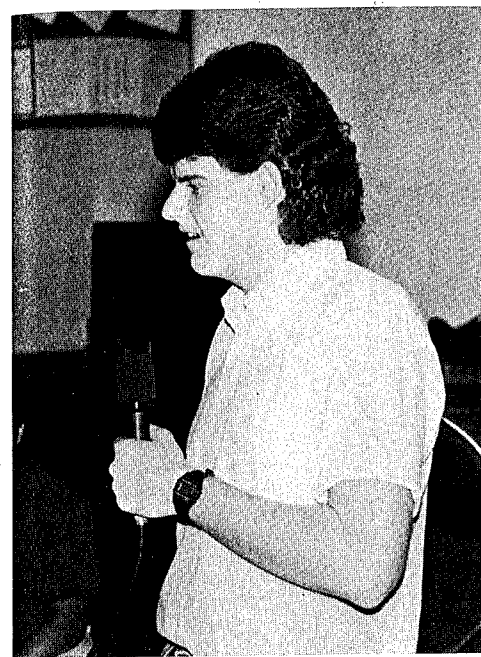

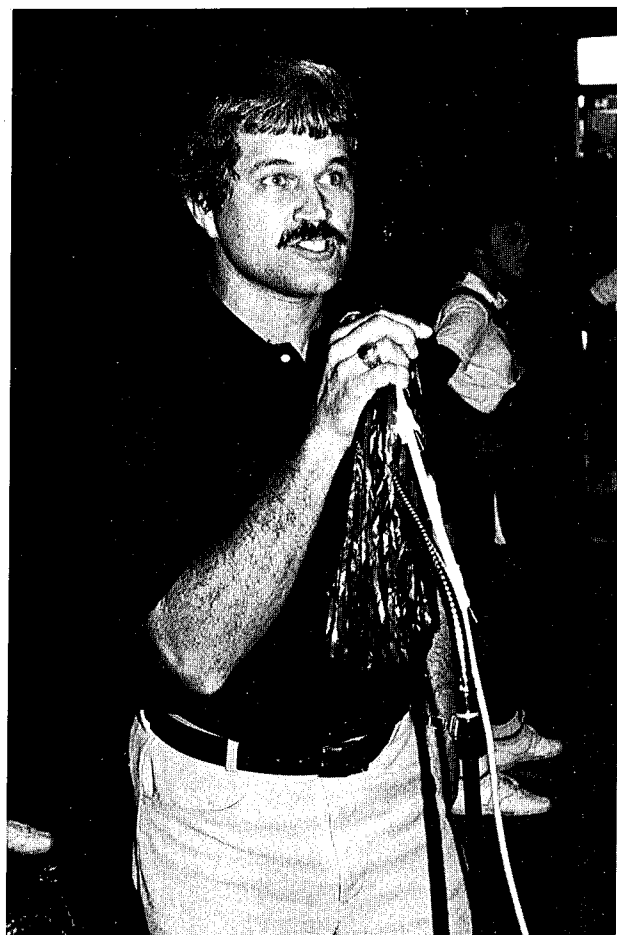

Junior Olympics Earns Big Bucks for Prom

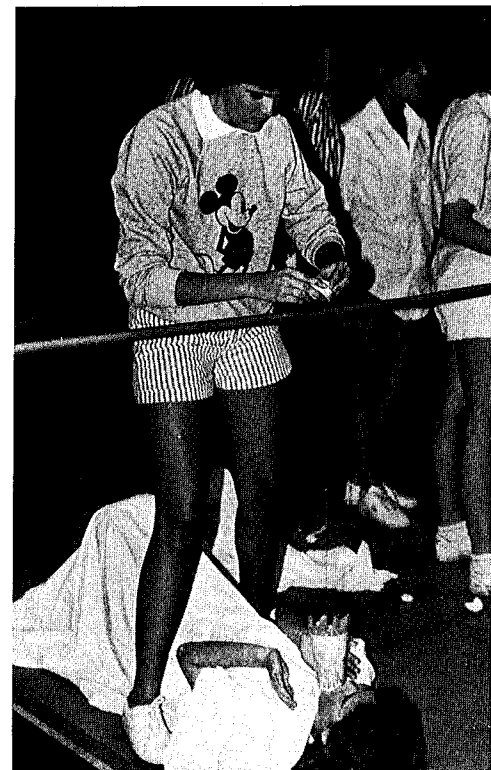

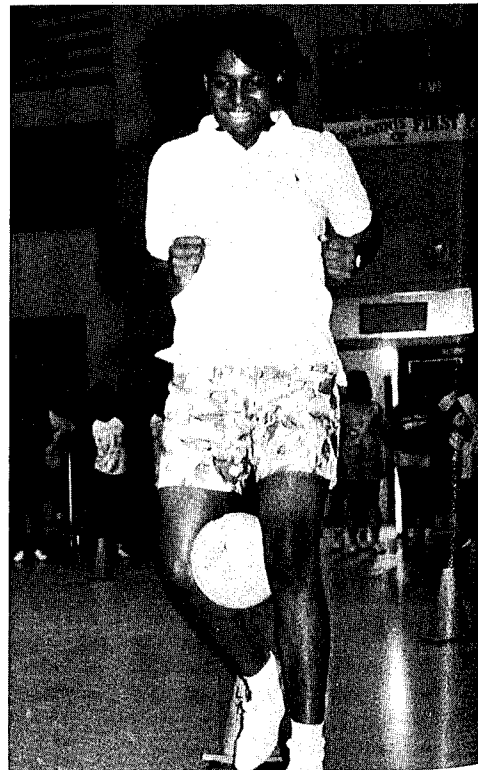

Seniors Climb to the Top

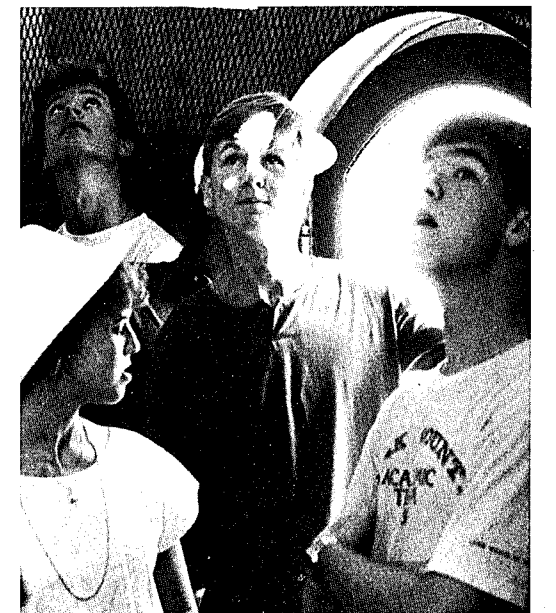
