






Administrators Serve Students


Plaintiff Wins Mock Trial Case



Science Teachers Experiment With Students' Minds




Math Department Covers New Angles





Madrigal Dinner Big Success


Foreign Language Students Compete for Ribbons






Industrial Arts Teaches Consumer Knowledge






































Highlanders Fight for Regional Win




Freshmen Start Season With Victory

Lake Wales Battles Bartow in District Contest




You, the players, demonstrated a lot of promise, however, You learned how tough class 3A baseball is.

The team was composed of only 5 seniors. To compound the problem of inexperience the team had several veteran players miss part of the season due to injuries and other obligations.







Co-op Takes First Place in Club Float








Honor Society Brings Back License Plates




Chess Club Places Fourth in State




FBLA Goes Caroling
