## This week's reading selection: Island Treasures: Growing Up in Cuba

**Summary:** Living in Cuba, Abuelito Modesto had to choose between protecting his wealth during an economic crisis and staying by his wife's side when she was ill. He loses most of his money when he chooses to stay with his wife. After she passes away from her illness, he is sure that he made the right choice.

**DISCUSS** with your child some of your family's ancestors and share stories about them with your child.
