PERRY, Ga. — When The Journal met Pamela Heesh, a food assistant at Matt Arthur Elementary School, she wore a t-shirt that read "Feeding kids is a work of heart." Heesh embodies this concept every day. Her efforts have recently been recognized by the non-profit School Nutrition Association (SNA), as she's been named their Southeast Region Employee of The Year.

According to the SNA, this award is in recognition of valuable contributions from employees who show commitment to their respective school's nutrition program, and the students by extension. Through Heesh's contributions and her heart behind her service, her dedication speaks volumes to the program's success in feeding the students that attend Matt Arthur, with a flair that leaves them delighted as well.

When she learned of her award, she was humbled, and said she believes the SNA saw merit in what she does. "I don't do what I do for any awards. I do it because I love to do it ... I was shocked, but it was very humbling; it still is," Heesh said.

As a food assistant, Heesh said her primary focus is feeding the children, as she prepares food before each mealtime, and prepares fresh food during meals. A team player, she also floats around from task to task wherever she is needed. At the start of day, she said she is hitting the ground running: Checking temperatures, dishing out cleaning supplies, booting up the lunchroom's computer systems, then preparing food carefully. "Pretty much whatever needs to be done, that's what I do," Heesh said.

"The minute I walked into Matt Arthur, it felt like home," Heesh said. "We're a family here. We take care of each other, and we look out for each other and we have each other's backs. It feels more like a family than it does a group of coworkers." Heesh said she likes to do her part to ensure that as well. "I like to be there for my coworkers too. I like to do whatever I can to help anyone that I can," Heesh said.

On a school wide level, School Nutrition Director Meredith Potter said employees like Heesh contribute to a warm and inviting culture at "the castle" that radiates to each and every child in the cafeteria.

"One thing that makes Matt Arthur special are people like Pam," Potter said. "It is a true culture at Matt Arthur that is very hard to replicate. And there's a special feeling when you go into the cafeteria at Matt Arthur, and it's because of all the things that we know of, and don't know of, that goes into Matt Arthur. That to me is what stands out about Pam, she is truly why the culture is the way it is and why the kids look forward to breakfast and lunch." "We truly work together, and we do what we do because we love it," Heesh added.

Heesh isn't going anywhere, but some of the students wish she would move to their middle school.

"I have a couple of babies who are leaving me next year, but I have a couple here who see me every morning, just to get a hug," Heesh said. The hugs and smiles go deeper than that, as Heesh is hopeful she can be a light to the lunchroom. "These may be their only meals that day, you don't know," Heesh said. "That I can play a small part in making their day better, makes me feel better."




TEACHER SPOTLIGHT






Special Education Teacher Induction

The New Teacher Induction Series for April included multiple presentations on a variety of topics. Student Services Coordinator, Dr. Alicia Campbell shared information on support services offered by our school Social Workers. School Social Workers are advocates for students. They help students by linking home, school, and community in efforts to remove barriers to academic success. Participants learned how to request assistance from their assigned Social Worker through the SWARM module located in Infinite Campus. Student Services Coordinator, Dana Rollins presented on the health related services available to students within Houston County Schools. Program Specialist, Natalie Preston presented on Special Transportation. Transportation services are provided to ensure all children receive the programming needed according to their Individual Education Plan (IEP). Examples of why a student may need special transportation were provided along with how services are documented in the IEP. Teachers also learned about the Individual Transportation Plan (ITP) which is developed to document transportation needs within the IEP. Occupational Therapist, Leigh Ann Allen and Patti Carriker, Physical Therapist, presented on Occupational Therapy (OT) and Physical Therapy (PT) as a related service provided to assist students in accessing educational programs. Students may receive OT and/or PT as a related service as directed by their Individualized Education Program (IEP) or as part of a Section 504 Plan, if an educational need is identified. Teachers also learned about the referral process for OT or PT services. Speech Language Pathologist (SLP), Erin Burks presented on the role of the SLPs and how they collaborate with others to help students achieve success. The presentation included information about the basic areas addressed by SLPs: articulation, language, fluency, and voice. A sound development chart was shared to show the ages at which different sounds typically develop.

The New Teacher Induction Series for May was led by Student Service Coordinators, Monica Smith and Dr. Alicia Campbell. They presented on Multi-Tiered Systems of Supports (MTSS), explaining the essential components of the data driven framework. MTSS is used to identify students who may be at risk for poor learning outcomes, experience social/emotional needs, or behavioral concerns that impact learning. The participants learned how MTSS work is done through Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) to meet our goal of producing high achieving students.





The Varsity Sharks successfully defended their State Wheelchair Championship title on May 13th. The Sharks faced a veteran West Ga. Wolverines team who defeated the Clayton Eagles to advance to the final game. The Wolverines came at the Sharks with everything they had, and the Sharks stepped up! The defense held the Wolverines on a goal line stand at the end of the 1st half that definitely could have changed the momentum of the game. Anthony Cuti stood out offensively catching the first 3 touchdown passes. Elex Brown and MaCayla Moody both showed great poise and leadership alternating in the quarterback position. Defensively the Sharks kept the pressure on holding the Wolverines to 24 points. The Sharks worked all season on developing a championship mindset, and it paid off! 
