




Go for It!










Looks Like We Made It

























Scotty Arrives





Spirit Fair












Exchange Student at Lake Wales






Seniors Suffer From Epidemic . . .



Vernon Teacher of the Year

















Highlanders District Champs Again!


Lake Wales Celebrates




Volleyball Team Makes It to Regionals




Girls Tennis 4th in County

Wilson Leads Team To Regionals






Ten Year Self Study Completed

New Program Initiated



Computer Center Installed In Library






"Which way do I go?"



Business Department Enters Computer Age




